

## ANNUAL REPORT, 1894.

After the important ceremony of the opening of the New Gallery by their Excellencies, the Governor-General and Lady Aberdeen, and the very successful Loan Exhibition which they inaugurated in the end of last year, the Council could not expect that the history of the year 1894 would show any marked features, but they are glad to report that it has been a year of quiet progress.

The wisdom of the steps taken to increase the usefulness of the Art Gallery and afford the much needed accommodation by the erection of the new building, has been amply proved. With one exception the shops in the old and new buildings are rented, and there is hardly any doubt that the vacant one will soon be occupied.

The revenue from these rents will be sufficient to meet the interest on the mortgages, so that with but little extra cost in the future, the Association will have the advantage of the New Gallery, the Reading Room, and the Class Rooms, all of which were much needed and of benefit to the Association. It is, however, most desirable that the debt should be reduced and even paid off as soon as possible. It amounts to \$35,000, with an interest charge of \$1,675 per annum.

As the past year has been a transition period in the history of the Association during which the full benefits of the rents has not accrued, the Council have to report that the expenditure has unavoidably exceeded the revenue and that there is a deficit of about \$1,650 for the year. With all the shops rented, the Council see no reason why hereafter

the revenue should not only meet all necessary expenditure; but they hope the deficit of the last two years will be gradually paid off from the surplus.

## ART CLASSES.

The fourteenth session of the advanced Art Classes commenced on October 17th, in charge of Mr. WILLIAM BRYMNER, R.C.A., who reports as follows:—

The number attending the Classes continues very nearly the same from one year to another. The work being done keeps up to a good standard as shown by the drawings exhibited in the Scholarship Competitions at the end of last session. The new class rooms are a great improvement on the old ones and add very much to the comfort and convenience of every one connected with the School.

The number of Pupils who attended during the session 1893-94, was 32, and up to the present date this session, 25.

There were thirteen competitors for the Association Scholarships at the Annual Competition, the successful ones being:—

In the 1st Section, Lilian Tucker.

In the 2nd Section, Alberta Cleland.

The work of Murray Prendergast received honourable mention.

## WATER COLOUR CLASS.

The sixth session of the classes in Water Colour Drawing opened on the 15th September and closed on the 30th October, under the direction of Mr. Charles E. Moss. The attendance was better than last year and aided by fine weather and the facilities afforded by the electric cars many new and varied subjects were found and much conscientious effort was shown; many of the sketches made had considerable merit.

# Exhibitions.

## ANNUAL SPRING EXHIBITION.

The Fifteenth Annual Exhibition of Canadian Art opened with a private view for members and exhibitors, on Monday, April 22rd, and closed on Saturday, May 19th. There were exhibited 167 Oils, 69 Water Colours and 7 Pastels, also a quantity of decorated China. A number of sales were effected. The general average of the work exhibited was good and in several cases a decided advance was noted.

From the experience of the last few years there is little doubt that the date fixed for holding the Spring Exhibitions has been too late in the season. It has been found that owing to so many leaving town early for the summer and for other reasons, public interest cannot be maintained after the first of May. It is therefore thought advisable that in future the opening day should not be later than April 1st, if it can be so arranged.

## ARCHITECTURAL EXHIBITION.

With the co-operation of the Association of Architects of the Province of Quebec, an Exhibition of Architectural Drawings and Sketches was held in the new gallery, from the 4th October to the 20th October, and was inaugurated by a Conversazione which was numerously attended.

Special interest attached to this exhibition from its uniqueness and from its being the first of the kind held here. The result was very gratifying and gave encouragement for the holding of future similar exhibitions.

About 150 Drawings and Sketches of an architectural character were exhibited, many of them of great merit, and in addition, some interesting models and examples of art work were kindly lent by members of the Association for the occasion.

## TEMPEST ESTATE.

The Estate of the late John W. Tempest having been handed over to the Association by the Executors, a statement of both Capital and Revenue accounts is submitted.

Under the terms of the Bequest, two paintings have been purchased, a Landscape, "Sand Dunes, Scheveningen," Holland, (33 x 43), by Willem Bastien Tholen, The Hague, a rising artist of the Modern Dutch School, which was offered for the Gallery at a specially low figure, viz. \$500. It is undoubtedly a valuable addition to the collection.

An opportunity having occurred to acquire an example, in good condition, of the comparatively rare work of Pieter de Hooch, one of the old Dutch painters who flourished more than two hundred years ago, (1632-1682) the Council decided to purchase the painting for the sum of \$6,500, feeling justified in anticipating their revenue to the extent of half that amount in order to secure it.

It was sold from the collection of H. Bingham Mildmay, at Christie's, June 24, 1893, and had formerly been in the collections of

> M. Kleynenbergh, 1841, Baron Verstolk van Soelen, and Mr. Brondgeest, 1846,

and is described in Smith's Catalogue Raisonné, Supplement, p. 574.

## LIBRARY.

The Reading Room for the use of members has been open daily during the year, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m, and has become very popular, as evinced by the large number of those availing themselves of its advantages.

## EXTRACTS FROM THE BY-LAWS.

## BENEFACTORS.

3. Donors of money or property to the value of \$5000 and upwards, shall be enrolled as Benefactors, and shall have their names inscribed on the walls of the Art Gallery and printed in every annual report.

#### GOVERNORS.

4. A donation of \$500 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) of \$1000, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Governor.

## LIFE MEMBERS.

 A donation of \$100 in money, or of property to the value (in the opinion of the Council) of \$400, shall be a qualification for nomination to the office of Life-Member.

## ANNUAL MEMBERS.

The subscription for a family membership, entitling the holder, the ladies of the family, and all sons under twenty, resident under the holder's roof, to free admission to the Reading Room, Galleries, etc., and on all ordinary occasions to Exhibitions, is seven dollars and a half.

The subscription for individual membership is five dollars.

The Association year begins on January 1st, and all subscriptions are payable at the commencement of the year.

## PHILLIPS SQUARE.

#### FOURTEENTH YEAR OF THE ADVANCED ART CLASSES.

The Session for 1894-'95 commenced on Wednesday, October 17th, and will close on Friday, May 17th, under the direction of Mr. William Brynner, R. C. A. The Studios are open for work every week-day; and the regular instruction will be given from 9.30 to 12.30 on the mornings of Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The Course is, as far as possible that adopted in the French Studios, which assumes the fact until one step is well taken, it is useless to proceed to the next. A thorough study of form being of first importance, the Student will draw from the cast in light and shade, proceeding from simple objects, parts of the figure, etc., to the entire figure from the antique.

On the days when instruction is given, those Students who will be benefitted by doing so, will paint from the cast or from still-life, and those sufficiently advanced will also work from the living model.


Subjects for composition will be given out occasionally during the Session.


The Session for 1894-'95 will extend over two terms, the first term being from the 17th of October to the 4th of February, and the second term from the 6th of February to the 17th of May. It will be optional to Students to attend by the Session, term or month.

Fees, in all cases payable in advance, have been fixed for the full Session at \$40; for the term at \$25; and for the month at \$10.

The classes are held in the Association's Studios, Phillips Square, and the Students are granted during the continuance of their study all the privileges of a membership, with the exception of the right to vote or to introduce friends.

Two Association Scholarships will be offered for competition at the end of the Session, each entitling the winner to two years free tuition.
