The agitation in the great Protestant heart of Old England, caused by the recent Papal encroachment on the prerogative of the Queen and the rights of the established Church, has produced an effect which we are, knowing the latitudinarian principles and the desire to conciliate Romanism that exist among the Russell party, less than we anticipated; and we are, therefore, agreeably disappointed.

Lord John Russell's letter to the Bishop of Durham has not yet reached us; but we observe that the despatch represents his Lordship as expressing an opinion that the Clergy of the Church of England are themselves very much to blame for what has happened. We are not inclined to quarrel with Lord John's opinion, for we fear that there is a great deal of truth in it.

Still further to blame the Clergy of the Church of England is happily passing away, for their want of energy and laziness. They left others to cultivate the fields, and now they are reaping the harvest in sorrow. We always feel anxious to defend the Clergy of that Church to which we belong from the attacks of its enemies, but we sadly acknowledge that we cannot always do so conscientiously, because we know that many, too many of them, have neglected their high and holy duties, and thereby suffered their congregations to become the prey of various schisms, from the great schismatics of Rome to the minor schisms of the lowest forms of Protestant dissent.
