A Placture of Bars.—For several nights before we reached this place, the horse were greatly annoyed by bats, which are very numerous on this Serra, where they inhabit the caves in the limestone rocks; during the night we remained at Ria. no, the whole of my troop suffered more from their attacks that they had done before on any previous occasion.
