Editorial Notes.

The town council is considering the matter of procuring a stone-cruiser. This is a move in the right direction, we believe, and we trust the council may see its way clear to getting one. Stone is undoubtedly the proper material for road-building and the sooner we employ its use the sooner will we have good streets.

It has been suggested that the Board of Trade take steps toward improving the appearance of our town in the neighborhood of "mud bridge." This part of the town has long been a source of annoyance to the citizens. The filling up of the creek inside the railway would be a great improvement. The land so reclaimed might be utilized as a park, thus causing the locality to be transformed from the disagreeable place that it now is to a "thing of beauty." We hope something will be done along this line in the near future.

We have it on the authority of a member of the municipal council that the story regarding the payment of bounties in the letter of Mayor Thomson in the last issue was not strictly in accordance with the facts. It appears that the sum of \$735.35 was the whole amount paid in bounties for the year 1894, and included a large sum paid on skunks. A resolution was introduced by Councillor Reid, of Ward VIII, to the effect that the bounty on these animals be discontinued. This was voted down at its introduction, but at a subsequent meeting of the council was passed. This accounts for the decrease in the amount paid. The action we consider a wise one, as it is now generally admitted that the skunk is a most useful assistant to the farmer in the preservation of his crops.

The most important matter before the government of this province at this particular period of its commercial history is that of the public highway. The entire industrial progress of Nova Scotia lays shockingly behind the procession on account, mainly, of the lack of easy and economical means of travel and transportation throughout the rural districts. It is therefore very disappointing to all who have the welfare of our province at heart to know that the late session of the legislature was allowed to come to an end without any action being taken to provide for an improvement along this line. For two years it has been given out, from time to time, that the government was about to take up this question of road reform and give the province a measure calculated to put our highways in a good serviceable condition. The matter has been discussed by the press throughout the province, all as it was thought, to give the government some idea as to the prevailing sentiment among the people, to assist the framing of a satisfactory measure. It is therefore difficult to explain why the government has allowed a matter of such importance to be again deferred.

A few months ago our orchardists were somewhat startled over the fact that the San Jose scale had obtained a hold upon the Ontario nurseries, and grave fears were entertained that the pest would be introduced into the great fruit belt of this province. Prompt action on the part of Ontario government has, however, resulted in mitigating the danger for the present, and the federal house is now engaged in framing legislation to prevent the importation of United States nursery stock, as a precautionary measure against future trouble of the same kind. The scourge has devastated thousands of the finest orchards in the United States, and that country has spent millions of dollars in fruitless endeavors to exterminate the destroying pest. It was through import nursery stock that it was introduced into Canada, and had not expert horticulturists quickly discovered its existence, the fruit growers of Canada would have had a similar experience. The reports from Ontario that the nurseries in that province are now unaffected are encouraging, and Nova Scotia fruit growers, even though they hardly realize the disaster from which they have been saved, are under great obligations to the governments that so promptly caused the destruction of infested orchards.

The Intercollegiate Debate. The intercollegiate debate between Acadia and Kings came off on Friday evening last at Windsor. About eighty went down from here by special train to listen to the discussion. The debate is said to have been quite interesting. Mr. Bowman, Senior of Kings, acted as chairman and gave the opening address. The subject for the debate was: "Resolved, that annexation to the United States would be beneficial to Canada."

The affirmative side was upheld by Acadia, while Kings spoke in opposition. Four students from each college took part in the debate, those from Acadia being Messrs. S. S. Poul, E. C. Stubbart, J. A. McLeod, and W. D. Farris, while Kings' was represented by Messrs. H. A. Ancient, A. E. Partridge, J. B. McCarthy and W. Cotton. All the debaters did extremely well, the speeches of Messrs. Ancient and McLeod being exceptionally good. At the close of the debate, the judges (Professors DeMill, of Kings, and Keirstead, of Acadia, and Supervisor MacKay, of Halifax) announced their decision in favor of the visiting students.

The Baptist Church's New Pastor.

Rev. H. R. Hatch arrived in town on the 17th inst. and is domiciled at the Royal. His family are expected about the 1st of April, and will at once warm up the parsonage. He enters upon his duties under the most auspicious omens, and doubtless will prove a worthy successor of his much esteemed predecessor. On Sabbath morning he entered upon his ministerial work with an introductory service quite out of the ordinary line. After the usual opening devotions, he said he would use no text, since in their new relation as pastor and people there were things he wished to speak of that were not in the line of any appropriate text.

He first spoke of the apparent Providence that brought them into the relation of pastor and people, and then said: "Last summer I planned to spend this year in Chicago; but when about to make my final arrangements the way was hedged up. Then after a period of waiting, in which my constant prayer was, 'O Lord, guide according to thy will,' the invitation came to spend a month with you. You, too, had been praying to be led aright. To day we enter into the relation of pastor of people. Is not this the plan of an over-ruling Providence for your life and for mine? So strong is my belief that it is that my heart is full of hope and courage as I become your pastor."

"There is a subtle current of communication, helpful or harmful, between the pew and the pulpit. 'Good preaching,' someone has said, 'is a matter of reciprocity.' Sober faces, dull and sleepy eyes, listless and inattentive attitudes affect the preacher just as surely as similar conditions in the preacher affect the audience. On the other hand, let the congregation greet the preacher as if they were expecting a message full of truth and life, and the expectancy will communicate itself to the preacher's spirit and his heart and brain will respond. Again let the praying part of the congregation greet the preacher in the attitude of prayer. The church is the preacher's prayer-book; and through the prayers of his people the pastor will find strength and power for his public ministrations."

"The worship, as a whole, depend upon the attitude of the individual worshippers. There is no need to bring into God's house counter and yard-stick and dry goods; no need to bring in sheep and oxen and farm implements; no need to parade cares and perplexities, or successes before the congregation in order to kill the spirit of worship. All that is necessary is to think of these things and worship becomes an empty show. "The minister must leave behind him the atmosphere of the study when he enters the pulpit; so must each worshipper leave behind him his business care, his intellectual difficulties, his plans for the future, and endeavor to be in the Spirit on the Lord's Day. Then, and only then, does the house of worship become the very gate of Heaven to the waiting soul, and the heart receive needed strength and hope and peace."
