Delightful Concoctions of Succulent Rhubarb. Rhubarb may be canned in cold water. Use freshly cut stalks, fit them tightly into a thoroughly clean jar and let the water run full force into the jar for fifteen minutes till the air is excluded, screw on the top when the jar is still under water—see that it is perfectly airtight—and the contents should keep as long as fresh rhubarb.

Rhubarb Pie.—To a pint of thoroughly peeled rhubarb add the whites of four eggs, previously beaten stiff and enough sugar to make a paste. Beat the mixture lightly for ten minutes and bake in a shallow oven for ten minutes. Serve with cream.

Rhubarb Meringue.—To a plate with plain paste. Cut into pieces sufficient rhubarb to fill the plate, and sprinkle with flour on each piece is quite white. Place rhubarb in the pie plate, adding one cup of sugar and a very little water. Bake slowly without a top crust and when done spread over the top the beaten whites of two eggs into which has been stirred one tablespoonful of sugar. Brown lightly in the oven.

Rhubarb Pie.—Break the peeled rhubarb into small pieces, flour them until they are quite white and add a cup of sugar for each pie. Line a pie dish, put in the rhubarb, with the sugar well stirred into it, cover with the upper crust and bake one hour. Serve cold, sprinkling powdered sugar on top. Many housewives add a couple of slices of orange (peel and pulp) or some pieces of preserved or dried ginger to rhubarb and stew them together.

Stewed Rhubarb.—Peel the rhubarb and cut into one-inch pieces. Sprinkle with sugar and put in a saucepan with just enough water to keep rhubarb from burning. Very little water is needed as rhubarb provides its own moisture. All fruits may be baked instead of stewed. Less water is necessary for baking than stewing, and it is well to add the sugar only about fifteen minutes before leaving from the oven. There is then less danger of the fruit scorching.

A little one roomed, cheerless, badly-taught school for these progressive people, they have consolidated schools, with carriages to carry the children in the summer and sleighs to transport them in winter.

Cooking Meats by Stewing. There are two methods of stewing meats, in one, the meat or poultry is partly fried in butter, drippings or other fat, until perfectly seared on the outside, after which a sufficient quantity of water is poured over it, brought to a boil and kept at the simmering point until perfectly tender, and the water mostly evaporated. It is contended that the water must be boiling hot when poured on the hot, seared meat, as, if cold water is used, the shock of the cold liquid hardens the meat. This, however, is a matter for the cook to decide.

The other method differs. The meat is not fried, but packed loosely in a pan or kettle, with sufficient cold water or stock to cook and keep simmering slowly until perfectly done. This is the method observed in making Irish stews; for the two pounds of neck or loin of mutton the time required is usually two hours; but for tough meats which are the parts generally chosen for stews, four or five hours are usually required. The fire may be allowed to gradually die out as the meat gets nearly done, and it should be left in the water, covered, until the water is cold.

Tough meat, suit for any other process of cooking; is made perfectly delicious through proper stewing, and the most required very simple. Stewing a few minutes at the start. Barely water enough to cover the meat is used at first, and only sufficient more is added as it boils away, to prevent scorching.

Oldest Ship in the World. The Australian convict ship Success, which was built in 1790, and is the oldest ship in the world still in active service, has sailed from Queensland for New York on what will probably be her last voyage. She was disabled at sea some four weeks ago, but was located by means of her wireless apparatus, and was towed to Queensland for repairs. Since she has been at Queensland she has attracted much attention, and many people, including the naval commander at Queensland, visited her. Despite her 122 years, she seems sound and staunch, and it is expected that, with fair weather, she will reach New York in about 40 days.

Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition. SEPTEMBER 17TH TO 19TH. The Sixteenth Annual Exhibition of the Province of Nova Scotia will be held from the 17th of September to the 19th.

Preparations are well in hand to make this the most attractive fair yet. The price list, which has been distributed, is larger than previous years and should bring strong competition in each of the classes.

A special program of amusements will be presented before the Grand Stand, including horse racing, vaudeville and fireworks display in the evening. A program will be issued later, giving detailed account of each day's attractions.

In the meantime think over what you have to exhibit, and assist in making this a Provincial Fair in every sense.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations. A NY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

DATE OF ENTRY. Residence on the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live on the land in each of the three years, or he may occupy it for at least 60 days in each year, and be accompanied by his wife, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure standing by pre-empting a quarter section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate 40 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
