THE HORSE'S EYE. (Continued.) CHEMISTS.—Even the relaxing effect of a cloudy, damp climate has its influence. It has been long noticed, that young horses, bred on the dry, marshy, coastal region north of the Tyne, will usually escape, if removed to the high, dry table-lands of the south of these mountains, before they have become more than one year old.

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THE CANYONS OF THE COLORADO.

Geologists have demonstrated that the entire basin of the Colorado was once covered by a continuous sheet of soft mud, and upper cretaceous shales, of those eastern mountains and millions of loose boulders, the surface between being firm lower cretaceous sandstone, or still older rocks. 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LIFE-PRESERVING LEMONS.
