





LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Mr. J. J. WHELAN, Inspector of Catholic Schools in Newfoundland, and Mrs. Wickham, arrived here a few days ago on a visit to relatives and friends.

On the 17th inst., while Mr. J. Wright, Government Analyst for Manitoba, was sailing in a canoe on the Red River, a gust of wind upset the boat and he was drowned.

The Tea Party at Tipish, on Wednesday last, was an unprecedented success. Between five and six thousand people were in attendance, and the gross receipts are said to have amounted about \$2,500, and the amount netted about \$1,700.

It is reported that Hon. Edward Blake will return to Canada in poorer health than when he left it. He was beset by his ailments in Italy, but on reaching England his old troubles returned. Since then there has been no improvement.

The committee in charge of the South Tea have now completed arrangements with the Railway for the conveyance of passengers on Wednesday next, August 1st. Read carefully the time table of trains and the fare table. A grand day may be expected.

There being no criminal cases, the Grand Jury were discharged. The civil docket contained seven suits, some of which were settled before coming to trial. The Court adjourned on Saturday.

REV. MOTHER ST. ANTHONIA, who has, for many years, been Superior of St. Joseph's Convent, left here on Friday morning last for the Mother House of the Order, in Montreal. The amount of good accomplished by this talented and devoted religious, during the twenty-four years of her self-sacrificing labors in Charlottetown, is unknown to the world; on the golden pages of the recording angels' book alone are her good works inscribed. Under her fostering care the small and poorly fitted St. Joseph's School has assumed its present magnificent proportions, and has become one of the finest convent buildings in the Maritime Provinces, being an ornament to the city, as well as a thoroughly equipped school for the training of young ladies. On the evening previous to her departure, Mother St. Anthony was presented with an address and purse by the members of St. Joseph's Society. A large number of lady friends assembled at the station on Saturday morning to bid her good-bye.

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Irish News.

Dublin advices of the 20th inst., say that Dr. James Ridley, medical officer in attendance at Tuam Jail during Manderville's incarceration there, and who was subpoenaed to appear at the inquest at Millstreet, into Manderville's death, has committed suicide.

Dr. Ridley had been present at the inquest daily, and was called to the witness stand. The evidence given to show that Manderville was subjected to ill-treatment while in jail seemed to prey upon his mind. His suicide committed was cruelly treated by the prison officials.

The striking of female was resumed on the Vandeleur estates in the County Clare recently. The tenants were evicted peacefully. James Madigan of Carascalla strongly barricaded his residence and poured cold water on the evictors, who used sledge hammers, crowbars and axes. Madigan was arrested with two relatives who assisted him. Several members of America and English visitors witnessed the scene.

The plan of campaign has been adopted by the tenants on the Murphy estate at Trillick, County Kerry. Father Galligan, who was imprisoned at Limerick for a offence under the Crimes Act, was released lately. He was greeted by a crowd and made a speech.

Dr. Ridley left a statement regarding the prison treatment of O'Brien and Manderville, as evidence to be given at the inquest. The police seized it. Fenians, visiting justice, testified that his request that Manderville be put in the hospital was disregarded. Dr. Cronin said that water was used as a proper treatment for a person suffering from diarrhoea. The illness of the deceased was caused by a sudden change from the normal conditions of life.
