LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FRANK MATHIAS, M. P. of Montserrat Liberal, died in Water Street Hospital Ottawa on Monday last.

Dr. A. E. McDonald, of Boston, who had been on a visit to friends in this native Province, left for home via Picton yesterday morning.

Right Rev. Francis Bourne, Bishop of Southwark, has been selected by the congregation of the Propaganda, as Archbishop of Westminster in succession to the late Cardinal Vaughan.

At Amherst on Friday Roberval won the 2.33 pace and the 2.30 trot. His best time was 2.23½. The free for all was won by Helen R. of Stellarton, in 1.18½. In the 2.23 pace and 2.30 trot Clayton Jr. was the winner, his best time being 2.25½.

Rt. Rev. Bishop Cameron of Antigonish and Rev. J. J. Chisholm of Picton, arrived here on the Campana on Monday afternoon, and left on return to the mainland by the Princess this morning. They were guests at the palace, while here.

His Lordship, Bishop McDonald, returned to the city on Monday evening from the west, where he had dedicated the new Church at the Brae, administered confirmation at the Brae and at St. Mark's, Lot 7, and blessed a new cemetery at Lunenburg Island.

A Sofia despatch of the 26th, ult., says: The Macedonian committee have issued a black bordered list which shows that seventy villages have been pillaged and destroyed in the vicinity of Monastir, to which is added instances of revolting outrages perpetrated on women. It has created a sensation.

No race has been completed between the Reliance and Shamrock III, at New York since Tuesday of last week. On Thursday, Saturday, and Monday the weather conditions did not permit of them completing the race. The Reliance seems to have lead as far as they went on each occasion.

A despatch from Buxton, N. B., dated August 28th, says Captain Anderson of the brigantine Fortuna reports having sighted on Tuesday morning, thirty miles east of North Point, P. E. Island an unknown schooner water-logged and abandoned, sailing under double-reefed mainsail and whole forest, both jibs partly set. The schooner's deck load of shingles was floating near. The vessel appeared to be of about sixty tons. Anderson was unable to board her.

In the Barlow shooting match at Ottawa Sgt. J. W. Davison sixth, wins \$2000, Capt. Johnson, Doctor Stewart, Alex. Kennedy and F. J. Solomon four dollars each. Fourth Sgt. C. A. Team hold fifth place. Bankers match, Capt. E. Stewart and Sgt. L. H. Beer won five dollars each. Capt. W. A. Johnston, F. J. Solomon and Sgt. Reg. Stewart four dollars each. Gunner James Landrigan wins first place in tyro bankers four dollars. The match was fine on Tuesday, but Monday was unpleasant. The team was all shooting well.

SAYS the Chatham World: The latest sensation in town is the report that Constable Broecker is asking for the arrest of Governor Snowball on a charge of assault. The constable went to arrest Governor Snowball's coachman for non-payment of the special tax on workmen in town who are not on the assessment roll; and was ordered off the premises. 'I am Lieutenant Governor and have more authority here than you,' said His Honor, and then he took Harry by the shoulder and pushed him off the premises.

In the sports, under the auspices of the Maritime Provinces Amateur Athletic Association at Halifax on Saturday last, the Island athletes showed to splendid advantage and established several new Maritime records. Walter Jones, of Pownal won in the hammer throwing contest making a new record with a throw of 122 feet 11 inches. Donahoe was champion in the 120 yards hurdle race and was second in the 220 yards and 440 yards run. Hespenny of Charlottetown made a new record for pole vaulting with a vault of 11 feet. Brown was first in the half mile bicycle and second in the quarter mile.

THE Yacht races started at Bouris on Thursday last and postponed from Friday to day till Monday of this week in consequence of weather conditions preventing the completion of the races within the time limit were called to a finish on the last named day. The Yacht Mimac of Charlottetown had a good lead on the home stretch when she met with an accident. She sprang a leak and was obliged to withdraw from the contest. The race was won by the Defender, of Summerside, with Le Roi, also of Summerside, second, Lina May, of Bouris third and Mamie G. of Elmisdale fourth.

We deeply regret the death of Harry J. McQuaid, son of Mr. Andrew McQuaid of this city, which occurred at Fermie, B. C. where the deceased had been for the greater part of the five years he was in the Pacific Province. He was an estimable young man 29 years of age, and his parents and other members of the family have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement. His body arrived here on Wednesday evening, and on Thursday morning the funeral took place from his residence on Elm Avenue to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, thence to the cemetery on St. Peter's Road. The funeral was largely attended. A High Mass of Requiem was sung by Rev. Dr. Monaghan, who also officiated at the grave. R. I. P.

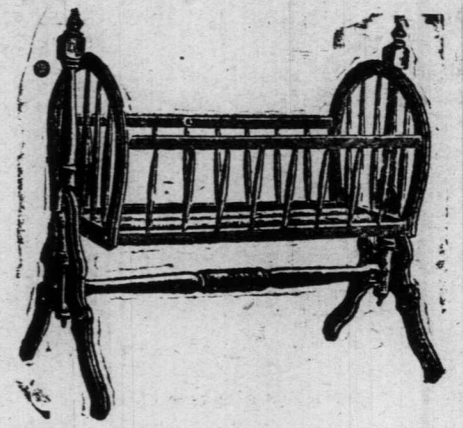
