CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 31. All officers and men of the Turkish Army on furlough have been ordered to rejoin their regiments within 24 nours. The military Governor officially denies that dissensions exist Tchatalja lines.

BERLIN, Jan. 31. Pessimism regarding the Balkan ituation is displayed in official cireles here, owing t othe uncompromisng attiude of the Bulgarians. Gerany, in conjunction with the other Powers, is doing all possible to effect a compromise, but a resumption of hostilities on Monday is highly probable. The German Government fears that if war should be resume the Bulgarians may push matters be-

wond their own interests.

LONDONDERRY, Jan. 31. The Londonderry election resulted in the return of David C. Hogg, Naionalist over Colonel Pakenham, by 2,699 to 2.642; a majority of 57. This gives the Home Rulers a majority of the Ulster seats. Extraordinary eforts were made by both parties, and ut of 5,642 possible votes 5,341 were cast. , Many sick and infirm inhabit ants were taken to the polls in ambuances. Much fear was expressed, out few disturbances occurred. A large force of the Royal Irish Constaulary was in readiness. Both Candidates were Protestants.

The announcement of the polling was followed by extraordinary scenes. The pent up excitement was vented in wild demonstrations. A deafening tornado of shrieks and hisses broke loose. This was accompanied by a fire of revolvers in the air, while green and red handkerchiefs and Union Jacks fluttered over the heads of the surging crowds. The Nationalists among the Turkish troops on the sang "A Nation once again," to which the Unionists replied with "Rule Britannia," and "God Save the King." Mounted police had to clear the way



The Leyland Liner Devonian, which was within 200 miles when the wireless call for help reached her, is probably now with her. The French line steamers Florida and Carolina were also notified, and one of them will probably tow her into Halifax.

BOSTON, Jan. 81/ The Devonian reached the Mexico and despite heavy sea and darkness sent two steel hawsers aboard. Both steamers drifted to the Southward but are making for Halifax, a distance of 400 miles. As the Mexico, with he cargo, is valued at more than \$1,000, 000, the crew of the Devonian will di vide at least \$50,000 salvage money one of the richest prizes for man years. 




The Origin of Gloves.

Early Traits.

As a boy this Joseph Balsalmo had very few, if any qualities that would have even indicated genius enough to become either knave or scoundrel. He was recorded as being "indolent and unruly." He was put into a monastery when he was fifteen, and after few months, when expelled, began a criminal career and a dissolute life. He had, it is true, studied on branch of learning that afterwards stood him in good stead, but occasionally got others into trouble.

This was chemistry; it appealed to his spectacular nature as well as to his inventive genius in crime. It came theatrically to his aid in his incantation scenes, and in his offices of sorcery. He posed as an alchemist, a doer of miracles and an inventor of an extraordinary elixir of life-forging testimony, and at the same time getting enough money to advance himself by forging his uncle's will.

Indeed, the list of his crimes while yet in his teens, is so long and various that I might recite most anything here from my own imagination and go unchallenged. I daresay that a lot of very interesting history is made up in this way. But here I propose to stick to truths so long as I can find

His Journeys.

He also claimed most seriously that he had been living for centuries, had in fact been a contemporary of Christ's and had at that time predicted the Crucifixion. He was the "Cophte" and his wife was the "Grand Priestess." Out of the painfully susceptible followers he extracted by his incantations and Shaminism, a large amount of money which he quickly proceeded to spend in gratification of his numerous desires. Personally, he had no fear of moral degeneration, for was he not actually claiming that, among other mysterious ailments, his Elixir would restore lost innocence?

The Best of Them All.

There have been others engaged in Cagliostro's game, but never one with such magnificent gall, nor ever one who dealt his cards with prince, potentate, and savant as did he. The episode of the Queen's Necklace gave him his particular place in history. It associated his name with some of the most prominent people of Europe, and that has been dealt with in so much detail, and fictionized to such an extent that as time goes by the glamour will be still further increas-

The Queen's Necklace.

The Queen was a martyr in an bscure plot by swindlers, who assailed not only her honor but her hrone. It was claimed that the Carlinal Rohan purchased it for her, but he had been roped into the game by a Madame de la Motte. Cagliostro was a friend of this woman's husband; and not only forged the letter that was supposed to have come from the Queen commissioning the Cardinal to purchase the necklace, but was an active conspirator.

The Cardinal's position in the whole affair was a matter of opinion then. and is now. No one doubts the Queen's innocence. In the trial that followed the unveiling of this scandalous plot, the Comte de la Motte was banished for life; his wife was condemned to the carcan-to be branded on both shoulders with the letter V, to be whipped and 'then be imprisoned for life.

The Same Old Story.

Cagliostro was sent to the bastile. out after a few months managed to secure his liberation. He'at once went into his wonder-working schemes, travelling with his strangely aithful wife over Europe. He agai ut a great dash in his d'aplays of lothing and jewelry. His income was zoing on in the revenues from his established Egyptian ledges. and mong the contributors was the Carlinal himself. At this time Goethe. whose name had become great came ipon Caliostro's family (the Bansalnos) in Palermo, and took a peculiar nterest in them and learned much concerning him, their son and bro ther. He became impressed somehow s he said, "with this pious and quie 'amily."

After a sojourn in England, where ne addressed startling letters to the people of France. 

One of the logs on the load collided with the stump of a tree protruding above the snow, which rebounding hit Rowsell on the head and killed him instantly. The father and sister of the deceased are at Badger and Magistrate Fitzgerald ordered a post mortem. An official enquiry into the cause of the accident will also be held. The victim was a oung man of about 22 years.

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

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
