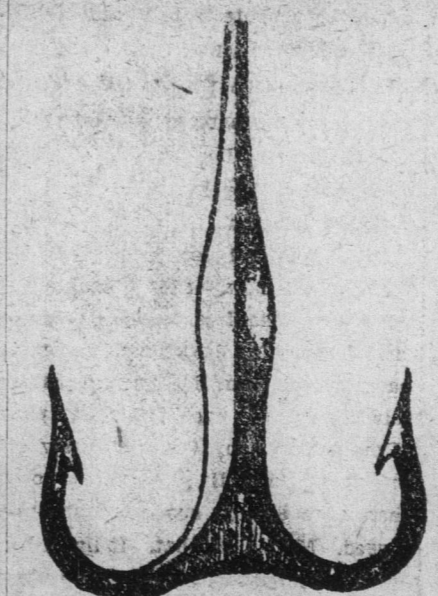

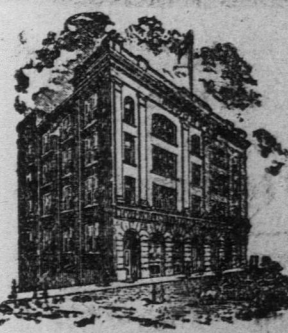

On Antipathies.

"I am of a constitution so general that it consorts and sympathizes with all things: I have no antipathy, or rather idiosyncrasy in anything. These natural repugnances do not touch me."—Religio-Medici.

A certain good lady, who has a phlegmatic temperament something like that which the author of the Religio-Medici ascribes to himself, always pook hooes me when I grow nervous at the sound of a knife scraping upon tin.

"Nonsense," she says, "don't notice it. Don't let it make you nervous. Why I don't mind it a particle."

I chronicle this little household happening because I think it is typical. People who, like my phlegmatic friend, do not have these peculiar sense antipathies, are always prone to think that those who do have them are using their imaginations.

And worse than that, I know some people who do have one sort of antipathy but are so narrow, so intolerant, that they actually do not sympathize with those who have a different sort.

Now I protest that my feelings when I hear a steel knife scrape over silver or tin is not at all a fanciful feeling. It does not originate in my mind or my imagination. I think it is caused by the fact that the nerves of my ear are tuned to a certain pitch and the vibration which that knife starts sets them to jangling. I could no more control it by merely wishing than I could stop by an effort of the will a wireless instrument from vibrating in answer to another instrument.

When a man is color blind we do

not accuse him of imagining himself to be in that condition. We simply realize that his eyes are adjusted to the various light waves differently from ours.

Have you not noticed how restless a cat usually becomes when anyone whistles near her. This isn't because the cat is wilfully nervous, but because her ears are so attuned that the shrillness of a whistle actually hurts them. In this same way I think all the antipathies of the senses should be accounted for.

Incidentally I find a comparison of these strange little antipathies very interesting. One friend is made intensely nervous by the sound of a piece of cloth being torn in twain. I don't mind that at all rather like it in fact. On the other hand she can sit in a room where someone is scraping a knife across a piece of tin and not even know that the fiendish noise is going on. Still another friend does not mind either of these sounds, but has to leave the room when her father scrapes out his pipe.

You notice that I say sense antipathies. That is because I have in mind antipathies of the other senses as well as of the ears,—of touch, for instance. One friend simply can't bear to touch flannel with the tips of her fingers. Now that is utterly incomprehensible to me until I translate it into the terms of my own keenest touch antipathy. I cannot bear to have the dentist lay the dry napkin across my tongue when he is filling a tooth. When he does that it fairly makes me crawl all over, and just to write about it gives me an uncomfortable feeling.

Antipathies are queer things, but like most queer things, interesting. I should think some of our psychological experts would write us a magazine article on this subject.

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, April 21st, 1914.

THE KING AND QUEEN IN PARIS.

This week's great social and fashionable event is the visit of the King and Queen to Paris. Princess Mary is accompanying them, but the Prince of Wales goes off on a short voyage with his brother on board the Collingwood. He will be, fortunate youth! a guest on Prince Albert's ship for a fortnight, and is much to be envied. The Royal visit to Paris might well have taken place last year. It falls at an awkward time, because the French are in the very thick of a General Election, and I know that we would under similar circumstances be disposed to feel the entertainment of travelling Royalty as somewhat of a bore. The accounts, however, which have reached me from friends in Paris prove that so far from feeling the visit tiresome they are rejoicing at it and are prepared to give their Majesties a real good time. Englishmen will be curious to observe the impression King George and Queen Mary make on the Parisians. Their Majesties have always an air of taking life very seriously. I see them often under varying circumstances, and my experience is that they appear at their worst when it is an affair of State. They are apt to look grim when they merely feel that the occasion is one of grave importance. Much will depend upon the Queen and Princess Mary. If the latter will only smile at and laugh with the crowds all will be well. The Parisians will make a fairly Princess of her forthwith. They cherish many pleasant memories of Queen Alexandra and her charming ways when she was in Paris in state, and, of course, King Edward remains to them the very ideal of a Monarch. I have seen him "descend" many times at the Gare du Nord, and always amid scenes of enthusiasm due to matters as slight as the raising of his hat.

FEEDING THE KING IN PARIS.

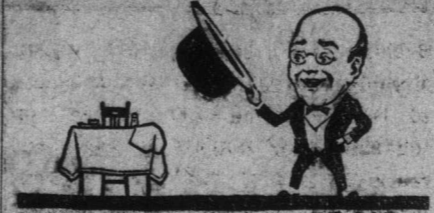
The late King Edward was certainly a gourmet or delicate feeder, as distinguished from a gourmand, or mere glutton. Distinguished chefs knew it, and did their very best to please him and win the word of praise of which he was never chary when it was merited. The tastes of King George in the matter of dining are not so well known, but he will at any rate have an opportunity this week of sampling the classic cuisine of France brought to its perfection. It is stated that forty eminent chefs have been engaged to prepare the banquet to be given to their British Majesties at the Elysee Palace, Paris. M. Fallieres would have revelled in casting an expert superintending eye over the preparations. Nothing of the sort is, however, to be expected from President Poincare who is notoriously indifferent as to what he eats or what he drinks.

BILLIARDS IN A LONDON CHURCH.

The old chapel where Defoe is supposed to have worshipped at Tooting, has been converted into a billiard saloon. There have been many changes in old South London places of worship of recent years. The Sutherland Chapel in Walworth Road was the first such place to be turned into a picture palace, and soon afterwards the famous Hanover Park Chapel at Peckham went the same way. Rowland Hill's old chapel in Blackfriars Road is now the headquarters of London boxing, and also has periodical picture shows. An old Baptist chapel at Clapham is now a post office. Nonconformist places of worship especially suffer by reason of movement of population. As the people move farther out of London the chapels lose their congregations, and without the aid of wealthy supporters they are unable to keep open. Still, the shutting up of Nonconformist chapels in London has been accompanied by the opening of many new chapels in the outer ring of London.

AUSTRIAN EMPEROR AND THE EUROPEAN SITUATION.

Although perhaps politically speaking the death of the Emperor of Austria, if it were to come now would not be catastrophic, as a matter of fact, the situation is very different. This is owing to the existence of a double personal regime—the formal rule of the Emperor and the secret but active rule of the Habsburgs. The Emperor Francis Joseph is far too old and broken to rule. He has only one idea—how to keep the peace during the short time that he has to live. His nephew, the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, acts almost as if he were already on the throne. He is strong willed, combative, a fanatical clericalist, anti-democratic, and, above all, a militarist. International crises spring up in rapid succession, each more menacing than the last. Up

to a certain point Austro-Hungary diplomacy, thanks to the Archduke, is strong, aggressive and successful. The crucial hour comes when the army is mobilized. Then the aged Emperor awakes from his lethargy, asserts his pacific will, and the whole edifice so carefully built up by the diplomats is brought down with a crash just when it was on the point of completion. Austrians never speak with disrespect of their Emperor, but under their breath they recognize that the humiliating defeat of Austro-Hungarian diplomacy all along the line is almost solely due to the Emperor's pathetic shrinking from the very suggestion of war. The Habsburgs' faults, on the other hand, are only too patent, and the sooner he feels the full responsibility of sovereignty the safer it will be for the Empire. At any rate, the present dual system has become intolerable and even become disastrous for Europe.

LAST STRONGHOLD OF THE ENGLISH SMART SET.

The term itself, that of the Smart Set once so ubiquitous, has now all but ceased to exist. Values have changed in London society of late, and what was once the Smart—i.e. the Court-Set is no longer. But where it actually and really survives is in racing circles. There the same people are still the best people and lead the fashion with all their old authority. The beginning of the London season coincides with the reopening of the smart racing season. The racing set possesses a language, a code of manners, and a society of their own. Their capital is of course Newmarket, and it is the thing to have a house or pied-a-terre somewhere round about the Heath at Newmarket. Owing to the difficulties of getting a house of any sort in the vicinity people living in neighboring counties will describe themselves as living near Newmarket—anything within a radius of 30 miles being near enough with the possession of a car. The same people therefore meet constantly at the various meetings, know each other intimately, and observe the presence of strangers with a rather disdainful surprise. So expensive is admittance to the best enclosures on the Heath that guests brought in house parties are left to pay for themselves. The uninitiated are sometimes rather dismayed to find that they are expected to disburse something between four pounds and five pounds gate-money. Their pleasure as strangers in the family gathering is not in proportion to such an outlay.

CHANGES IN WOMEN'S DRESS.

The often-heard remark that in these latter days the seasons seem to be changing would seem to apply to more than atmospheric conditions. In the past it has been the autumn that was traditionally "the silly season" for British newspaper correspondence on social or trivial topics; but now, in the spring, London is being treated to a series of letters on the why and wherefore of the frequent changes in women's dress. The shrewdest remark this correspondent has yet produced is that of a lady writer who declares that "the fashions of woman's attire are simply a question of trade and the foolish and constant change of style has but one great object—to compel or induce ladies to buy new clothes much sooner than would be necessary with more stable fashions." This confirms the opinion of one of the greatest living experts on the subject. Dining once with probably the best known woman writer on the subject, I ventured to enquire why the fashions so frequently and radically changed. "There is only one excuse I have ever discovered," she replied, "and that is that they are set by tradesmen for trade purposes. Their one idea is that the mode shall be so altered year by year that immediate detection of a last season's dress is ensured. Now, no self-respecting woman could possibly allow herself to be seen in a last year's gown." To her mind that settled the question, and there was no more to be said.

A good way to preserve a bridal bouquet is to make a string of beads out of it. To keep cheese wrap it in a cloth dipped in vinegar and then cover with waxed paper.

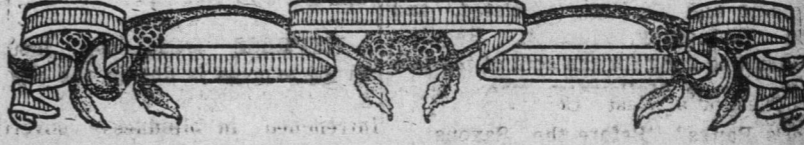

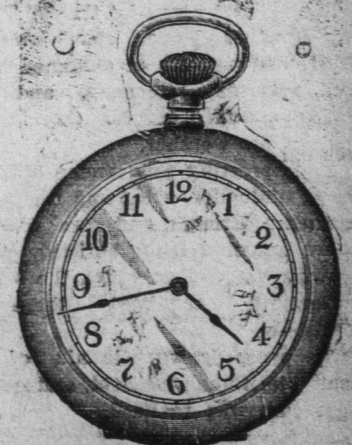

This decision would have been of very great importance under the old Tariff Act, and is still of interest because it is an official decision giving a liberal interpretation of the law and a disposition on the part of the courts to concede to the American fishing interests on the treaty coast of Newfoundland the fullest enjoyment of their rights, and the fullest development of American interests in those waters.—Halifax Chronicle, May 1st.

### Manager Sainthil's Narrow Scape.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.  
Both Nationalists and Unionists of Dublin are taking a pessimistic view of the situation since Tuesday's announcement of the Government's proposals. Unionists feel that if they arrive at an agreement for the permanent exclusion of Ulster from the Hule Bill, Redmond will be compelled to declare war by refusing to recognize the Amending Bill. At the same time if Carson keeps his promise, the Ulster Provisional Government will come into operation the day the Home Rule Bill passes. Thus there would be presented the strange spectacle of Nationalists in revolt and an unconstitutional Government established in Ulster. More and more is the general election regarded as the only way out. In the meantime part of the Press is advising Ulsterites to look to their guns rather than to Parliament for help. Although Redmond holds the sword over Asquith's head, ready to strike as soon as he is displeased. It was the Nationalists who came to the rescue of the Government yesterday when a snap division was taken, resulting in a narrow Government majority of 21. Liberals have become so accustomed recently to urgent orders from whips that they have been rendered case-hardened and lax. A formal motion in regard to the precedence of business afforded a chance to the Opposition. Their purpose becoming suspected, caused the Ministerial whips suddenly to become alive. An urgent summons was issued to the clubs, offices and residences of members and ministerial supporters, principally Nationalists, came pouring in from all directions. Had the vote been contrary it would have greatly weakened the Government, even if it had not necessitated resignation.

### This Village Run on Saxon Lines.

Community Managed by Rules Found Workable Over a Thousand Years Ago.  
London, May 5.—Fifteen years' trial of a strange system of land reform in the little village of Winterslow, near London, has proved the excellence of the plan.  
In 1899 Major Poore, father of the Duchess of Hamilton, secured possession of the old village and some of its environs and re-established a local government practically identical to that of the Saxons there more than a thousand years ago. At the beginning of the experiment the major chose for the personnel of the scheme persons noted more for industry than for wealth.  
A Saxon village hundred was chosen and the primitive legislature allotted land to heads of families under contracts whereby the payment for the land could be extended over a period from fifty to one hundred years. These plots surrounded a large common which belongs to the village, the grazing right of which is held in perpetuity by the villagers.  
The village is now a self-sustaining community, and what was started as more or less of a charity has proved successful commercially. All of the villagers are free men in the old Saxon sense of the term, and the social and political life of the place is based on the assumption of equality. The promoters have been chary of publicity for fear the plan might not succeed, but since success has been assured they have invited the leaders of the government land reform schemes to inspect the community.

## To Foster Imperialism.

## Shooting Accident.

Last night a marconigram was received in the city from Cape Race to which place it was communicated from Heath Point wireless station, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, telling of a terrible shooting accident that occurred on Wednesday last. The Marconi operators were shooting when one of them named Keating accidentally discharged his gun. The barrel of the firearm was pointing towards an operator named Peak who was standing near. The charge entered Peak's face and head. One of his eyes was completely blown out, his face shattered and disfigured while other injuries of a more or less serious character were received. The victim was in a dying condition and there was no doctor to be had. Keating, his companion, reported what had happened by wireless to the Allan Liner Victorian, which was bound from Montreal to Liverpool. Immediate assistance was asked for and the Victorian's captain altered the course of his ship and hurried her to Heath Point, landing a doctor to treat the wounded operator. The Victorian remained there all Wednesday night. The next morning the condition of the patient was about the same, there being no signs whatever of improvement. He was then taken on board the steamer which left without further delay for her destination.  
The Captain of the Liner is deserving of universal approbation for his kind-hearted and humane act, and justly so, because if he had continued his course there is but little doubt that the unfortunate operator would have succumbed to his injuries.

Spain To Build Fleet of Warships.  
Madrid, May 8.—Admiral Miranda, minister of marine, yesterday tabled a bill providing for an annual credit of \$7,200,000 over a period of nine years to be used exclusively in the building of warships. **Full Reparation.**

The capture of Tampico has now made the Constitutionalists of Mexico more amenable to Great Britain for such outrages as the murder of Benton. Great Britain has now an objective against which she can strike if the efforts of the United States to secure full reparation fails. What the American tars and ships have done at Vera Cruz against the Federalists, the English tars and ships can do against the Constitutionalists at Tampico. It will be seen that Sir Edward Grey has intimated that full reparation will be exacted when the responsibility is placed for it. As soon as Villa's party establishes themselves in ports, they render themselves amenable to the persuasive influence of British guns. In the past the main immunity of the Federalists from such influences was that their fastnesses were established inland where ship's guns could not talk.

**The Work of the Committee.**

In referring to our article of yesterday on the work of the Disasters Committee, the editor of the Daily News, Hon. J. A. Robinson, who is Honorary Secretary to the Committee, furnishes facts from the official records which are of public interest. The Executive Committee has held 18 meetings, obtained responsible reports

of 208 cases, and considered them. The sum of \$4,500 has been distributed in temporary help to 208 cases. In three cases assistance was declined; and in about 12 cases there are no dependants. Further information is being sought in 12 cases. Since the last meeting reports on 35 cases have been received and they will be taken up for consideration to-morrow. In every case the report has been furnished by a clergyman or a magistrate and at the request of the committee. All assistance has been furnished either through a clergyman or a magistrate. In no case has a case of need been allowed to stand over for 24 hours. As to the Southern Cross 12 men sailed in other men's names. About four there is still uncertainty. The committee undoubtedly deserve the thanks of the community for the whole-souled way they have taken up their voluntary work of humanity, and particularly does this apply to the Hon. Treasurer, Hon. R. Watson, and the Hon. Secretary, Hon. J. A. Robinson, on whom the burden of the work has fallen.

**Fishery Delayed.**

Herring are now reported plentiful at Connaigre and at many places in Placentia Bay. Practically all the vessels have obtained bait, and it is generally hoped that they will secure good fares, as the catch to date is much below that of last year. The shore fishermen are also impeded in the season's operations by the backward weather of late, and the fishing season is consequently delayed all over the island. In a few weeks more the caplin will be expected, while to date very little has been done with the herrings.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Tampico's fall, considerably enlarging the constitutionalists' sphere of control and giving to them a seaport through which munitions of war may be directly imported, injected into Mexican situation to-day several new phases to occupy the attention of official Washington. Secretary Bryan was giving much attention to the status of foreign Oil Operatives in the country surrounding Tampico. The British Ambassador and the Netherlands Minister, after a long conference at the State Department, left expressing satisfaction at the outcome of the meeting. It is understood that satisfactory assurance received as to the safety of workmen and tanks removed for the present any danger of foreign complications on that score. Another phase of the situation that attracted much attention was the embarrassment which success brings to the Constitutionalists in the form of demands for compensation for losses to foreigners within their sphere of influence which foreign Governments are presenting with increasing force, the further constitutionalists establish themselves as responsible masters of Northern Mexico. The Spanish Ambassador called at State Department to see what could be done for 800 Spaniards ejected by Constitutionalists from Torreon. He also has a bill to present for \$20,000,000 worth of Spanish owned cotton, alleged to have been confiscated by Constitutionalists at Torreon. The case of William S. Benton, British subject killed at Juarez, also looms threateningly on the Constitutional horizon. Great Britain has announced that it will exact adequate reparation for this event as soon as responsibility can be fixed upon the authorities, from whom such reparation can be demanded.

**Cable News.**

Special to Evening Telegram.  
VERA CRUZ, May 14.  
Tampico's fall has hastened the doom of Huerta, and the Constitution is now in complete possession of the north. The scene of the civil war is now transferred to the South. The rebels are boasting that they will drive Huerta from power within a month. With the capture of Tampico they have gained a seaport that will be of vast advantage to them, and through Tampico they expect to gain the munitions of war, which were cut off by the renewal of the American embargo. The federal forces led by General Zaragoza, suffered terrible losses, at least 5,000 being killed or taken prisoners, while 2,000 are said to have made their escape on a Mexican Central train which had been made up in preparation for the evacuation. It is estimated that 2,000 rebels fell in the grand assault on the town, after the artillery had battered a great hole in the fortifications of the city. There is little prospect of the Federals who fled from Tampico being able to make good their escape. The railroad is cut at Cardenas, and at that point the 2,000 Federals have taken to the jungle to escape. A large force of rebels is believed to be there, and they will be unable to make their way through the jungle in that direction.

PORT AU PRINCE, May 14.  
The Haytian Government has received no offers from financiers concerning a coaling station at St. Nicholas, and the Government is not disposed to grant such a privilege, if the request were made.

LOUISVILLE, May 14.  
More than 1,000 hogheads of tobacco were burned here to-day in a fire that destroyed the warehouse of the Louisville Tobacco Company. The loss will reach \$250,000. One fireman was killed and another crushed under a falling wall.

MANILLA, May 14.  
Twenty business-houses were burned to-day. Loss, half a million dollars.

NEW YORK, May 14.  
A notable collection of jewels valued at a million dollars, including the famous Nordica pearl, is disposed of by Madame Nordica in her will. Some of the details became known to-day. Her other property amounts to several hundred thousand dollars. Her husband, George W. Young, a New York broker, and her three sisters, it is understood, are the chief legatees. Nordica's body is expected to arrive in New York about June 25th.

BERLIN, May 14.  
The report that Germany is seeking a coaling station in Haiti, or attempting to obtain control, or influence over the republic by financial or other means, or desire to obtain supremacy there, is without foundation. This assertion is made here to the press, whose informant says that such report can only be the outcome of malice, that it is prejudicial and ought to be contradicted without delay.

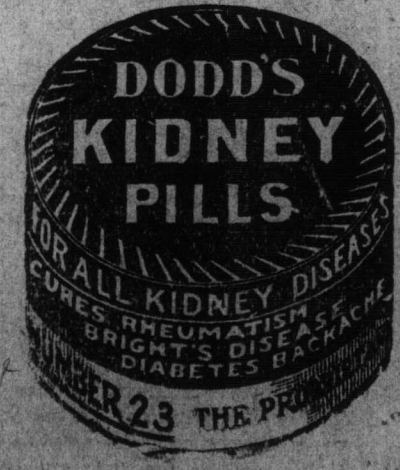

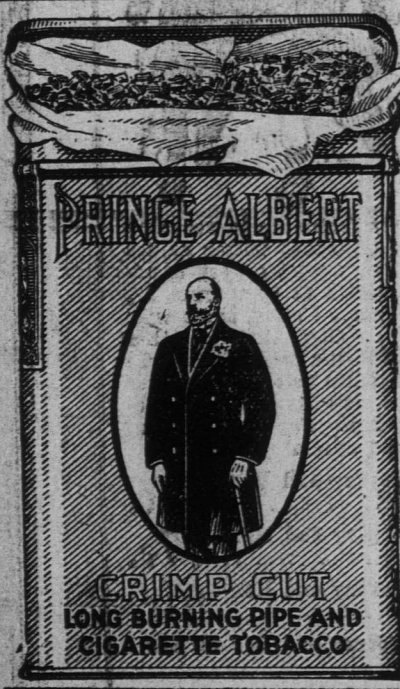
