





Barred From The Feast.

(From. the Boston Transcript.) The exchange of telegrams between King George and President Poincare about Shakespeare is a picturesque proof that even in the midst of the roar of the guns at Verdun and Dixmude, the French and British nations can turn aside to celebrate a "literary" event. The significance of Shakespeare to England is well known to all the world. What was his significance to France? President Poincare comends him because he has "made France familiar with the eternal soul of a friendly people." This is a fine phrase, and true, for Shakespeare is a searchlight upon the soul of his own nation. But it is probable that France nation. But it is probable that France has never derived very much from Shakespeare directly. He is not gay enough, and may be said to be too dreamy, too northern, for the French comprehension. That is not the case with the German people, who have, through Schlegel's amazing translation, probably the greatest success in all literature in the transferrence of all literature in the transferrence of an author's works from one language to another, made Shakespeare their own. Out of this privilege, as well as out of their life and joy for many years, the German people have been cheated by the Prussian military cabal. 'Tis true, and pity 'tis 'tis true!



Sergt. Trynor, V. C

THE O'LEARY OF N. B., TELLS HIS STORY.

Saved Ten Lives Under Heavy German

Sergt. John H. Trynor, V. C., the Sergt. Michael O'Leary of New Brunswick, has just left after a brief visit. He won the Victoria Cross during the present war, with the famous Black Watch, and has, as well, a

South African medal with four clasps. Trynor was born in New Brunswick and at the age of three was removed to Maine with his parents. Shortly after the outbreak of the war he left his home in Maine, accompanied by several former Canadians and

Ho was a member of the engineer corps and went through the battle of the Marne and other terrible engage-

His story of how he won the cov-

eted cross is as follows: "It was a bright day, and I was in charge of eleven men. We were sending a sap toward the German lines,

which were some 480 yards away. "All went well at first, and we were about half way across 'No Man's Land' when suddenly a big high-explosive shell from one of the German batteries fell short and exploded directly over the end of our sap. In an instant we were tangled up and un-

covered to the German rifle fire. "I was the only man in the bunch who could navigate. I had my left arm badly injured, but I managed to get a man on my back and lug him into our own trenches. I wasn't the weak looking man you see me now. I weighed 180 pounds then and was as

strong as a horse. "Well, when I got to our own trenches here lay ten poor devils behind me, helpless under the fire of the German rifles. I started back and got a second one on my back; the Germans brought a heavy fire to bear upon us. We got in, but on getting into my own trench I found that the man on my back had been shot while I was carrying him. Well, to make a long story short I made ten trips and brought in all the fellows who were out there, but in the ten trips the Ger-

mans got me eight times." Sergt. Trynor's left arm is a mass of scars, where a shell splinter caught him. He wears a silver plate in his head where his skull has been fractured. Twice was he shot in the abdomen and once through the chest. The third finger of the right hand was also shot off. A second man was killed on his back while he had his comrades and a third shot through ed on his back while he was rescuing the foot.

Conscription of Wealth.

London Chronicle:-Conscription of wealth for the needs of war is no novelty in England. The advisers of Richard II. for a time financed their adventures in France by the aid of a poll tax, ingeniously devised-in the first experiments-to fall upon the richer classes. In 1377 the levy was graduated from one groat on the labourer to £6 13s. 4d. on a duke. Judges paid £5 each; earls, countesses, and the richer mayors. £4: barons. bannerets, aldermen, and large merchants. £2: knights and mayors of small towns, £1 down to 3s. 4d. Thus the fourteenth century Englishman had evolved a system by which the rich man paid in some instances as much as 40 or 50 times more than his poorer neighbor. But the later poll tax that led to the Great Revolt was. as we know, not happy in the results. It shed the principal of graduation, and "the number of people who got off with a payment of 4d. or 6d. was comparatively few."

Blockade Rules From United States.

New York Press:—We have from the allies their defense of the blockade of enemy country and, as the Press has predicted repeatedly, their case is based almost entirely on the precedents laid down by the United States in the Civil War. The right of a belligerent to vise and even re-'strict the importations of a neutral, if that neutral seemed certain to pass them on to the blockaded belligerent, was insisted upon by the United States in the cases of Nassau and Matamoras and acquiesced in by England. It was not relished, but the British maritime authorities were far seeing enough to realize that the rule would be useful to them as the foremost sea power at some future time. That time has
