NOT QUITE CLEAR. Responding to a demand from the military authorities, the Military Service Council has decided to call up for service men in the Medical Category. Under the Military Service Act, Category B men are liable for overseas, but not for combatant service, and they are being called out because of the necessity for securing more men for railway construction and similar work which has arisen, and it has therefore become necessary to draft all men in medical category B in respect of whom no other grounds for exemption exist. 





British Holds German Advance.

STUBBORN FIGHTING.

LONDON, March 29.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—A despatch from British headquarters says that yesterday and last evening along an extended front the Germans obtained further gains to the south of the Somme and slight gains to the east and southeast of Arras; but our troops battling gallantly hurled back the invaders with heavy losses along the greater part of the line. The enemy have continued to make the geratest effort south of the Somme where the English and the French are fighting stubbornly side by side. Last night assaults in the extreme northern and southern parts of the battle zone were continuous. The German scheme to swing their lines into Albert and thereby possibly enable their attempt to envelop Amiens is obvious. LONDON, March 29.

BIG VICTORY IN MESOPOTAMIA.

LONDON, March 28. (Official.)

A highly successful operation was carried out by our aroops operating on the Euphrates, northwest of Hit, which resulted in the capture or destruction of virtually the entire Turkish force in that area. Our columns advanced to take the Turkish positions about Kran Bagdad, 22 miles northwest of Hit. Our cavalry made a wide movement round the Turkish position to Aleppo in the rear of the enemy. By nightfall the enemy's main positions north of Kran Bagdad had been carried by assault. The main body of the enemy attempting to break to the northwest was intercepted by our cavalry and repulsed with heavy losses. So far, it has been reported, about 3,000 prisoners have been taken, including the divisional commander, two regimental commanders, about two hundred Turk-LONDON, March 28. (Official.)

s ish officers, one German officer and a few German non-coms. In addition two thousand rifles, many machine guns, six hundred animals and a quantity of other booty have been taken. Pursuit of the remaining fugitives has already been carried beyond Haditai, 45 miles northwest of His. Our casualties were very slight. Hit is on the Euphrates River, one hundred miles west of Bagdad. The town was evacuated by the Turks on March 9th.






