



Generally speaking, a busy man icks up a newspaper and glances through it, running over the headlines and reading only those stories whose headlines promise interest. to him, perhaps giving some moments to the editorials and sporting news and Stock Market, going through some of the advertisements that happen to attract him, and then putting aside the paper with the feeling that he knows everything it coutains.

His wife does pretty much the same thing, except she devotes much more attention than her spouse to the vital paragraphs of the society page and often persues every advertisement in the paper from the first word of the first to the last word of the last.

It is not often, however, that the average newspaper reader takes in more than a few of those intensely interesting and curious little items that fill interstices in practically every issue of every newspaper of any size and that are referred to in the older newspaper shops under the general head of "miscellany."

Hidden among articles on the President's illness and the cost of living and the troubles in Italy and local accidents and the price of Liberty Bonds and commercial davelopment items and World's Series stories are the tiny two and three line "fillers" on every conceivable subject, waiting for the imaginative and curious soul to find in their neglected letters a gold mine of romance and

In one issue of the Evening Post, for example, three tiny items included information such as that Duluth has the longest ore dock in the world, that cock fighting was known to the Greeks and Romans, when and where buttons were invented, how a new type of phone sounder works, how many Soy beans the United States imports from Manchuria, that Akron has established a shaveteria, what new ideas experts are presenting to beekeepers, that bootblack parlors are being introduced in London, where the oldest bells in the United States hang and from when they date, that the tomb of Confucius lies in the province of Shantung, that Bueyrus, O., reported snowfall on Aug. 31, that Amsterdam, Holland, elected five women to the City Council. when silk gloves are proper and when kid or leather, to what extent British stocks have depreciated since the signing of the armistice, concerning a man in a large mill city who earns money by going from house to house each morning waking up the mill girls, how much a wife costs in Uganda, and how much a Kaffir lady is worth, who is credsted with having invented ice cream, the percentage of steam tonnage now controlled by the United States, the date of the earliest English newspaper, the same prices of a chair of Washington or Jefferson and a bed of King Edward VII., consideration of an antigambling statute Chihuahua, Mexico, the establishment of a complete houseboat village in Portland, O., how the movies get their "gore," note of a movement for more pay for women Government employees, and a few other items.

Yet there is hardly an atem in the list that could not be expanded into an article or a column or more and made of as much interest as almost anything else in the newspaper of that date. To the person who reads with imagination—and time-expansion of such items is unnecessary .- Charleston Evening Post.

Three thousand pounds over the ounter, and not, as usual, through a bank! The clerk remembered how a solicitor had, in the unclaimed divilends department, applied for £8,000 standing in the name of Miss Slack, of Northampton, of whose death proof had been lodged; how he had refused to take notes, but asked for the whole amount in gold; how a clerk was so much tickled at the idea of somebody walking off with 130lb. in his pockets that he related the incident to some visitors; and how one of the party stated that he knew Miss Slack, who was, in fact, still alive!

Gone at once was the audacity he had displayed in a long series of frauds. He immediately admitted his guilt and subsequently gave a full account of his amazingly daring and skilful operations.

VIOLENT FIGHTING IN RUHR REG-ION OF GERMANY.

ESSEN. Germany, March 23. The local executive council to-day announced that the entire industrial region hereabouts is in the hands of the Government. revolutionary workmen, and that the Red Army of fifty thousand is victoriously advancing on Weisel, where the last remnants of regular troops are concentrated. The Ruhr Echo announces that the left wing of the army's front stretches from Dirslaken, twenty-four miles from Dusseldorf, through Holten to Dorsten, thirty-five miles southwest of Muenster. Violent fighting is still progressing on this front. Dorsten and Valsum have been taken by the Reds with nine hundred prisoners, the newspaper adds, and a general advance is in progress towards Weisel. In the vicinity of Haltem an armored train on the way to the industrial region from Muenster was halted by the blowing up of a stretch of roadbed. The general military situation, it is declared is favor-

able to revolutionaries.

COAL STRIKE IN PROSPECT. LONDON, March 23. Another strike of miners appeared to-night to be in prospect. After the recent Trades' Union Congress rejected the proposal of direct action to attain nationalization of the mines, the miners made a demand for an increase of fifteen shillings weekly in wages in order to bring independent pressure on the Government. Negotiations with Premier Lloyd George and the coal controller have resulted in the demand of the miners being rejected. The latter will meet in conference to morrow to determine upon their future course of action.

When the Shah Saw Radium.

mysteries of modern science—is so little familiar to unscientific men that the panic of the Oriental mentioned here is easily understood.

Once, while in Paris, the Shah of Persia expressed a wish to know the Curies, husband and wife, fam-The French authorities made the necessary arrangements. Complete darkness is of course needed if radium is to reveal itself in all its brilliancy. After endless trouble the authorities finally persuaded the monarch to descend into one of the hotel cellars that had been arranged for the purpose, and His Majesed for the purpose, and His Majesty, with all his suite, proceeded to the underground apartment. Professor Curie closed the door, switched off the electric light, and uncovered his specimen of radium. A shout of terror between the roar of a lion and the yell of a man being murdered rang out, and was echoed

by a hundred others. Amid general excitement and consternation the French authorities hastened to the electric switches, and turned on the lights. Then they beheld a strange spectacle. In the midst of the prostrate Persians. with his arms around the neck of his grand vizier, and his round pupils dilated to their very rims, stood the Shah, shouting at the top of his voice in Persian:

"Come away! Come away!" The switching on of the light calmed his mad terror as if by magic. Realizing the disappointment and chagrin he had caused Monsieur Curie the Shah tried to recompense him by the offer of a decoration. But the austere man of science declined it.



Tales of Mme. Tussaud's.

When John Burns Struck a Bargain

Few children, perhaps, are so simple to-day as the little girl who, when taken some years ago to the famous waxworks of Mme. Tussaud, whispered to her mother, as she glanced down the long array of lifelike effigies, "How are they killed before they are stuff-

The most amazing fact, however, in the story of Tussaud's is that its founder, when a young girl and working as a wax modeller with her uncle, was forced during the French Revolution to mould heads of victims of the guillotine. Louis XVI. and Marie Antoinette, Robespierre, Danton, and the beautiful Charlotte Corday were all modelled by Mme. Tussaud after their heads were no longer theirs.

It is her great-grandson, Mr. John Tussaud, who tells the story in "The Romance of Mme. Tussaud."

Long before the waxworks became so famous and popular Mme. Tussaud had come to this country, which she toured, modelling celebrities as she went. Her enterprise and originality

were remarkable. One of the earliest visitors to the Portman Rooms, where the exhibition was first staged, was the Duke of Wellington. A few years later he was seen one morning with bared head reverent ly inspecting the effigy of his great adversary lying in state. Mme. Tussaud saw her opportunity at once, and the group now forms one of their best

It was a Cambridge don who suggested the "Chamber of Horrors," which was originally known as the Dead Room. The more popular name was bestowed by 'Punch' many years later, and the Chamber provides Mr. Tussaud with some of his most interesting recollections.

One of his grim memories is of Marwood, the hangman who succeeded the famous Calcraft. Marwood, after he had sat for his model, would often visit the Chamber of Horrors to see some of his old acquaintances, around whose necks he had so delicately adjusted the fatal noose. He would stop before each one with a grim look, while his lips moved tremulously.

"Put me there," he once said, after he had given a sitting. It was a man choosing the site of his grave.

Stories of the comments of visitors to the exhibition are legion. One, told by Lady Bland-Sutton, concerns a little girl who, when asked where she would like to go for a treat, promptly replied. "To Mme. Tussaud's."

"But you went there last year." was objected. "Oh, yes, I know," said the child, but father wasn't in the Chamber of

Horrors then.' She must have been a relative of the parlourmaid who told her mistres that she always went to Mme. Tussaud's on her "day off," and added: "You see, having an uncle in the Chamber of Horrors gives the plac a family interest, so to speak."

Mr. Tussaud, by the way, again contradicts the apparently immortal legend that a sum of money, ranging from £5 to £5,000, awaits anyone who will spend a night alone in the Chamber of Horrors.

No such ridiculous challenge was ever issued to the public, says Mr Tussaud; but he is not hopeful that even that flat disclaimer will overtake the chimerical story of a reward.

Talking of famous sitters, Mr. Tussaud says that it was always his aim to secure the sitter's own clothes for a model, and in this connection he tells an amusing story of John Burns, whom he modelled during the great Dock Strike. Mr. Tussaud asked the dockers' champion, at the time of the sitting, to part with the suit he was

Mr. Burns demurred at first, and then it appeared that he had an extremely good reason for doing so. It was the only suit he possessed, and we agreed that I should have it as soon as I provided him with a new one to take its place.

Mr. Burns, adds Mr. Tussaud, told the story of the transaction in reply to a heckler at a public meeting, who asked: "Where did you get that suit?" "I got it," said Mr. Burns frankly, "from Mme. Tussaud's. When my portrait was put in the exhibition you may have noticed that it was wearing my old suit. 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


