It is about time that favoritism were quashed. Any man who transgresses the law is open to penalty, be he big or little. the case under discussion both the spirit and letter of the Customs Act has been broken. And yet the Government hesitates to proceed. If there is one Statutory Law more than another that has long been held in respect, it is that governing the Customs, and to permit a gross and palpable violation of that Act to be glossed over, is a crime and the Acting Minister of Customs will brand himself as a criminal if he allows such a violation to go unpunished. To quote his own organ he has no "gumption" if he does not carry out the law. The Minister of Justice may be pardoned for unthinkingly stating that he would have done the same in Pike's case, but at the same time his position as the highest legal authority in the land, suffers because of this expression made in the House of Assembly. Cattle, horses and sheep are raised in considerable numbers, and large quantities of fish-chiefly cod and herring-are taken from the neighboring waters.

Through Iceland has an extensive area, for all practical purposes it might just as well be only a seventh its actual size. Although Europeans emigrated to Ireland about seven hundred years before Old World colonies were established in the now famed North America, only the valleys and lowlands near the coast of the island have ever been developed. This is not because of a lack of energy on the part of the hardy Scandinavians who settled this island, but because the interior, comprising about sixsevenths of the total area, is a waste

The island is approximately 200 miles wide and 300 miles long, but hardly a habitation can be found more than forty miles from salt water. There are no railroads and few carriage roads. The inhabitants depend almost entirely on water tion along the coast and in the many fiords.

Iceland can be considered the halfway station between Europe and America. Nearly 700 years before Columbus sailed to the West Indies through the warm south Atlantic in his relatively large decked ships, daring Scandinavian sea rovers in their open boats passed from Norway to Iceland and from there to the coasts of Maine and Rhode Island.



town, they could be given running powers over the Newfoundland Railway from Bishop's Falls to Millertown Junction. On the Bonavista Branch there would be a tri-weekly, instead of daily, service each way, and the same would apply to the Lewisporte Branch. No service would be run between Bishop's Falls and Humbermouth, but between Humbermouth and Port aux Basques a tri-weekly service would be operated. Communication could be kept up with the West Coast via Argentia.

Some such restrictions on the full schedule must be introduced if the Railway is expected to nearly balance receipts and expenditure in the winter months. Of course, it would entail timely warning to those who were likely to be isolated during the winter months so that they could lay in the necessary winter supplies. The advent of the Branch Railways altered the peoples' mode of living during the winter. Formerly, they laid in sufficient supplies in the fall to last to the opening of navigation, as is the practice still on such portions of the sea board as are ice bound during the winter months, but as soon as the Branch Railways were built they stopped taking them in and have become more and more dependent on the railway for daily and weekly supplies. Hence when a snow blockade takes place it becomes imperative upon the Railway Company to make every effort to keep the railway open in order to avoid distress and hunger. It is unfair to ask the railway operators to meet conditions like these that could be so readily avoided, and due notice should be given in October of each year that these branch railways will not be kept open after the snow appears. When it is considered that a snow fighting gang can easily cost between \$200 and \$300 per day for wages alone, not to mention about the same amount for fuel and food, it can readily be seen that it would take a heavy traffic of freight and passengers to offset the expenditure; but such volume of traffic is concertain recommendations as regards spicuously absent in the winter
