The Herald's Imaginary Grievances. 'The Herald, having failed to tell us what it means by calling the Gover. It nor-General a "bloated aristocrat," it now seeks to over up its insult to Her Mayesty's representative by tak-ing a new tack, and endeavouring to evoke a little sympathy among the indignant Conservatives by another prolonged whine over the loss of the Clerk of the Peace's advertaing. This was the Tory way of getting tenders and answering contracts, and yet the Herald talks about principle ! The less it says on that score the better. The Herald calls the attention of the ratepayers in the County to its version of the story, and we would also ask their special attention to the above statement of facts, which we are prepared to prove. It talks loudly about justice and fairness; we ask at and the public if we got justice and fairness in this matter from its pet Government and its officials. The less it says about these things the better, else we may let the light into a few more of the questionable doings of its friends. 
