WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 26.—Yesterday the case of Emmanuel Myers, who attempted to murder his wife in Jackson, and who was apprehended here on Wednesday, came up before Magistrate Bartlet. Information was submitted by Chief of Pelice Bains charging Myers with assault with intent to kill. He at first seemed exceedingly combative, but after a while weakened and signed an acknowledgment to the effect that he would voluntarily accompany the Michigan officers to Detroit. He made the condition, which was strictly observed, that he should not be handcuffed and should not be taken across the river in charge of Chief of Police Winney of Jackson. The health of the immigrants has been very good. There has been an almost entire absence of illness, and the doctor's services at "The Sheds" has been a sinceure. A few wero sick on arriving, from the sea-voyage and railway traveling, but a little care and good homely nourishing food soon put them all right. all right.

Mr. Sheehan, a genial Irishman, superintends the cooking department. He is employed by the Ontario Government, and a very busy time of it he sometimes has. Sealair and long railway journeys sharpen the appetite, and as the emigrant trains have a knack of arriving late at night or early in the morning, there is plenty of occupation for the cook and his staff. The dining hall, as seen yesterday, was a picture of neatness and cleanliness. The tables are covered with marbled oilcloth and a general air of comfort pervaded the place. One hundred and sixty persons can dine at the same time, the hours being: Breakfast, 7.30, dinner 2.30, supper 5 o'clock. As a rule not more than a day or night is spent in the sheds, and the utmost care is taken to see that the decencies and proprieties of life are observed by the immigrants. The sanitation of the sheds is good. They are all well ventilated, and a new drain passes through the property. The closets are detached from the boarding and sleeping departments. There is ample ground for exercise and "air-taking" in a field at the rear of the sheds which extends to the railway line.






