Cats Which Yielded Over 74 Bushels to

Ottawa, Nov. 24.-Prof. Saunders, irector of Experimental Farms, has had a precis made of the results of this year's crops grown at the Central Experimental Farm. Fifty-eight varieties of oats have been tested and the yield has averaged well. The heaviest eturns have been had from the varieties known as Banner and Abundance, ments. the former of which has yielded 74 bushels 4 pounds per acre; the latter

2 bushels 8 pounds. Of fall wheat 32 varieties have been grown and the largest crop has been given by the Dawson's Golden Chaff, which yielded 45 bushels 20 pounds

of barley, there have been 60 varieties in all under test, 31 of which were two-rowed sorts and 29 six-rowed. Of the two-rowed varieties, the most pro-lific sort this year was the Sidney, a new hybrid produced at the farm by crossing one of the two-rowed varie-ties with a six-rowed, which gave 43 bushels 16 pounds per acre. The heavi-est yielder among the six-rowed sorts was the Mensury, which gave a crop of 58 bushels 16 pounds per acre; followed by the Petschora, Royal and Success, which gave respective yields of 51 bushels 42 pounds, 51 bushels 12 pounds and 51 bushels 12 pounds.

MEDICAL EVIDENCE COMPLETEDS

A Witness Who Swears That the Weight Would Come Off.

J. H. McMillan Tells a Nice Story That is Contradicted by the Casings of the Weight Shaft Shown in Court and Fares Badly at the Hands of the Eminent Mr. Osler-Other Witnesses Who Testify as to the Condition of the Elevator-A Resume of the Case as it Has Progressed

The third week of the greatest criminal trial in the history of Canada has closed, and though the details of the case are being placed before the public for the fourth time in ten months. the interest evinced is as great as when, in February last, The World unearthed the alleged crime and published the series of articles which led to the arrest of Harry Place and Dal-

las Theodore Hyams, upon the charge of having murdered Willie Wells.

When the present trial opened on Nov. 5, certain journals predicted for it a speedy termination, stating as the ground of the prophecy that the Crown's case had been greatly weakened, while the defence had gathered corresponding strength. As every one knows, the prediction has utterly falted of fulfilment, 17 days having already elapsed since the trial began, with every prospect that the statement made by The World more than two weeks ago will be borne out, that it would be near the first of December before the jury had passed decision upon the evidence and announced the fate of the twins. The Crown's Difficulties.

The fact that 14 days were necessary to place the evidence for the prosecution before the jury is in itself a weakness to their case, which the Crown officers appreciated, but could not avoid. The fact that almost three not avoid. The fact that almost three years have elapsed since the life of Willie Wells was cruelly crushed out with the massive iron weight in the fatal warehouse basement enhances the difficulties a Crown officer always encounters in fastening the guilt of crime upon those whose hands are stained with the life-blood of their fellow man if the Hyams twins are to secure the insurance they had placed upon his life, in planning to give that death every appearance of accicrime, and in the schemes to which they resorted to obtain possession of the blood-money after their victim had been laid away in his grave, they dis-played a diabolical cunning and inplayed a diabolical cunning and ingenuity the parallel of which the records of present day crime present only in that cold-blooded, double-distilled villain, H. H. The Testimony That Never Appeared.

Probably no murder trial in the history of Canada has been marked with such repeated and persistent objection on the part of the defence to evidence offered by the prosecution, and it is remarkable, moreover, that the decisions of His Lordship upon every question. given by the Dawson's Golden Chaff, which yielded 45 bushels 20 pounds per acre. The Betence's New Witnesses.

Since the opening of the present trial rumors have been rife of new and sensational evidence for the defence. If the testimony of the three new witnesses who were called on Saturday is any criterion of what is to come, the prosecution have every reason to be thankful to the defence for putting them in the witness box. All agreed on the antiquated pattern, loose construction and unsafe character of the elevator, but none of them told of a single accident that ever occurred, except to an ill-fated cat that went to sleep at the foot of the weight shaft. The first of these witnesses, Shipp, was so overcome by the novelty of the situation in which he found himself he became too much confused to tell a coherent story; the second, Mr. Brimsmead, strengthened the Crown's case when he said that in taking the hook off the weight and putting it on again he had been compalled to use a harm. off the weight and putting it on again he had been compelled to use a hammer, while the story of the third contained nothing except the character of the elevator as already referred to. 
