

Tax Reform in the United States.

Evidence of the extending interest taken in the matter of taxation reform is shown by the extensive proposals in that direction submitted to-day in the states of Oregon and Missouri. In Missouri an amendment to the constitution will be voted upon dividing all property hitherto subject to taxation into three classes. The first includes all personal property, which, in the case of bonds and public securities of the state, its political sub-divisions and municipalities now or hereafter issued, are to be exempt from all state and local taxes from and after the adoption of the amendment. All other personal property will also become exempt from taxation in the year 1914 and thereafter, but power is reserved to tax any form of franchise, privilege

or inheritance. The second class of property includes all improvements in or on lands except those on lands now exempt. In 1914 and 1915 property in this class will be exempted to the extent of one fourth of the assessed value of improvements; in 1916 and 1917 to the extent of two-fourths in 1918 and 1919 to the extent of three-fourths. In and after 1920 all improvements to the extent of \$3000 on homesteads will be altogother Class three includes all exempt. lands in the state, independent of


Mourning for the Dead.

Distribution of Seed Grain and Potatoes From the Dominion Experimental Farms, 1912-1913.

By instructions of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution of superior sorts of grain and potatoes will be made during the coming winter and spring to Canadian farmers. The samples for general distribution will consist of spring wheat (5 lbs.), white oats (4 lbs.), barley (5 lbs.), and field peas (5 lbs.). These will be sent out from Ottawa. A distribution of potatoes (in 3 lb. samples) will be carried on from several of the experimental farms, the Central Farm at Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ottawa supplying only the provinces of Ontario and Quebec. All samples will be sent free, by mail.

be sent free, by mail. Applications must give particulars in regard to the soil on their farms, and some account of their experience with such kinds of grain (or potatoes) as they have grown, so that a promising sort for their conditions may be selected. Each application must be separate and must be signed by the applicant. Only one sample of grain and of potatoes can be sent to each farm. Applications on any kind of printed form cannot be accepted. If two or more samples are asked for in the same letter only one will be sent. will be sent.

will be sent. As the supply of seed is limited, far-mers are advised to apply early; but the applications will not necessarily be filled in the exact order in which they are received. Preference will always be given to the most thoughtful and explicit requests. Applications received after requests. Applications received after the end of January will probably be too

FRUIT DISTRICT. By W. H. Porter, Government Agricultural Expert for Lambton.

LAMBTON COUNTY AS A

tural Expert for Lambton. In this age of real estate boom and land speculation one has acquired the habit of glancing only casually or with suspicion at articles written concerning localities and districts. Without any consideration, we pronounce them at once the finished product of some pub-licity employee or the effulgent offerings of a class of verbose land agents. Not a few over credulous investors have been shorn of their surplus dollars by shears in the hands of these agencies, but it has tended to educate interested parties to assure themselves of certain conditions, favorable and unfavorable, which go to make districts objectable or desirable. When examining a locality and look-ing into its conditions and possibilities relative to fruit growing one must take into consideration soil, locality, climate and markets and when these are all con-ducive to the production of an article of the highest quality success then depends upon an ordinary amount of intelligence on the part of the grower, a lack of which. Tambton County has been very modest in divertising her adaptibility for fruit growing. For many years a few fruit growing. For many years a few fruit growers have been production of small fruits in the county bing small they did not have to seek a market abroad and consequently little was head of Lambton as a fruit producing county. In time farmers began to see that their soil was similar to that producing the best kind of divit; planting became general and to day plantations of forty to fifty acress and first ; planting became general and to day plantations of forty to fitty acress and the northern part of the county has porten into long clothes as a fruit pro-ducing area. A closer examination of conditions will prove that it is not confidence misplaced. this age of real estate boom and

A closer examination of conditions will prove that it is not confidence misplaced. Soil, climate, laud and water are so Soil, climate, land and water are so favorably adjusted as to make conditions ideal. In the north, which is the fruit area proper, the soil varies from loam with gravelly subsoil to straight sand and gravel which is known as the "indge." Peach trees do exceptionally well on this formation and during the first two or three yrars of growth beans are grown between the trees. They yield at the rate of twenty-five bushels per acre and more than repay all expenses at the rate of twenty-hve bushels per acre and more than repay all expenses connected with the trees until they mon-opolize the land. Tobacco is another crop which repays well in inter tilling, and growers claim that at 12c, per pound they can get remunerative returns from their young orchard land. Since the advent of the canning factories tomato culture is becoming popular. Early

advent of the canning factories tomato culture is becoming popular. Early tomatoes are most profitable for they are sold \$1.50 to \$1.75 per 11 quart basket and then the later pickings are turned over to the factories by the bushel at paying figures. The growth of the young trees and the early age at which they bear fruit is the best testimonial of favorable soil con-ditions. In the orchard of Johnson Bros., Forest, is a tree which in the autumn of 1911, when only five yeors of age, pro-duced fourteen 11 quart baskets of salable peaches. This tree is no better than the average in the ten acre orchard in which average in the ten acre orchard in which it stands. My reason for cling this par-ticular tree is that it was chosen as rep-resentative of the orchard-

resentative of the orchard-To arrive at a clear understanding of climatic conditions it is necessary to ex-plain the geographical position. This geographical situation in favor of the county is not appreciated by those un-familiar with Western Ontario. The second glance at the map will reveal the presence of a large body of water extendsecond glance at the map will reveal the presence of a large body of water extend-ing along the entire length of the uorth-western side of the county. This body of water, Lake Huron, has a remarkable modifying influence on the climate and accounts to a large degree for the absence of extremes in temperature. Actual records show a growing season of 204 days at Sarnia, as against 202 growing days at Hamilton, and Wellaud in the Niagara district where horticulture has Niagara district where horticulture has

CATE, WATFORD, NOVED reached such a development that desir-able land commands a very high figure. The general slope of the land is norther-ly, a particular feature sought by all ex-perienced growers for it retards unsea-sonable growth in early spring and en-sures a greater absence from Injury in winter than where the trees are subjected to the direct rays of the sun. All that has been said relative to soil and climate would avail nothing were there not convenient shipping facilities. Here is where Lambton County is par-ticularly favored. Ontario's population is most dense in the western part which gives Lambton County full advantage in this regard. Further, about half of the population in the county is urban and this augumented by a large summer resort trade along the lake and there makes a large consuming population. Ontario, British Columbia, and the Western States are all making a strong bid for the western market and when the hammer falls it will be found that the locality which can place its produce there with most convenient and least expensive shipping facilities will be the highest bidder. Produce can be gathered in the county in the morning, put aboard boats and shipped at one o'clock enroute to Fort William, Port Arthur and Sault Ste. Marie, where a good market is found, or it can be forwarded to the West much more cheaply than where advantages of the water rates do not exist. By rail direct, the produce is one day's journey nearer the market before it eyen leaves the depot at Forest or Sarnin than are direct, the produce is one day's journey nearer the market before it even leaves the depot at Forest or Sarnia than are Niagara offerings. These are circum-stances that will sway the balance in days of keen competition between large fruit producing districts. I do not wish to speak in a depreci-atory maner of any other locations; my only aim is to explain by comparison actual conditions in Lambton County, and nothing is more reliable than an understanding of conditions substantiat-ed by official records. What has been said will conver no

ed by official records. What has been said will convey no idea of the possibilities of the county. Out of 659,000 acres, over 80,000 acres are suitable for the production of tender fruits and vegetables, and the parts of that now developed, comprise a very small fraction of the whole. With the development of the fruit industry has come an increase in land values. Land which a few years ago was grazing cattle and considered worth Fifty Dollars an acre is now selling at Seventy-five to One Hundred Dollars per acre. At this figure one can profitably start a plantation, for in five yeais he will receive returns from in five years he will receive returns from the trees and in the meantime can be raising early Tomatoes, Tobacco, early Potatoes and Beans, Beans are being Potatoes and Beaus. Beaus are being commonly grown, and an estimate, not of what now can be done but of what is being actually done will not be out of place. Twenty bushels per acre at two dollars per bushel is a very conservative estimate for this year, and yet it returns to the grower forty dollars per acre while his trees are coming to a bearing age. This is one reason why so many business men have made investments in fruit land and it is good reason why we fruit land and it is good reason why we can, without any hesitation, recommend the district to prospective fruit growers. As an iustance of what the orchard itself will do, I will simply refer to the records of a 2½ acre plum orchard inter-planted with Malboro raspberries near the village of Arkona. This orchard is owned by Mr. E. D. Morningstar and it returned



SHATTERED THE MOUNTAIN.

A Volcanio Outburst That Tore Kra-katoa Up by the Roots. The eruption of Krakatoa, in the Sunda strait Aug. 28, 1883, still ranks first among the appalling convulsions of nature.

Krakatoa was a volcanic mountain midway between Sumatra and Java, but it had been inactive since 1680. In the spring of 1883 it began to show signs of activity. On the '26th of August loud explosions were heard, and on the 28th came the eruption that fairly shook the planet.

The eruption was followed by an appalling darkness, with a downpour of mud and sand. Then came a tremendous tidal movement, the water receding and then returning and overwhelming the people on the shores. The tidal wave was fifty feet high.

When investigation became possible it was found that Krakatoa had burst. throwing one part eight miles to the north and hurling the other part completely over Lang island, seven miles to the northeast.

The great mountain was literally torn up by the roots, as was shown by the fact that over the spot where the exploded volcano had stood the sounding line found a depth of 160 fathoms, or 960 feet. Other soundings showed that the bottom of the ocean for miles around had been changed. Islands that had never been seen before appeared and others entirely disappeared.

The damage to human life, done chiefly by the monster tidal waves, has never been definitely estimated, but it is known that at least 100,000 perished. The loss was probably far in excess of that number. Some idea of the force of the ex-

plosion may be had from the fact that the waves that were started by it and driven east and west from the narrow straits, traveled across the oceans and met on the other side of the globe. Indeed, it was proved that these waves crossed at the antipodes and encircled the earth no less than four times before they got back to normal.

Strange as it may seem, the detonation accompanying the explosion was felt 3,000 miles away, while from its very immensity it was almost inaudible to the dwellers in the immediate vicinity.

Wonderful, too, were the meterological phenomena following the dread calamity. The sun did not rise or set in the old familiar way for more than a year after the explosion. The clouds appeared to be touched with strange lurid tints, and the blue of the heavens did not look as it had looked before. The superstitious in all lands felt that the very laws of nature were changing, and some imagined that the world was nearing its end.

The explanation, later on given, was that the queer phenomena were due to the fact that the awful explosion had filled the whole upper atmosphere with thousands of tons of fine dust, which encircled the entire earth and changed the aspect of the heavens .- New York

Uniformity in Canadian Dairy Products.

Products. A few months ago there was held at Ottawa a conference of dairy experts and officials from all parts of the Dominion. The meeting was called by the Honor-able, the Minister of Agriculture for the purpose of endeavoring to perpetuate the uniformity in quality and character of Canadian cheese and butter that has been responsible for the success of Can-adian dairying. As pointed out by the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, who presided over the Conference, many things come up in the practice of dairy-ing over which slight difference of opinion may arise so that it seems desir-able to bring together from time to time those in charge of dairy schools, and the chief instructors, in the various provinces to discuss methods and practices, in order to arrive at some agreement as a body of dairy advisors. The Conference lasted two days during which time many matters of importance were taken up and freely discussed. Some of these were in relation to tuberculosis in hogs, test-ing and grading cream at cream gather-ing creameries, whey butter, methods of paying patrons of cheese factories, and other subjects relating to the production of butter and cheese. For the informother subjects relating to the production of butter and cheese. For the inform-ation of buttermakers and cheesemakers, and others interested in dairying, there has been printed a verbatum report of the proceedings of this Conference. Copies may be procured by applying to the Publications Branch of the Depart-ment of Arrightmen et Ottam. nent of Agriculture, at Ottawa.


