LONDON, June 17.—A terrible calamity involving the death of one hundred and seventy-eight children occurred in the town of Sunderland, in the County of Durham, last evening. From details thus far received, it appears an entertainment had been given in Victoria Hall by a conjurer, which was attended almost altogether by children, hundreds being in attendance.

If he has an extra amount of brain work and comes home with his nervous system all on a stretch, don't try to keep the children quiet. Tell them to make all the noise they can. Tell your father is nothing but an old cross patch, anyway. Atmosphere of the Table. It is impossible to estimate properly the immense influence which is exerted upon a household by the atmosphere of the family table. It is to be noted that one does not come out of a room the same person he went in, the mind ever after retaining the impress of what affected it there, what great results must be achieved from the meeting three times a day in the dining room, from the conversation indulged in, and the sentiments habitually expressed there. A neat, well ordered table is itself a lesson. A neat, well ordered table is itself a lesson to the children. The habit of brooding over our work, and exhausting ourselves by going all over it in our minds, is one to be studiously avoided.
