While I do not wish to hurry you in connection with the operations of the above Commission, may I venture to call to your attention the fact that a delay of two months is provided in the Act within which all applications to the Commission must be lodged.

I would, therefore, like to suggest that the Commission hold at least a preliminary meeting and appoint a Secretary, with whom applications for hearing could be lodged within the statutory delay.

While I have no definite news on the subject, I am hoping that you have seen your way clear to accept, and that is why I am venturing to send this reminder to you. Nearly one-half of the time appointed for the lodging of claims has now expired, and I do not wish the parties to be left with too short a time for the production of their claims after the Commission holds its first formal meeting.

The purpose of this pamphlet is to give in brief form an accurate statement of the position of the Presbyterian Church in Canada after the completion of the vote on Church Union throughout Canada. An endeavor has been made to set out in brief and concise form the information that will make clear the situation in relation to the three Churches which entered the United Church of Canada on June 10, 1925. II.—SUMMARY OF CHURCH UNION VOTE IN CONGREGATIONS IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

In giving any statement of the exact situation of the congregations of the former Presbyterian Church in Canada one has to bear in mind the distinction between "congregations" and "pastoral charges." In the terms of The United Church of Canada Act a congregation means a worshipping unit, or single preaching station, and also a voting unit. Under the provision of the Act the vote on the question of union was taken by CONGREGATIONS and not by charges. In this statement, therefore, the figures dealing with the vote on Church Union must necessarily deal with congregations rather than charges. An attempt, however, has been made to arrange the figures in such a way as to show, both by congregations and charges, the actual situation in the three Churches at the date of the consummation of Union, June 10, 1925.

III.—CHURCH UNION VOTE IN CONGREGATIONS IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

In the self-sustaining charges slightly over twenty-seven per cent. voted non-concurrence. In the aid-receiving charges less than ten per cent. voted non-concurrence.

Of the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada seventeen and one-third per cent. of the congregations voted non-concurrence.

There were 1,412 congregations in self-sustaining charges which remained in union, as against 534 congregations in self-sustaining charges which voted to withdraw as the Presbyterian Church in Canada entered the United Church of Canada. It is interesting also to note that only slightly over thirty per cent. of the whole membership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada voted against entering the United Church, while it is more interesting still to contemplate the vast numbers of those opposing union who accepted the verdict of their Church and loyally followed her into the United Church of Canada.

The total numerical strength of the United Church of Canada is impressive. Into the Church have entered 4,797 congregations of the Methodist Church, 166 congregations of the Congregational Churches, and 3,728 congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, bringing the total on the 10th of June, 1925, to 8,691, as compared with 784 congregations which remained out. As a plain matter of fact a union of three great denominations in Canada has been effected with a loss of less than eight and one-half per cent. of the total congregations, and with a loss of about twelve per cent. of the self-sustaining charges.

Still more striking has been the attitude of the overseas foreign missions fields of the three Churches. Of the 655 missionaries of the uniting Churches on the foreign field on June 10, 1925, there are but seventeen (including men, wives and single women) who are no longer on the staff of the United Church of Canada. In addition to these there are six non-concurring missionaries with their wives, and two single women, who are continuing their work at present under the United Church of Canada.

At the same time the loss to the United Church of Canada of 784 congregations is in every way regrettable. Doubtless other congregations of non-concurrents have been formed, as a corresponding number of congregations have been formed by Unionist minorities, and time alone will reveal their ultimate strength. Nevertheless the United Church of Canada has started on its way with a great strength, a great heritage, a great vision and a great task.



Dear Sir Arthur:

In connection with the file of applications to the Quebec Church Property Commission which I handed you yesterday, I feel that I ought to give you a word of explanation, and re-assurance.

These claims were only handed to me by my clients at six o'clock the previous evening and I had no opportunity to investigate them at all before lodging them, as yesterday was my last convenient day for filing. Except in respect of four or five of the more important of them I had never been consulted and so far have had no opportunity to reach a conclusion as to whether, even in my own judgment, they are proper applications or not.

From a casual examination, however, I saw at once that comparatively few of them are applications under Section 4-6 of the Act, in which cases alone your commission will be called upon to make specific orders. I do not think there are more than half of the dozen I anticipated of such claims.

All the others are applications in cases of alleged "extreme hardship" under Section 5; but in these cases your commission is only authorized to make recommendations which will only be binding in the good faith of the parties.

Even in respect of these they will be materially narrowed down by a few rulings in typical cases. I think you can, therefore, still feel that

while we have lodged far more applications than I personally ever contemplated the number of those which have to be discussed at any length will not substantially exceed our expectations.

The form of application which has been used is a general form which I prepared in advance for formal use in all cases. I, therefore, made it double-barrelled so that it could apply either for applications under Section 4 or under Section 5.

At the first public meeting of your commission I will make the necessary public explanation of the situation.

Dear Sir,

Was deeply interested in reading in yesterday's issue of the "Daily Star", the recommendations of the Church property Commission in several cases, but was more particularly interested in our own case at Howick. It amazed me to read your recommendation that we accept the offer of the continuing Presbyterians, of the use of Knox Church, Howick, for a period of two years, for the morning service only, by paying a pro rata share of the running expenses. As you must know, Knox Church is a branch of Riverfield, and serves a few families and adherents who live in this Village, and who don't want to go the 3 Miles to Riverfield. We are only 1 Mile from Georgetown, and if these families wished to remain Presbyterian, they could sever their connection with Riverfield, and go there, over a first class Macadam road. Of course they would think it a great sacrifice, but not to be compared with the sacrifice

we Unionists are making, as we have no Church of any kind, and have to hold our services in the Temperance Hall. According to my judgement, we had every right to get Knox Church outright, as we have a membership of about 150 or 60. The Board could have recommended Drs. Ballantyne & Whillans to resume the evening service in their respective Churches, which was discontinued long ago. I don't like to criticize a man of your standing, (especially on Armistice day), who has done so much for Canada & the Empire, but I feel confident that justice has not been meted out to the minority here. If you were living here, and knew the whole situation as we know it, you would have thought differently. Today, the comment of the man on the street, who has been quietly watching this affair for a long time, is that it has ended in a complete farce, and roundly condemns the action of the Settlement Board as being wholly unworthy of consideration. I stepped outside the office where I was talking to you this afternoon when you started to speak on the 'phone, and before your conversation was over, Colonel Bovey came along and as he had asked me to step in and sign a paper I went with him. When I returned, you were no longer where I had seen you.

You spoke of the disfavour your judgments as Chairman of the Church Property Commission were getting you into and expressed the belief that they would do harm to both the College and your reputation. May I be permitted, Sir, to disagree with you on this point. The feeling of all persons with whom I have spoken, without exception, is that your attitude as Chairman has been fair and impartial, and evinced a desire on your part to do what was right. Your rulings were based upon broad principles, enunciated in the early judgments of the Commission, which being unanimous must be held to be sound, and the later cases, in so far as the principles laid down could be applied, followed along these lines.

After all, the man who wins out in the esteem of the public is the man who performs his duty as he sees it no matter how unpleasant that duty may be. He who strives to please everybody pleases nobody, and I feel quite sure that the best elements in the country will recognize that you were impelled by a high sense of duty in accepting the Chairmanship of the Commission in the first place and in rendering



the judgments which you have given.

To show you that all letters written concerning you are not like the one you read to me, I enclose one I received a few days ago from Lachute. The writer is a daughter of the Rev. Dr. MacLeod, late Moderator of the Quebec Presbytery, who was examined a couple of times before the Commission, and is the wife of T. H. Christie, late Federal member for the County of Argenteuil. I have underlined the portion of the letter that you will be interested in. When read will you please put it in the enclosed stamped envelope and mail it.

I hope you will excuse my presumption in thus writing you, but as you opened the subject I thought it not out of place that I should express what I would have told you had our conversation not been interrupted.

For myself, I do not much care, but I am human enough to like to feel that I have, at least, the respect of people. For popularity as such I do not care. The main thing is always to feel that you have done nothing with which you can reproach yourself.

We have the honour to report that the Quebec Church Property Commission, appointed by the Act 16 George V. (Quebec) Chapter 97, has now completed its sessions.

The following cases were heard:-

No. 01.- Application from the non-concurring Minority of Montreal West.

Respondents made an offer, the acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission.

No. 02.- Application from the non-concurring Minority of Cote St. George.

Respondents filed an offer. Order that the Church at Cote St. George and half the Glebe land be handed over to the Minority.

No. 03. Application from the non-concurring Minority of St. Cuthbert's Church, St. Lambert, asking for a money compensation or for the Methodist Church.

Respondents filed an offer, acceptance of which was recommend by the Commission.

No. 04.- Application from the non-concurring Minority of Melville, Westmount.

Dr. Pidgeon did not consider the Commission to have jurisdiction. Mr. Barclay recommended turning over Melville Church to the Minority. The Chairman considered the Commission had jurisdiction, but did not consider that any remedy was possible.

No. 05.- Application from the non-concurring Minority of CHALMERS Church, Verdun, for part of property

An offer was filed by the Respondents, acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission.

No. 06.- Application by the non-concurring Minority of St. Andrew's Church, Lachine, for an Equity.

Application was refused.



- No. 06.- St. Andrew's, Lachine. An application by the Minority for an Equity. Refused.
- No. 07.- Rosemount. An application by the Minority for an Equity. Refused.
- No. 08.- Livingstone. An application by the Minority for an Equity. Refused.
- No. 09.- Lachute. An application by the Minority of Lachute, Brownsburg and East Settlement. The Chairman recommended the handing over of the Methodist Church at Lachute, but if this should prove impossible, recommended that the offer of the Majority to hand over said church under certain conditions be accepted. Mr. Barclay recommended handing over the Methodist Church at Lachute. Both recommended acceptance of the offer regarding Upper Lachute and Brownsburg. Dr. Pidgeon recommended acceptance of the offer.
- No. 10.- Brownsburg. Included with No. 09.
- No. 11.- Montreal East. Application from the non-concurring Minority for financial assistance. Refused.
- No. 12.- St. Paul's, Ormstown. Application from the non-concurring Minority, asking for part of the property. Majority filed an offer, acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission.
- No. 13.- Valleyfield. Application from the non-concurring Minority of Valleyfield. Mr. Barclay recommends a new vote. Dr. Pidgeon does not consider the Commission has jurisdiction. The Chairman considers that the roll was not properly made up and that there should be a new vote. He does not, however, consider that the Commission has jurisdiction to pass on the roll and recommends to the parties that steps be taken to determine what was the legal roll of the Church on July 19th, 1924, and if such determination should result in the necessity for a new vote that such vote be taken.
- No. 14.- Dundee. An application from the non-concurring Minority. The Majority filed an offer, acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission.
- No. 15.- St. Andrew's, Scotstown. An application from the non-concurring Minority. The Commission recommended that the Minority be allowed the use of the church at certain times to be agreed upon.
- No. 16.- Chalmers Church, Lingwick. An application from the non-concurring Minority. The Commission recommended that the Minority be allowed the use of the church at certain times to be agreed upon.
- No. 17.- Kinnear's Mills. An application for facilities for worship. Settled.
- No. 18.- Lake Megantic. An application by the non-concurring portion of the congregation who claim that they are a Majority. Refused.



- No.19- New Carlisle. Application from the non-concurring portion of the congregation of New Carlisle, claiming that a vote had been illegally refused. Recommendation that the matter be referred to the Hon. John Hall Kelly, or other person chosen, and if it be shewn that the vote was illegally refused that a new vote be arranged limited to the New Carlisle congregation.
- No.20.-St. Andrew's, Hemmingford. Application from the non-concurring Minority. Respondents filed an offer, acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission. Mr. Barclay dissented and filed another judgment.
- No.21- Knox Church, Hemmingford. Heard with No.20 and covered by the same judgment.
- No.22- Chalmers Church, Richmond. An application from the non-concurring Minority. The Commission recommended that facilities be allowed in Richmond.
- No.23- Calvin-Westminster, Westmount. An application from the non-concurring Minority. The Commission recommended that \$5,041. be allowed to the Minority. Dr. Pidgeon dissented on the ground that he did not consider there was any hardship.
- No.24- Application from the congregation of Flodden for an Equity in the Manse at Kingsbury. The Commission ordered that they be granted \$400. Mr. Barclay dissented and recommended that they be granted \$666.67.
- No.25- Application from the congregation of Reid's Church for an Equity in the Manse at Kinnear's Mills. Order that they be granted \$850.00.
- No.25a-Application from the Unionist Minority of Reid's Church for facilities for worship. Settled.
- No.26- Application from the congregation of Grande Fresniere for an Equity in the Manse at Ste Therese. Order that they be granted \$666.66.
- No.27- Application from the Minority at Buckingham for facilities for worship. Recommendation accordingly.
- No.28- Application from the non-concurring Minority of Kingsbury. Withdrawn.
- No.29- Application from the congregation of Cote St. Gabriel, claiming that vote was illegally withheld. Application refused, recommendation for facilities for worship.
- No.30- Application from the Unionist Minority at Athelstan. Recommendation that Minority be given certain facilities.
- No.31- Application from the Unionist congregation at Dundee, heard with No. 14.
- No.32- Application from congregation of Gore for Equity in the Manse at Rockburn. Order that they should be granted \$700.00.
- No.33- Application from Unionist Minority at Howick and Riverfield for possession of Howick Church. Application refused. Majority filed an offer, acceptance of which was recommended by the Commission.



- No. 34- Application from the Unionist Minority of Cote des Neiges. Withdrawn.
- No. 35- Application from the Unionist Minority of MacVicar Memorial Church for financial assistance. Refused.
- No. 36- Application from the Unionist Minority of St. Andrew's East for financial assistance. Refused.
- No. 37- Application from the Unionist Minority of Asbestos and Danville. Left to the parties for settlement.
- No. 38- Application from the Presbyterians of Beech Grove, claiming to be a subsisting congregation and asking to be granted the Presbyterian Church. The Commission by a Majority refused the application, it being considered that there was no jurisdiction. Mr. Barclay dissented and recommended a new vote.
- No. 39- Application from the Presbytery of non-concurring Presbyterians in Montreal for an Equity in the fund of the Finance Committee. The Commission held that it had no jurisdiction.
- No. 40- Application from the congregation of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's asking to be confirmed in the ownership of Victoria Church, Point St. Charles. The Commission held that it had no jurisdiction.
- No. 41a- Application from the United Church of Canada, Stark's Corners, for an Equity in the Presbyterian Manse at Shawville. Ordered that they should be granted \$600.
- No. 41b- Application from the Unionist congregation of Lochaber Bay and Gore for an Equity in the Presbyterian Manse at Thurso. Order fixing their interest at \$900. and that of the Presbyterian congregation at Thurso at \$600., the Presbyterian congregation to have the option whether it would buy or sell.

Forty-three applications thus came before the Commission for disposal, and all except the two withdrawn were heard and adjudicated upon.

Letter to J.A.Ewing, K.C. Nov. 24th, 1926

re Quebec Church Property Commission headed
by Sir Arthur Currie on the division
of property between Presbyterians continuing
and those joining the union.

"My only fear was that the University might suffer from criticisms which people would direct at me because of the findings of the Commission. The replenishment of our exchequer depends entirely on the good will of benefactors, the great majority of whom live in Montreal.

"For myself, I do not much care, but I am human enough to like to feel that I have, at least the respect of people. For popularity as such I do not care. The main thing is always to feel that you have done nothing with which you can reproach yourself.

"I assure you I appreciate very much your writing this letter and also what you said this evening."

How much more then, would he care for the good name and goodwill of the University suffering by the Cobourg trial if it went against him. This was the real worry of that trial.

His motto was, he said, "Thine own reproach alone do fear."
