# **ROYAL COMMISSION** ON NOVITIATE AFFAIR

Resolution of Hughes Calling for Parliamentary Inquiry is Withdrawn on Promise of a Royal Commission---Meighen States That Men at Guelph Novitiate Were Not Liable for Military Service.

Ottawa, April 7.—Following a promise by Hon. Arthur Meighen, acting minister of justice, that a royal commission will be named to inquire into Munich says.

The official proclamation as given out by the Munich News Agency and transmitted by the Havas correspondent, is addressed to all "workers' councils." It announces that the united proletariat of Bavaria assumes, by means of the workers', soldiers' and peasants' councils all power.

Hughes' resolution calling for investigation by a parliamentary committee was withdrawn tonight by Sir Thomas White, who stated he did so at the request of General Hughes.

The investigation by the royal commission will not begin until the return of Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, who is chiefly interested officially in the matter.



## **BUTTER DEALERS** GIVE THEIR SIDE

Claim Shortage in Storage Accounts for Rise at This Season.

### FORCED TO IMPORT

Say But for New Zealand, the Situation Would Be Worse.

The opinion of the large dealers in Toronto is that butter may rise in price to 72 cents a pound, but that within the next ten days the crest will have been passed, and that production will again equal consump the ratio gradually increasing in favor of production, until by the middle of May very reasonable figures may be quoted. It was admitted that European buyers might influence the market to the extent of creating forced values, should large European buyers offer exorbitant European buyers offer exorbitan prices for the commodity. But, reputable men in the business stated that there was absolutely no founda-tion for the opinion that butter was being shipped over to Europe, to feed Germans, and that inferior grades of butter fat were left behind for home consumption. Perhaps the best rea-son for the present crisis in values was that given by one of the best known butter dealers in Canada, to the effect that when Britain during the effect that when Britain, during October, and part of November, 1918, commandeered the entire Canadian supply of this commodity, the storage houses were practically denuded of their stocks, this condition affecting the entire affature market until such time as the spring supplies came to hand hand The World gleaned the following

"China as a Member of the Family of Nations" was the subject of the address to the Canadian Club yesterday by Rev. Donald MacGillivray, M.A., B. D., D.D., who is home on furlough from

missionary, work. He considers it, he said, a great and gracious privilege to falk about the great "middle kingdom," otherwise known as China. He had once looked up an anthology and found only two quotations from Bret Harte, and one from Tennyson-"Better fifty years of Europe than a cycle of Cathay." He thought this was not such a damaging assertion, as the Chinese cycle was only 60 years, and to say that 50 years of Europe was better than 60 years of China was not an injurious compar-No other nation, said Frank Brinkling, had for so long a time pre-served its own theories or kept its literature so free from foreign affluents, or kept so high a moral and natural elevation above contemporary states.

He had necessarily studied the language in order to become familiar with the people and the press. Among new terms introduced into the language two were significant—"indemnity", and "to

demand" in the big stick sense.

The partition of China had been looked forward to, but Dr. MacGillivray believed that the slicing up of China would now never take place, and it had been prevented by Great Britain.

"You are thinking of another color," ne observed, amid laughter. The Chinese had heard of the bless-ngs of party government. Dr. MacGillivray would apply the term competent democracy to China. There were four different contestants for power there now, the president, the premier, the parliament, and the unilitary party There were foes within, the grafters hose who desired to get rich quick, he seekers for wealth and power at the expense of the public. He believed, however, that China would become one of the sisterhood of nations, and would so be treated by the other nations, tho there was a long, long trail awinding before she had become an entirely

competent democracy..

Magnificent Resources The magnificent resources of China were a guarantee of her development. "I don't much believe in the yellow peril." Dr. MacGillivray asserted. "First of all because God's in His heaven, and all's right with the world, and secondy, China is too pacifist to fight when she ought to fight. Above all, I don't believe in the yellow peril because it is the reductio ad absurdum of human

'China has to join herself to some thing with pulling power to implement her ambitions, which are warm and noble. Give the Chinamen leaders whom they can trust, and they work wonders. I know some Canadians they trusted, and the Chinese worked under them with devotion. In a breach in a river last year I saw Chinese men standing naked in the water to the waist, working to mend the breach to save the villages which depended on their labor" He paid a compliment to

Chinese intellect. "The brain of the Chinamen set free, infused with new life, new ideas, fruitful ideas, is just starting out on a ser ies of mental triumphs which you and will get the benefit of.
"Hitherto western critics have no

had the appreciation of Chinese art in its finer aspects. "The world needs the soul of China, and in the days to come it may very well be that it shall fall to the lot of China to place the topmost stone on the temple of truth.





An apartment house with four rooms was quoted as costing \$40 a month Under the terms of the proposed twenty years at less than half of \$40 a month by paying \$300 down. A. M. 

## **BEAVER OCCUPIES** STRONG POSITION

Larger Earnings Shown in Annual Report-Work at Kirkland Lake.

Improved earnings and a stronger inancial position are shown in the report of the Beaver Consolidated. Mines, for the year ended Feb. 28 last. There is shown a net profit for the year of \$168,242, which, added to the previous balance carried forward of \$744,276, brought the total surplus to \$912,919. From this depreciation charges of \$11.274 were taken, leaving a balance carried forward into the current year of \$901,644. This the current year of \$901,644. This compared with \$744.276 a year ago. Profits in 1917 amounted to \$107,297. Gross earnings in 1918 were \$398,385, of which \$375,475 came from ore. Operating charges were \$207.331, and administrative charges \$17.411, leaving the profit of \$168,642 as given above. Cash on hand on February 28, 1919, was \$29,197, and accounts receivable \$4116, making \$33.314, as against \$18,207 a year ago. against \$18,207 a year ago.

In the balance sheet the company's holdings of Kirkland Lake stock are valued at \$370,957, the cost price. Current assets, including shares in other companies, total \$888,642, as against current liabilities of \$29.526, of which \$11,000 is provision for Do-minion tax. This leaves working as-sets of no less than \$859,000.

The Beaver produced 385,042 ounces of silver in 1918, carried developments of 1441 feet and 3850 cubic yards of stoping. The report goes on to say that large bodies of milling ore were encountered on the Beaver during the year, but no high-grade ore bodies. As to the Kirkland Lake property, scarcity of labor and high price of materials curtailed development work under-ground somewhat. The main shaft has been sunk to the 500-foot level, and at the 300, 400 and 500-foot levels working stations have been cut and have been connected with the drifts running from No. 2 shaft. "Up to the present time no stoping has been done. All ore blocked out has been the result of development. About 8000 tons of ore has been raised to the surface and will be milled as soon as conditions will permit."






