Manila, Feb. 27.-(6.15 p.m.)-Two Spanish commisioners, Senors Rosatio and Abogoda, who were permitted to pass through the United States lines and conwith Aguinaldo with reference to ed this morning with sealed despatches held for six weeks, on the payment of \$50, the value of the food and clothing furnished to them. Shortly afterwards the rebels sent out a flag of truce, borne by Commandant Sinforozo De La Cruz, and several hundred of the enemy left the Fininion lines, crying, "No quiere," "Mas combate," "Americanos mucho bueno," The commandante said that fully 8000 of his men had had enough, and were anxious to surrender. After the party returned to the American lines the enemy on the right fired a volley. The builets dropped at their feet.

TOO MUCH ELECTRICITY Caused the Destruction of Several Swell Residences at New Orleans

Early Yesterday Morning. finest residences in New Orleans, which were provided with electric light, at an early hour yesterday morning, destroying some of them. The first fire was at the residence of Mr. Lawrence Stern, St. Charles-avenue and Soniat-street. The incandescent bulbs burst and the house was set on fire in a dozen places at the same time. It was impossible to save anything. The family escaped in their night clothes. The Stern residence was of marble, and one of the handsomest residences in the city. The loss will exceed \$100,000. Soon the residences of I. B. Hobson and James Legendre, in Audubon Park, were in flames from the same cause. In the Hobson house the flames started in all the storeys at the same time, and nothing could be done by the fire department. The loss on the house was \$35,000 and \$25,000 on the furniture. The residence of Mr. Legendre was also burned to the ground. The residence of Mr. Robert J. Wood at Octavia and Pitt-streets then burned. Fires also occurred at several other residences, but the prompt action of the brigade in cutting the electric wires saved them. The total loss will reach \$250,000.

The skin is procured from the bodies of the indigent poor that are not claimed by their relatives and friends. These bodies are turned over to the various scientific institutions for dissection and impecunious students started the scheme by selling the skins to tanners and jewellers. I thought then that we should have waited a minute longer in putting on more draught, as the fireman was not quite through cleaning, and the cold air was detrimental to raising steam. However, the steam came up to 110 lbs. in a very short time, and in seven minutes after the alarm came in the water pressure was 60 lbs., but we could not get much over that all my watch. Mr. Heal left the station about 4.40 and came back again about 5.20, stating that he had been over at the fire, but did not want to go very close, so he sent me over, telling me to notice what kind of a stream over at the fire, but did not want to go very close, so he sent me over, telling me to notice what kind of a stream they were getting from the hose, and to ask someone how things were. He spoke about the six-inch main not being nearly large enough, hence the difficulty in getting over 60 lbs. pressure. While I was away he marked down the 5.30 reading of the gauges, and I think it was 67 lbs., although it was 69 when I left and 60 when I returned again. He explained that he had got her up long enough to get the reading, but could not hold her. When I returned I told Mr. Heal that one of the men working on the burning factory told me that the pressure was very poor. I could see for myself that, it was not good. He went away then, and about 11.05, when I was ready to go home (Lewis had relieved me), Mr. Heal telephoned and asked me to check the pressure to 55 lbs.

Heal had never instructed him how to run the plant; told him to pick it up, and after the first morning witness had never seen him around the place at starting time.



Platinum in Yukon Sands.

Platinam in Yakon Sands.

In a report to the State Department Consul McCook at Dawson City announces the discovery of platinum among the sands of the Yukon creeks. He says:

"Black sand is found in almost every stream in the Yukon territory, and, while considered a good indication of gold in more or less quantity, has been always a nuisance to washers. On account of its great specific gravity it remains in the sluice boxes with the gold, and even handpanning will not always separate it from the precious metal it accompanies. During the clean-up many tons of this sand are thrown out, yet the analysis of 12 pounds taken from near the mouth of the Hootalinqua would tend to show a distinct value for this supposedly by-product. The dredging company, of which Capt. Jack Crawford is the resident head, has obtained considerably over 100 miles of rivers for gold dredging, part of which is a long stretch of the Hootalinqua, near its mouth. In a test last summer fine gold was sluiced in paying quantities, but it is not of that gold we wish to speak. In washing a cubic yard and a half of gravel the short sluice boxes became badly congested with black sand. The sand and gold dust were taken up and the gold carefully removed. 


