THE YIELD OF SILVER IN 1899.

As regards the yield of silver in 1899, the United States the total production showed a small increase—371,802 ounces, or 0.7 per cent—over 1898, but was less by 1,265,000 ounces, or 2.3 per cent, than in 1897. There were no features in the year's production to call for special comment. Colorado was the leading silver producer, the output of the state showed a small decrease, in Montana, the yield was an important feature, there was a considerable gain, due to the reopening of several important mines, and the more active working of others. Utah came third and Idaho fourth.

STATISTICS SHOWING WHAT WORLD'S YIELD OF BOTH METALS WAS DURING LAST YEAR.

Canada was fifth on list. In the New York Mining and Engineering Journal we find statistics of interest as to the total gold and silver production of the world during 1899. To world readers the most interesting fact is that Canada has risen to fifth place among the great gold producing countries of the earth.

OF INTEREST TO RIFLEMEN.

It would be essential also that a definite arrangement should be made as to the arms to be used, slight variations in the arms to be used, as this is said to have been the case in the past.

THIRTY ONE U.S. VOLUNTEERS HELD AT BAY A FORCE OF SIX HUNDRED INSURGENTS FOR FOUR LONG DAYS.

Their Refuge was Set on Fire. They Fled and Dug Trenches, Where They Stayed Until Relieved—Only 13 Left.

Washington, June 8.—Perhaps the most thrilling and picturesque incident of the war in the Philippines occurred at Catubig, on the island of Samar, where, on April 15 last, a party of 31 enlisted men of the 43rd Infantry, volunteers, held at bay a force of some 600 insurgents during four days of the fiercest fighting, reinforcements arriving just in the nick of time.

MR. BLAIR'S AMENDMENTS

Were Up Before the Railway Committee Again and Some Progress Was Made.

THE LOCATION OF STATIONS

Was a Subject of Warm Debate, and Finally the Clause Was Laid Over.

Ottawa, June 8.—Mr. Blair's amendments to the Railway Act came before the Railway Committee again this morning.

Paragraph D of section 90 of the present Act was repeated and the following substituted: "Make, carry or place the railway across or upon the lands of any person on the located line of the railway."

The clauses regarding the siting of plants and profiles shall be filed completed for the whole line, and not in sections as at present, and that the Government take charge of the construction under the location of stations.

The clause relating to the location of stations under the approval of the Railway Committee of the Privy Council was discussed.

Mr. Broderick contended that the clause as reconstructed by Mr. Blair would not affect the C.P.R. in the Northwest, for instance.

DUKE OF WELLINGTON DEAD.

Henry Wellesley, the Third in the Line of Succession, Has Passed Away.

London, June 8.—Henry Wellesley, third Duke of Wellington, died at his residence, Marlborough House, this morning in the 53th year of his age.

The deceased relative of the Iron Duke was born at Apsley House, April 5, 1846, and was the second son of Major-General Lord Charles Wellesley, M.P. He was educated at Eton, and was M.P. for Adolphus from 1870 to 1886. He owned about 6,000 acres. The title and estates now go to Lord Arthur Charles Wellesley, a brother.

He could not understand how any man or any number of men could sympathize with the Boer system of government.

Sir Mackenzie-Bowell seconded the address. He anticipated a time of guerrilla warfare in the Transvaal, but the end would be the predominance of British power. He wanted a settlement to be effected.

WHAT DUNN'S REVIEWER SAYS.

New York, June 8.—Dunn's review to-morrow will say: Failures in May prove a little larger than was expected a week ago. The commercial list embraces 947, with liabilities of \$23,711,151, and only six months of the past eight have seen double-digit failures as large. A review of the analysis by branches of business is highly suggestive, since it shows surprising steadiness without any increase in the average per failure of the small trading concerns, but in manufacturing failures for less than \$100,000 it shows a considerable expansion of indebtedness.

THE WEEKLY TRADE REVIEW

A Drop in the Iron Trade and a Bulge in Wheat Outlook.

COTTON WEAK AND WOOL DULL

Canadian Banks Have Done the Best Business on Record—The Failures.

New York, June 8.—Bradstreet's to-morrow will say: New business, wholesale, is of a between seasons character, but warmer weather has offered a stimulus to retail business in some sections. Purely mercantile failures are relatively few in number, and bank clearings show a rather less marked falling off from last year. The only exception to the general downward trend of prices is the general rise in leading farm products, notably cereals, but here the moving cause is hardly a favorable one, being the result of less satisfactory crop reports, principally from the Northwest, and it is to be noted that winter wheat yield promises to be very short, are also less favorable.

Drop in the Iron Trade.

If, as has been claimed, lower prices for iron favor an increased consumption, current developments in this trade may be classed as favorable, because concessions are being made in nearly every branch of trade. The price of iron ore has been agreed upon, the result being a drop of 10 per cent. in pig iron and 20 per cent. in cast iron. The market quotations, which, however, have not been closely adhered to, are as follows:

Drop in the Iron Trade.

Cotton is slightly weaker on reports of a heavily increased acreage, but the crop is late and advice that it is an excellent crop of rain in the Mississippi Valley and Texas. Cotton goods dull.

Wool is dull and the whole slightly weaker at eastern markets.

Price shadings are reported the rule in the northwest, with low water in the northwest, with it is hoped, restrict new production. One of the few exceptions to the general downward trend is that furnished by sugar, which is now apparently at the height of the demand for curing purposes, and consequently strong, both for refined and raw grades.

Coffee Prices Downward.

Coffee is strong, mainly on the statistical position of Brazil's supplies in this country, the jobbing business is sympathetic, generally, and activity in sugar, Brazil's approximate index number on June 1 was 86.88, a falling off of 8.2 per cent. from a month ago, a decline of 4.0 per cent. from the high level reached on Feb. 1, but a gain of 8.8 per cent. over the year ago.

The Failures.

Failures are down to a minimum as regards number, but a few large embarrassments in widely separated sections and lines of business swelled the aggregate of liabilities in May to \$2,371,151, as reported to Bradstreet's. The mercantile failures during the month of May were 947, with liabilities aggregating \$8,150,571 in number.

Failures are more numerous in the Eastern, middle and Pacific groups of states this year than last.

Hides and Leather.

Hides have declined further this week, both packed hides at Chicago and dry hides here, and the decline in this important material has been over 2 per cent. while in leather it has not averaged 8 per cent. The boys and sheep manufacturers maintain that they cannot accept lower prices than those they have asked, until further yields much more, and the decline of many works indicates that the embarrassment is serious.

Volume of Payments.

The volume of payments thru interior clearing houses where stock operations are not of controlling magnitude shows the continuance of a trade never equalled in any previous year. Railway stocks had been growing steadily stronger, then anxiety about the outcome of Chinese troubles caused some hesitation and led to sales, instead of purchases by London.

The Wheat Outlook.

The rise of 2 1/2 cents in wheat, attributed to industries, threatening a short movement next fall, affected stocks also somewhat. Exports do not materially change. Receipts of both grains have fallen considerably below those of last year, the not as yet enough to indicate a sense of security in interior supplies. Failures of the week have been 236 in the United States, against 190 last year, and 19 in Canada, against 100 last year.

Improvement in Canada.

Reports from many sections of Canada show general improvement, although the interruption of the trade at some points, and the approaching elections are also cause of complaint. St. John reports business conditions heavy and orders large in dry goods and shoes, with collections prompt and money easy. Spring business is about over at Halifax, but fall orders are large and prospects bright. Celebrations over victories in South Africa unsettled business at Montreal. Toronto reports tea and sugar active and strong; leather in fair demand, but hides and wool dull, with heavy collections. The collections remain slow, with renewals frequent by approaching provincial elections. Trade conditions are quiet at Victoria and collections unsatisfactory.
