Seattle, Sept. 2.—A despatch from Sitka says that the government will soon commence the construction there of a magnetic observatory for the terrestrial division of the coast survey. The observatory is one of four to be constructed by the government for the purpose of detecting the deviation of the magnetic pole from the true north, and will be of the greatest importance to the coast survey in marking magnetic courses on the charts. At present it is known that charts ten or more years old are in many cases worthless owing to the deviation of the magnetic pole.

AN EPIDEMIC OF BALDNESS

European Residents in Japan Attacked by the Plague Without Warning.

NO MORBID SIGNS IN THE SCALP Bald Patches Regularly Spread Over the Head, and Men's Beards Attacked.

London, Sept. 2.—Dr. Eklind of Berlin sends to The Spectator an account of an epidemic of baldness among Europeans in Japan. Women, in particular, live in constant dread of losing their hair. He says:
