COBALT---Mining Stocks Are Steady on Canadian Holiday ---COBALT

LOCAL MARKETS ARE CLOSED COBALT'S STEADY AT NEW YORK

Last Week's Shipments Highly Satisfactory—Business Starting on a Broader Basis—Market Firm.

World Office, Monday Evening, April 12. The market for Cobalt stocks today was left entirely in the hands of New York, the local exchanges being closed for the holiday. Prices kept round about Thursday's closing and showed hardly any change. The tone was good and no reason is apparent for any that would be natural to profit-taking.

Shipments from Cobalt mines last week were highly satisfactory, nine mines shipping a total of 647 tons, almost the same as 11 mines shipped the preceding week. The shippers of last week were La Rose, Right of Way, Nipissing, City of Cobalt, Crown Reserve, Temiskaming, Cobalt Central, Kerr Lake, O'Brien and Silver Queen. Details will be found in the weekly table, which appears below.

News from other silver mining camps is satisfactory, and several new companies will shortly make an appearance on the market.

The general opinion is that the local mining markets have now started afresh, that higher prices and broader basis of business will be seen in the future.

VALUES HIGH AT DEPTH IN MINES AT GOW GANDA

Large Quantities of Ore Bagged At One of the Leading Mines During Sinking of 25-foot Shaft—Twenty Inches of Shipping Ore.

"We have a magnificent property," said H. T. Pemberton, general manager of the Bartlett Mines, who has just returned from Gow Ganda.

"At a depth of 25 feet the silver vein has broadened to 4-1/2 inches, and the wall rock is so impregnated with the metal that we have 20 inches of shipping ore. We have already a large quantity of high grade ore sacked, and we have been mining up to the present with the crudest appliances, such as a bucket, windlass, etc. All the drilling up to the present has, of course, been done by hand, and the shaft has been bailed out by hand.

"Just now, with the snow melting, a great deal of water works its way into the shaft and retards the work, but when the steam plant is running the pumps will, of course, remove this handicap.

"The steam plant is being installed at No. 1 vein, where we are sinking a double compartment shaft, which, as I have already stated, is now down over 25 feet. This will be the base of operations, and at a depth of 100 feet we will start to drift northwestward.

ERA OF GREAT MINING IS DAWNING.

The pulse of national expansion is beating firmer to-day than at any period since 1906, and the current year should pass into history as one of the most notable in the industrial life of this country.

Of the now perennial growth of the agricultural areas of the Dominion, a great deal has been said. Moral progress is doubtless being made in the campaign for the conservation of the natural resources of the country. Things are "stepping along." The western City of Winnipeg throws out her chest with \$12,000,000 of building permits already for 1909. Vancouver talks of being the second city of the Dominion, and tells a story of wonderful building activity along the waterfront and in the wholesale districts. From coast to coast the country vibrates with the note of renewed confidence and developing prosperity.

It is in the mines that Canada will experience this year a new national impulse. Cobalt is great and growing better. What is important, it is gaining international recognition. It has dared to rival Goldfields and has left the new boom camp of the republic away behind.

New areas rich in minerals are being opened up, and with these will be made much of the mining history of 1909.

It is safe to say that six months from to-day Canada should know with reasonable certainty the possibilities of the new fields. Fine plants of machinery have gone into the Montreal River country and to Gowganda. In proper time the development work now in progress will tell its story of success or failure. It looks now so much like success that men have divorced themselves from large sums of money as an earnest of their faith. In six months there should be sufficient ore, and enough development done to indicate the future. The great silver belt will be prospected this season by a great army of men, and if the country holds anything wonderful that has not yet been heard of it should be revealed this coming summer.

The rush into the north this spring will have no equal in mining history unless it be that phenomenal and unprecedented rush or precipitation into the gold fields of the Yukon. Singularly this greatest of mining movements was to a Canadian camp.

The silver fields of the north will be tested in 1909. The coal mines of the west are being opened up. At Sturgeon River and Rainy River interest is developing in the gold deposits. At Temagami a quiet gold development has been going on for some time, and there will soon be shippers there. New York capital is about to open the Olive gold mine near Mine Centre. Near Ville Marie copper deposits are coming to the front. At Sellwood the Moose Mountain Iron Mine is being equipped with machinery of greater capacity. As the man from Fort Frances said recently: "The eastern part of the province has its Cobalt, Gowganda and Montreal River, but we have our Seine River and Rainy Lake gold fields, which, with proper management and development, will make a name for the western part of New Ontario."

Some Good in Their Badness. PRESCOTT, April 12.—Ida Lewis and Laura Roland, were sentenced at Waterloo, N.Y., to two years in Auburn prison and fined \$100 and \$250 respectively for procuring and harboring alien women in a disorderly house. The girls, who came from Ottawa by way of Prescott and Ogdensburg, made affidavits disclosing the fact. One girl said she was supporting two consumptive brothers at Saranac Lake and an aged mother who supposed she was keeping a boarding house.

Assessed at \$700 an Acre. Judge Winchester heard an appeal brought by the assessment department yesterday against the reduction in the assessment of Joseph E. Seagram's property on Danforth-avenue. There are 38 acres altogether, but only 11-2 acres are in the city.

The department placed the value at \$1000 an acre, but the court of revision reduced it to \$500. Judge Winchester considered the property was worth \$700 an acre.

JOE REMEY MADE FIRST FIND AT GOWGANDA

Some New Facts About Discovery of New Silver Wonderland—Traces of the Indians.

In August, 1906, a party of Americans, guided by Joe Remy, started up the Montreal River in quest of this good fishing, and with the idea of seeing our northern country. To Joe Remy the trip held forth as a prospect that minerals abounded in this district. He made several minor discoveries upon this trip, but as his time was largely taken up and as the winter approached, he was unable to stake a claim that year, and did nothing more than convince himself of the existence of silver in the vicinity of Lake Gowganda.

It was while making these observations that Mr. Remy chanced to come upon the carrying of an Indian boy on the trunk of a large spruce tree on the west bank of the lake. He calculates that the carving must have been done thirty to forty years ago, and considers it to be of sufficient value to warrant the carrying of it to a museum for curiosities of the kind.

At the time of this trip Mr. Remy states that those were very plentiful in this country, the party having seen as many as seven such moose in a day. In this connection he tells a good story of having paddled up to a buck-moose while swimming in the lake. A moose swam very low in the water and Mr. Remy states that by placing his paddle on its back and pressing steadily he could easily have carried a country for caribou at one time, but they have been steadily driven farther north and west by the increasing number of the moose.

Mr. Remy with his brother, John A. Remy, and a fellow-pro prospector, C. H. Riggs, returned to Lake Gowganda. Joe Remy, having once been over the ground, would not have proposed a return trip had he been less confident of the discovery of several veins at the south end of the lake. Thereupon, two 40-acre claims were staked on the 28th day of July, 1907, and later registered in the name of "Remy."

Then O'Kelleys Staked His. After making his strike Mr. Remy advised a fellow-pro prospector named O'Kelleys to stake on either side of him on the big vein which has since become known as the O'Kelleys vein.

At present time it is, I think, the most talked-of and developed property in the district, and fully merits the enthusiasm which has been caused by Gowganda's great wealth.

This leaves little else to say, for everyone is familiar with the country from the news that is pouring in from hundreds of sources, and the samples of ore taken from Gowganda speak for themselves.

Joseph W. Remy is most optimistic as to Gowganda's future, as in fact is everyone who has been over the road made popular by his discovery. Unlike many properties, Mr. Remy has not sold his claim for a small sum, but with the assistance of Dr. C. H. Riggs, a well-known Toronto dentist, has formed a private corporation, and hopes soon to be bagging some of the richness for himself.

Springfield Old Boys. Mr. Remy, mentioned in the foregoing, was born in Springfield, Eighty-four years ago, and his parents moved to the little town of Dorset. Here he naturally drifted into the profession of guide for fishing and shooting parties. Game is very plentiful in that locality, hundreds of deer being taken out annually. The excellence of the trout fishing through the lakes of this locality is a source of continual delight to the argent sportsman.

FORMATIONS DIFFER IN ONTARIO SILVER FIELDS

The Whole Country is More or Less Diabase—Swamp Shows Good Signs of Silver.

GOWGANDA, April 8.—(From the man on the Trail)—The distance lying between Miller Lake and the west shore of Gowganda Lake may be estimated at five or six miles, in a straight line and here is the difference in the formation.
