## constitution and by-laws

## OF THE <br>  <br> CONSTITUTION.

Rule 1. That this Association be called the "Province of Quebec Rifte Association," and shall have for its object, the encouragement of Rifle shooting in the Province.
2. That the Annual Subscription for Individual Members be two dollars, and a donation of ten dollars in cash, at any one time, shall entitle the donor to be elected a life mer.ber.
3. That any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps, may become affiliated to this Association, by the payment of an annual subscription of not less than ten dollars, the number of memberships to be in proportion to one for every half dollar so subscribed.
4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Council composed of the office-bearers, and two representatives from each affiliated Association in this Province. Five to form a quorum.
5. The office-bearers of this Association shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected primarily at the first meeting, and afterwards annually at the annual meeting.
6. A Patron and Vice-Patrons may be elected at the first meeting, and afterwards whenever a vacancy occurs.
7. The Deputy Adjutant-Generals and Brigade Majors of
the Province, being members of the Association, shall be members, ex-officio, of the Council.
8. The Representatives to the Council must be members of Association, either by affiliation or otherwise; they shall be chosen annually by the Association they represent, and their names sent to the Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting.
9. The Council may from time to time, make such ByLaws for their proper guidance as they may deem necessary, but no by-law to be altered or new one proposed, without at least such notice being given to each member of the Council, as by the by-laws may be determined.
10. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be heid at such time and place as may be agreed on at the annual business meeting.
11. The Annual Business Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on, by the by-laws.
12. An Annual Report shali be made by the Secretary and Treasurer and submitted to the Council, previous to publication.
13. At the Annual Meeting the Council shall appoint an Executive Committee, to carry out the Annual Prize Meeting, under such regulations as may le made by the Council from time to time.

## iBY-LAWS.

1. That the Annual Meeting of the Association be held at Montreal on the first Thursday in May.
2. Extraordinary meetings may be called by the Secretary, when required by any six members of the Council; fifteen days notice of such meeting given to each member of the Council, and the requisition must state the object for which the meeting is called.
3. Three Auditors shall be appointed annually, whose duties shall be to examine the Treasurer's accounts previous to the Annual Meeting.
4. The Treasurer shall be required to deposit from time to time-all sums of money paid over to him, on behalf of the Association-in a safe bank.
5. The payment of sums for current expenses, must be authorized by the President, or in his absence, one of the Vice Presidents. Other payments to be made oaly upon the authority of the Council.

# SEVENTH ANNUAL REPOR 「 

## OF THE

## Aravinte of @utber 思ifle Essociation.

The Report of the proceedings of the past year shews, that the work and object for which the Association was formed, was carried on efficiently and successfully. The number of Competitors at the Annual Matches, shews a slight decrease from the previous year. The number of entries in 1874 was 1117, in 18751054 , a decrease of 63 . The number of Affiliated Associations is less than the previous year, in 1874 the number was 22 , in $1875,18$.

The Competitors were from all parts of the Province, a goodly number were from Ontario, and there were several Riflemen from New York. The attendance of Competitors from Ontario and other Provinces year after year, shews that the. arrangements and mode of conducting the matches, gives good satisfaction, and the repeated visits of well known and expert Marksmen from a distance gives confidence and encouragement to the Executive Committee in their work.

The Prize List was kept up at about the same value as in 1874 the number of Prizes were 231 being an increase of 4 , total value $\$ 2282$. The policy of making the Prize List as large as possible, has been found by experience to be the wisest in the interests of the Association.

The Ranges were as usual in as perfect order as could be: expected; the constant renewal of the Butts and stands costs.

money, but the expenses were curtailed, and in most items are below that of former years. The expenses of repairs to the Ranges cannot be avoided. The Treasurer deserves thanks for the painstaking manner in which he managed his Department and attended to the interests of the Association.

The Markers Register Keepers and other Range Officers cost a considerable sum, but the importance of rapid and accurate marking and reliable register keeping is too great to be overlooked, money would not repay loss of our fair dealing with all Competitors.

The Dominion and Provincial Government Grants were received as before, but the Treasurer's statement shews a falling off in other subscriptions. The Committee thought it best not to take up subscriptions in the City last year, as the Friends in the City had been asked for support during so many consecutive years, and so little had been received from the Country ; but we are glad to report a first contribution of $\$ 55$ from the Eastern Townships, by the hands of Capt. W. B. Boyd to whom our thanks are due; we hope this example will be followed by other Districts. The Treasurer's statement shews clearly that our Funds are getting very low, that the balance on hand this year is small. But future prospects are encouraging. Some new Regimental Rifle Associations have been formed, and others are working with renewed vigor. Rifle Practice in the City Corps and thronghout the District, bids fair to be carried out this year with new life. A number of our affiliated Associations have affiliated with the Dominion Association, and one -the Montreal Rifle Club,-has affiliated with the National Rifle Association, and has received from the latter the Silver Medal which will be competed for at its next Matches.

A groodly number of our members attended the Annual Matches of the Dominion Association at Ottawa last year, and were highly successful. In the Competition for places on the Wimbledon Team, four of our members viz,, Quarter Master Cleaveland, 54th. Batt., Ensign Wright, 50th. Batt. (second
time for him) and Privates Ross and Turnbull, of the 1st. Batt. P. W. Rifles were successful in winning places on the Team.

The cheaper rate at which Ammunition can now be obtained will no doubt encourage Riffe Practice.

His Excellency the Governor General, to show the deep interest he takes in Rifle Practice, has kindly offered a Silver and a Bronze Medal to be competed for at the Provincial Matches, annually, as long as His Excelleney remains in Canada; these Medals will be competed for at our next Annual Matches.

A letter wss received from Col. Gildersleeve Secretary of the National Rifle Association, New York, dated 6th December 1875, inviting the Quebec Provincial Association to send a Team of eight, to compete at the Matches to be held in honor of the Centennial Anniversary of American Independence: Prize, "The Champion hip of the World" in the shape of a "Trophy" presented by the citizens of the United States, Ranges $800, \bigcirc 00$ and 1000 yards.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Quebec Provincial Rifle Association was held on the 17th February last, to take this invitation into consideration, after some discussion it was unanimously Iesolved, "That it is undesirable " for the Province of Queb to sitempt to raise a Team of eight "small bores to compete at Philadelphia, but should the " Dominion of Canada Rifle Association determine to send a. "Team, this Province will co-operate with it."

A copy of this Resolution was sent to the Secretary of theDominion Rifle Association, and one to the Secretary of theNational Rifle Association, New York.

A copy of a letter was received lately from the Treasurer of the Dominion Rifle Association, written by the Secretary to the President of the National Rifle Association New York, to the eflect, that had the invitation to represent the Dominion of Canada been confined to the Dominion Rifle Associution the Council would have made every offort to select a 'leam worthy to rapresent the

Dominion, but as the Councillearn that similar invitations have been sent to Provincial and other Asscciations, they do not see their way to making a selection of marksmen to represent the Dominion apart from those who may be selected to represent Provincial and other Associations. It will be seen from this letter that the Dominion R. A., declines sending a Team, it is therefore open to any of the Provinces to send a Team.

As the new Wimbledon target is now used at the Dominion Matches at Ottawa, it has become a necessity for our Association to use them at the next Annual Matches, the old target plates can be used for the new scoring.
