London, Sept. 8—Roumanian troops have occupied Orsova, an important Hungarian town on the Danube, according to a despatch to the Times from Bucharest today.

An unofficial despatch from Vienna on Wednesday announced that Orsova had been taken by the Roumanians. Orsova is one of the principal ports on the lower Danube and has considerable commercial importance. It is a few miles above the Iron Gate of the Danube, where the river leaves Hungary and forms the boundary between Roumanian and Northeastern Serbia.

## PARIS SEES **DEFEAT FOR** FOE ON SOMME

Forts Taken Which Germans Called Impregnable

Neutral Writer Finds Further Proof For Assertion That Germany's Hopes Will be Buried on The Western Front

(By Wythe Williams in special cable to The New York Times.) Paris, Sept. 5-After visiting the Somme front early in August, I made the statement, based not on what I was told by military authorities, but on personal observation as a neutral correspondent, that the French offensive on the Somme was only the beginning; that it would ultimately be greater than any previous French offensive, and that it would end only in a crushing defeat for Germany. A few days later, as if in answer to that assertion, a statement appeared in the New York papers, on the authority of a German general, that "the French offensive had failed." Almost in the same breath he remarked that no commander in this war would make a statement for publication, since it showed a

If proof were needed as to the character of the French offensive, the events on the Somme since Saturday go far to supply it. South of the Somme so violent was the French artillery fire that under it the Germans were unable to make their customary counter-attacks, according to Paris.

The Germans are heavily shelling the French in the old first line German trenches a mile in length between the Vauy-Chapitre region and the town of Chenois, in the Verdun sector, which were taken by the French Wednesday night.

In Galicia, the Russians are still actively in the quest of Lemberg, keeping up their pressure against the Austro-Germans westward from the regions of Brzezany and Halicz. Nearby Brzezany the Russians have driven back the Teutons from fortified positions and advanced to the Naraiuwka river, a tributary of the Gnita Lipa, and at some points have crossed the stream. ## London's Millions Cheer as Zeppelin Drops Like Comet To Destruction

Thrilling Story of Fate of Air-raider, Plunging to Earth in Flames, After Shell Finds Its Mark -- City's Defences Now Make Raids Dangerous For the Raiders



Water Street, Halifax

(By Arthur S. Draper in New York Tribune.)

London, Sept. 3.—London has been gunning a long time for the biggest birds in the world, and early this morning she got one. It was one of the nocturnal monsters that hover high above peaceful homes now and then tossing off a ball of fire or some other death-dealing missile—a Zeppelin.

Thirteen of the monsters took part in the most dangerous and elaborate raid yet made. Only three succeeded in getting over London, the rest bombarding with little effect towns and cities along the east coast. As usual, many of the bombs fell into the sea, and the total casualties were very small compared to the effort put forth. So far only two deaths and thirteen injured, including two children, have been reported. None of the casualties was in the metropolitan district of London. Full reports from the country have not yet been received.

The quarry of London's guns came to earth in a little hamlet northwest of the city. It fell in an open field and early risers, or those who had not returned to bed after being awakened about 2 in the morning, were like some prehistoric reptile, lay stretched out, singed and charred.

The quiet country lanes leading through the pleasant fields and neathedgerows to the spot where the wreck had fallen soon resembled the roads on Long Island on the morning of a Vanderbilt cup race. Motors dashed along regardless of the restrictions on the use of petrol. Market wagons lumbered by, filled with entire families. Bicyclists and 'pedestrians slid and plodded through the rain and mith. Nearby lay a smashed propellor blade.

A guard of soldiers was soon thrown around the wreckage, and the bodies of the crew were gathered together and covered by a tarpaulin. There remained a great heap of tangled wires and fused metal, with the long twisted ribs, from which much of the sheathing had been torn, lying like a great snake across the fields. The engines were taken away for inspection by aviation experts.

Not a sign of life was to be found in any of the bodies of the crew when they reached the earth, and it is believed all died quickly in the flaming ship. Some of the bodies had been torn to bits in the explosion which ended the giant's career. Almost all were charred beyond recognition.



German barbarism has harked back to the historic case of Mazeppa in devising methods of punishment for natives of "occupied" Belgium found guilty of ofending against the Kaiser's military laws, according to stories told by sixty-five Belgian refugees who arrived in New York on board the steamship Noordam of the Holland-American line. The new punishment for such offences is called the "Mazeppa game," and consists in tying culprits to the backs of horses and running the animals to their death in deep pits, the story goes. Mrs. A. Frisque, one of the refugees, declared that she had witnessed several instances of this means of torture which she described as horrifying.

"Many Belgian youths have paid the penalty in this way for minor infractions against German military regulations," she said. "I have seen pits filled in this diabolical way until you could see the arms and feet of slain youths sticking above the ground. In most cases the horses chosen to carry the offenders to death are decripit war animals who have outlived their usefulness in dragging artillery pieces or supply wagons."


