Greece Checkmates Bulgaria And Is Mobilizing

Call To Arms For Twenty Classes of Soldiers Is Signed By The King

Enthusiastic Reception of the News by People—Prompt Answer to Bulgarian Action Enlivens Interest in Balkans Situation—Sofia Paper Urges Bulgaria to Join Allies

Athens, Sept. 24.—A decree for general mobilization of twenty classes of Greek soldiers was signed last night by King Constantine and promulgated. The decision of the king has aroused the greatest enthusiasm.

There arrived in the city last night another St. John soldier, who had been doing his share in the British lines in France and Belgium. He is Private Edward McAllister, of City road, who left for the front with the first contingent. He was wounded in last May and after spending several months in a hospital in England was invalided home.

Paris, Sept. 24.—The semi-official newspaper Patris, of Athens, says that the military measures undertaken by Greece show a decision has been reached to meet Bulgaria's move energetically and without delay. It adds that the intention of Greece is to defend her own rights and to fulfill her duty to support Serbia.

PARLIAMENT AT ONCE

Paris, Sept. 24.—The Greek parliament probably will be summoned to meet tomorrow. The classes of 1892 to 1911 are called to the colors.

BULGARIA GOING AHEAD

Paris, Sept. 24.—A message from Sofia to the Havas News Agency makes the definite announcement that mobilization of Bulgaria's military forces, reported to have been postponed, has been decided upon. It says the organ of the Bulgarian government published today a decree ordering mobilization of the classes of 1890 to 1912.

FORTIFYING BLACK SEA PORTS

Athens, Sept. 24.—Diplomatic circles here have been informed that Bulgarian warships, which were stationed at Varna, on the Black Sea, have sought shelter in a neighboring bay. Large numbers of men are working at feverish speed to fortify Bulgarian Black Sea ports. The valuables of the branches of the national bank at Burgas and Varna have been removed to Sofia.

The belief has been expressed in Bulgaria that if that country assays herself on the side of the Teutonic allies, Russia would attempt an invasion through the port of Varna, thirty miles sail from Odessa, although it is strongly fortified.

ABSORBS FRENCH ATTENTION

Paris, Sept. 24.—The Bulgarian situation is absorbing the attention of France to the exclusion of all other topics. Little doubt is felt here that Bulgaria, as for King Ferdinand, has decided to cast its lot with the Central Powers.

"For months," says Jean Herbetie, one of the authorities of France on foreign politics, "the Quadruple Entente has been talking to Bulgaria without acting. During the same period Bulgaria has been preparing to act without talking. The time has come when Bulgaria is acting."

URGES BULGARIA TO JOIN ALLIES

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 24.—An article which may throw some light on the Bulgarian mobilization, appears in the Mit which asks what Bulgaria will do if the Germans appear on its frontiers, since a German invasion in Serbia will be attempted. Replying to its own question, the paper says: "If would mean that the Bulgarians must allow the undisputed passage of German troops through their country. If the Bulgarians consented without making common cause with Germany, then they would be unable to refuse the same privilege to the Russians who might disembark at Varna, on the west shore of the Black Sea. Then the two adversaries could meet to fight on Bulgarian territory to decide the fate of the country and people, if not the fate of the whole war. Thus Bulgaria would emerge ruined like Belgium. Moreover, her honor would be lost. If the Bulgarians joined the Germans, should they triumph, then Bulgaria would be a vassal state of Germany and Austria."

The Mit urges an agreement with the Quadruple Entente on the ground that Bulgaria will be overrun with Germany if Serbia is invaded.

RUSSIA FINDS A GREAT COPPER SUPPLY

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—Vast deposits of copper which were recently discovered in the Yekaterinburg region have yielded 180,000 tons during the first week of their operation. The government will employ the output immediately for the manufacture of munitions.

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—In the first detailed account of the fight for the great Russian stronghold, Novo-Georgievsk, published today in the Russkye Slovo, it is stated that when the German emperor heard that the defenders had decided to remain in the very heart of the German positions, resolved to fight to the last shell, their one thought being to annihilate as many Germans as possible and make them pay a heavy price for success, he was seized with ungodly fury.

Captured Germans were asked why their men killed Russian wounded. "We were ordered not to leave behind us a single living Russian," was their reply. Some of them said that the Kaiser had given instructions that the garrison of Novo-Georgievsk be buried under the walls of the fortress.

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RUSSIA SUMMONS ALL ELIGIBLES HOME FROM CHINA TO GO TO WAR

Reserves of Territorial Army Called Out—Vilna Retreat Masterly—Successes in Fighting on the Eastern Front

London, Sept. 24.—All eligible Russians in China have been called to the colors, under the most recent ukase, according to a Peking despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. It is reported that Harbin and Vladivostok soon will be demoted of men of military age.

An imperial ukase was issued at Petrograd September 16, calling to the colors reserves of the territorial army. The ukase was instructed to determine the ages and the numbers of the reserves and the districts from which they should be called.

London, Sept. 24.—The Times' Petrograd correspondent characterizes the Vilna retreat as one of the most difficult and brilliant Russian exploits of the war, but says the withdrawal began not a moment too soon for a further delay would have enabled the Germans to drive a wedge into the Russian rear.

THE WAR NEWS.
There is one encouraging fact in relation to the struggle between Germany and Russia, and that is that the Russian army, though forced back, are still unbeaten and have inflicted heavy losses upon the Germans. Even if we discount the Russian claim that the Germans have lost 350,000 men in their recent operations in the Vilna region, it is certain that their losses along the whole Russian front have been very great. This is with them a far more serious matter than smaller losses would be for the Russians, since the latter have such immense reserves of men, and have only been handicapped by lack of guns and munitions. This German invasion of Russia has proved a most costly affair, and has failed to secure the desired results. Proceeding farther and farther from his base, and constantly losing men in the attack, the enemy finds always before him a strong but elusive Russian army, giving ground but getting safely away to confront him in a new position. Indeed the Russians have ceased to give ground in Galicia, and are said to be more than holding their own, a condition of affairs which must make its influence felt in the Vilna region. The Russian campaign has proved very costly to both the Germans and the Austrians, and makes their general situation less hopeful.

THE OVERDRAFT POLICY.
The Standard approves of the course of Com. Potts in spending his appropriation during the summer months. It says he was "absolutely correct" in that course, and adds these further comments and queries:—"He is also correct in his opinion that if permission to overdraw is refused he will be forced to discharge his men, but there is another side to the question. The men who will be displaced are, as a rule, the laborers whose wage is small, and who, even in normal times, have difficulty in making income and expenditure meet. If they lose their work how are they to live during the winter months? Will they be able to find other employment in a winter when the supply of men is likely to exceed the demand? Or, will they become public charges to be supported after all by the taxpayer? This is a phase of the situation that might well receive some attention."

Suppose we carry this argument a little farther and make it apply to the other departments. No doubt they also could get more work done in summer than in winter. If every department went the limit in summer, on the assumption that it would be accommodated by an overdraft in the fall, who could tell what the actual expenditure for a year would amount to, and what would be the use of making estimates? If there is greater need to provide work for men in winter, and there is only a certain amount to be spent during the year, why spend it all in the summer? To admit the wisdom of a general and continuous policy of overdrafts would remove every safeguard against extravagant expenditure. Nor would it solve the problem of unemployment next winter to expend more money on the streets during the next two months. The commissioner of sewerage has quite as much right as the commissioner of streets to appeal for an overdraft. He, too, can spend money and provide employment. There is no limit to what could be done if the overdraft policy were generally adopted. The same reasons advanced last spring in opposition to very heavy civic expenditures exist today. If an emergency arises, aid employment must be found for men in distress, there can be no doubt the council and the citizens will approve of prompt action; but why exploit the poor man, who is also one of the taxpayers, to create sympathy for a general policy of spending in a department a great deal more money than the appropriation provided?

Yesterday's fire on the West Side emphasizes the need of a better water service, and it must be provided.
Dr. Townsend makes a strong plea for medical inspection in the public schools. Why has action in this matter been so long delayed in St. John?
This evening's meetings in various parts of the city and Parville should still further fix public attention on the fact that more recruits are needed, and needed now.

BRITISH AND OTHER SHIPS.
The following review from Bradstreet's gives official confirmation of the statement that the German submarine policy has not affected British shipping to any serious extent, and that Britain now has more shipping than before the war:—"Lloyd's Register of Shipping for 1915-16 shows that, notwithstanding the extraordinary vessel losses of the past few months, the tonnage of the world in vessels of 100 tons and upward has actually increased from 46,017,027 tons in 1914 to 49,391,799 tons. Of this increase steamers alone have accounted for 122,118 tons, their total tonnage having risen from 45,408,977 to 45,729,508. Sailing vessels show a decrease in number from 6,832 to 6,212 and in tonnage from 8,068,075 to 8,332,251. Another feature of the new issue of the shipping register is that the United States has assumed second place in the rank of tonnage of vessels owned. The most notable changes in the statistics of tonnage owned in the various maritime countries since the war, as published in the 1915-16 register of shipping, are given below:—

Returned Soldier, "Bud" Tippet, Centre of Demonstration

AUTOMOBILE PARADE

Rally in School Grounds and Speeches to Bring Out Recruits — Wounded Fairville Soldier Warmly Welcomed Home

Tonight Fairville will officially celebrate the home coming of Bud Tippet, wounded in the battle of Langemarck and judged by the operations there to be a great celebration.

The crowd that thronged the street in front of the Tippet home, the ringing of both fire bells, the huge bonfire and fireworks of last evening indicated the spirit of the people toward the returned soldier and tonight Bud is to be one of the speakers at a great meeting to be held in the school house field. Electric lights have been installed and speaking will be from the platform of the children's side, which is suitably decorated with flags and bunting.

W. J. Earle is to be chairman of the meeting and the councillors are also taking an active part in the arrangements.

At 7:30 p. m. twelve decorated automobiles will leave the Tippet home on Main street. In one of the cars Private Tippet will ride and immediately following the local clergymen, councillors, and others. The auto parade is to proceed slowly with much tooting of horns as far as Tilton's Corner where the Carleton Cornet Band will be met. Then headed by the band the parade will return and proceed through Fairville to the school field.

Here patriotic and welcome speeches will be made by Hon. H. A. McKeown, A. M. Belding, Private Tippet, Mayor Prink, Commissioner Wigmore, local clergymen and councillors.

Military and medical officers will also be on hand to look after recruits and it is planned to make this a joint welcome home celebration for Private Tippet and an opportunity for the young men of Lancaster to offer themselves for service.

In a letter received this week from Private Harold Duplissa, now in the trenches to his brother in Fairville he asks "Why are not more fellows enlisting to come out here and help us finish this job. It's a big one and we need more men."

It is believed the appeal of Private Tippet and the other speakers this evening should have a marked influence on recruiting in Fairville, but at any rate a big time is looked for.

When the C. P. R. pulled into the depot last evening, as Private Tippet stepped from the train, a hearty roar of cheers went up from many throats to do him honor as one who had "done his bit" in France, one who had made severe sacrifice, and who had reflected renown on Fairville.

He was much overcome by the reception tendered him by the people of his home town and heartily acknowledged their greetings. Brought to a deep tan from his months of exposure to sun and storm, Private Tippet looks in the very pink of condition, but his friends will regret to hear that he may be maimed for life. He is lame and one of his arms is a sling, the effects of a bullet wound while he was fighting with the 14th Coy. at Montreuil early in February.

Several automobiles, bedecked with flags, were awaiting his arrival at the Union depot and he was escorted to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Tippet, Main street, Fairville, leaving the depot amid the cheers of the gathering and returning to his home with a nod to friend after friend, and many a hearty handshake from others who pressed up to the car. Naturally, his family was overjoyed at his homecoming, and their pardonable pride is shared by every resident of Fairville, where the name of "Bud" Tippet stands for "Hero" with a capital "H," as well as by great numbers of city people who have followed his career with interest.

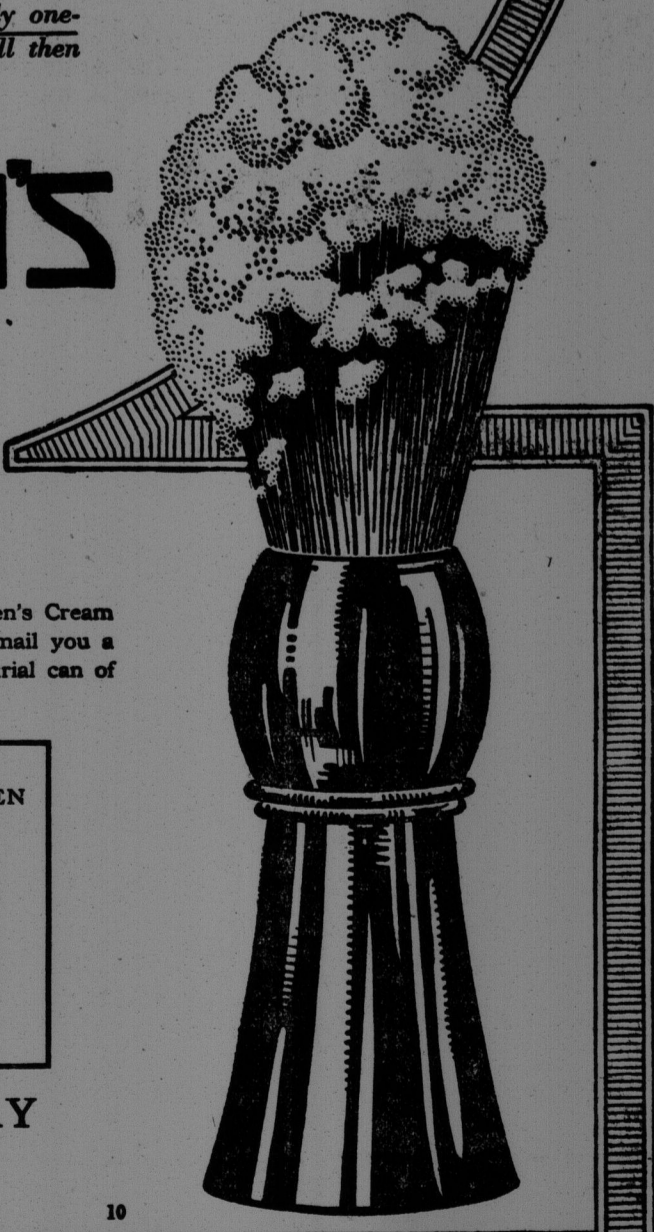

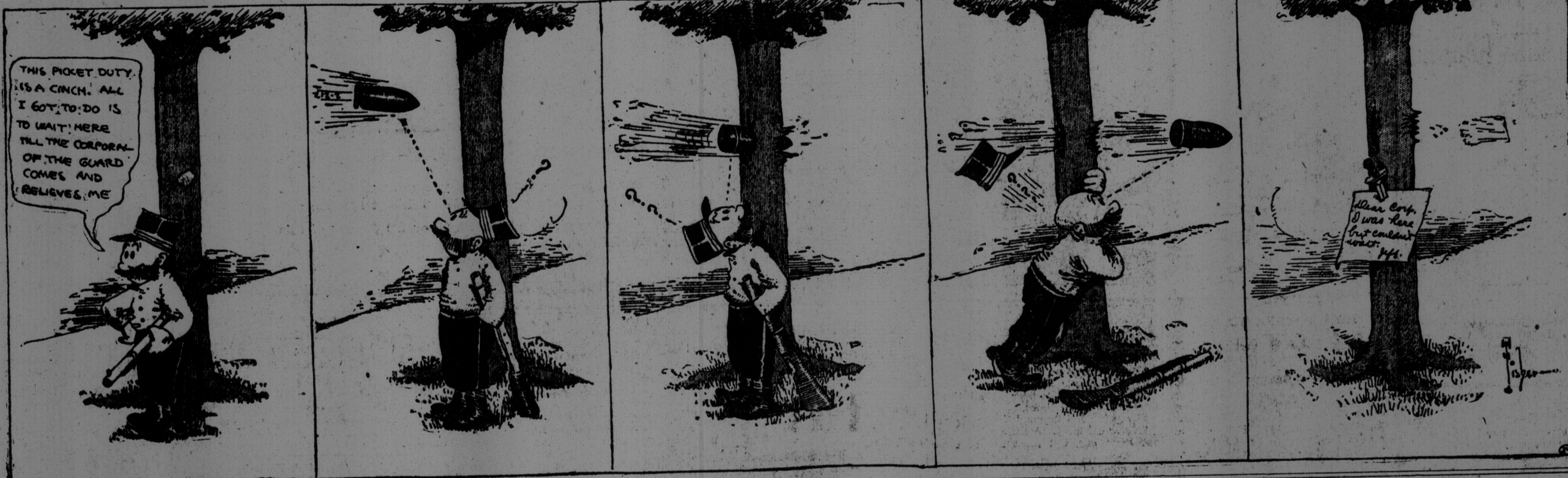

ITALIANS PREPARING
BIG MUNITION SUPPLY

Establishing Thirty-three Factories—Will Free Themselves From German Monopolies

Turin, Sept. 24.—Italy's determination not only to fight out the war to a successful finish, but further to insure industrial emancipation from Austro-German monopolies when the war becomes a thing of the past, is illustrated afresh in a colossal scheme for the realization of which the first practical steps have already been taken.

Somewhere in Italy an enormous area of ground has been purchased very cheaply for \$400,000, on which ninety-three separate factories are to be built immediately for the manufacture of munitions needed in the present war.

Each section of the works will be divided by some two miles from its neighbor. At the outset the staff will comprise 8,000 workmen. Once their temporary purpose is accomplished, the factories will be transformed into laboratories for the production of chemicals and aniline dyes, for which Italy has hitherto been almost entirely dependent upon Germany.
