Certain of Victory, British Leader Urges Need of Plenty Of Says Viviani

Ammunition

Gueret, France, April 18—"Germany, ignorant of the soul of France, now is being punished for her mistake," was a declaration made by Premier Viviani at the opening of the departmental council of Creuse, vesterday. "She thought to find," he continued, "a divided, frivolous nation, but she met an iron wall against whose heroic resistance, the flower of her army was broken. Then, behold, the iron wall moved, supple and unbreakable, toward the western front, crushing little by little, the army the chiefs of which were not prepared for so long and bitter a struggle.

"The French method, for the British expeditionary force on the continent, which was read at a recrutting meeting held here last night, urged the necessity for munitions and said:—

"I want to pound the enemy and go on pounding them regardless of expenses, regardles of the number of shells I use, because by doing so I am saving the lives of our gallant men. The more ammunition the less danger to our fine the victory of justice. Kaiser At Head Of Forces Trying To Keep Back Russian Army

That is Explanation of Teutonic Offensive — Austrians Pull Together Again and Force Re-arranging of Grand Duke's Plans

Petrograd, April 13—Emperor William is personally directing operations of the Austro-German armies in the Carpathians, according to a semi-official statement issued here today. This attributes the sudden Teutonic offensive in the Stryj region to the arrival of the Kaiser, and an order from him to cut through the Russian's left wing in order to force an abandonment of the attacks being made upon the Austro-German position at Usezok Pass.

The Bourse Gazette's correspondent at Lemberg telegraphs that the Austrians, previously reported on the verge of complete retreat, have launched fierce attacks upon the Russians along the Stryj, Opoer and Swica Rivers. To oppose these a re-arrangement of the Russian forces has been found necessary, reinforcements are being rushed to this region, where the Austrians captured Hill No. 992, a dominant strategical position.

General Alexander Linsingen of the German army, with 280,000 sol inducting the Stryj region of operations, having superseded the Austrian cander there. He has under his control five armies. Simultaneously with offensive in the Stryj region of Galicia, the Germans in Northern Poland have re-opened their attacks along the Narew-Bobr front, again shelling Ossewice and trying to pierce the Russian lines at Jebwabno.

Borden Government

Paris, April 13—War correspondents are leaving for Italy in the belief that fighting will begin there at the end of April.

No Italian ships are allowed to pass through the Suez Canal or Gibraltar Strait, unless their manifests are stamped by British consults certifying that their cargoes are not consigned to or from Germany. Significance is attached to the fact that Italy agreed to this plan to help the British blockade.

FURTHER RESTRICTIONS ON LIQUOR SALE IN P. E. ISLAND

New Amendments to Prohibition Act
Before Legislature—Government's At-

Charlottetown, P.E.I., April 12—The prohibition act amendments now before the legislature prohibit the sale of all fermented or malt beer of any kind, irrespective of the amount of alcohol it contains. Heretofore beer which contained up to 3 per cent of alcohol could be sold.

Another amendment provides that no druggist shall sell intoxicating liquor, either as a medicine or as part of a prescription, unless such druggist is registered. Any registered druggist who commits a violation of the act may have his name removed from the register.

There is another clause with respect to offences, first, second, third and so on. It simplifies greatly the work of the clerk of the court, requires merely to state the dates of previous offences, if any, and reduces to a minimum mistakes in making out informations.

The premier led off the debate on the amendments with a three hours' speech, in which he sought to defend the government against the attacks of the Temperance Alliance. Other members of the government joined in, bitterly attacking the alliance. The latter is preparing a complete reply to the charges.

THE SOLDIERS' BOOTS

Ottawa, April 12—The bad boots supplied to Canada's soldiers are being whitewashed, under government orders. The coat of kalsomine is being made thick and strong in the hope that it may cover up the holes, the splits, the spongy soles, the broken uppers and other frailities, which were sworn to in the evidence of the men who had to wear them.

WHEN the treaty of peace is signed in Berlin, a new and free Germany will arise from the ashes. As a business competitor it will be more aggressive than the Germany of the

After the war of 1870 France paid her billion-dollar war in-

demnity to Germany with a shrug of the shoulders and became one of the great creditor nations of the world. Will Germany do less? Is it not probable that with its enormous and efficient industrial system it will do even better? Germany must gain its revival from its exports. It must pro-

duce for other nations and pay its debts in manufactured products. The "Made in Germany" label is not popular in Canada at the present time. How long will that sentiment last? What is the usual course in analogous cases?

A brutal criminal is not popular. He might be in danger of lynch law were indignant citizens able to lay hands on him. After his trial and conviction, however, our tenderly sympathetic people send comforts and luxuries to his cell and sign petitions for a commutation of his sentence, while the less emotional members of the community simply forget. This kindly human spirit that occasionaly is misdirected denotes a tendency that it is well to note.

A favorite trick of some salemen is to insult a prospective customer and then abjectly ask his pardon. In the fulness of his forgiveness, and to demonstrate that there is no ill-will, the unsuspecting prospect signs the dotted line on the order blank.

"Made in Germany" will not continue to be unpopular. The danger is that it may become too popular; that our sympathy for

the "poor Germans" may affect our better judgment and our sense of justice towards the Canadian manufacturers, who have been ever true and faithful to British interests.

It is well to face frankly the peculiarities of popular sentiment. In fact, it is essential that this should be done by those who depend upon public approval for the sale of their goods. It requires only a slight knowledge of human nature to anticipate the indifference that will follow the present outburst of patriotic fervor.

Now is the time, when imports are discontinued, to get the Canadian people to acquire the habit of asking for Canadian brands; not because they are Canadian, but because the goods are right and the prices fair. Undue emphasis on the Canadian-made feature is apt to be ephemeral in its appeal. The present passionate patriotism is too intense to be abiding; but an acquired habit is more than second nature—it IS nature. On the other hand, when the Empire is no longer in danger we will return to our old thoughtless ways. We will resume our criticisms of the tariff. We will do our best as individuals to buy in the cheapest market and sell in the dearest.

Now is the time to prepare and to give Canadian business an impetus that will carry it through the period of reaction, and overcome the sentimentalism of newly-awakened sympathies. A brand thoroughly established in public esteem on its merits and by its publicity is proof against the ebb and flow of the tide of impulsiveness or the stagnation of indifference.

Now is the time to entrench a business against the possibility of successful assault. Now is the time to prepare for more war. a war of aggressive competition, that will be quite as vital to our commercial interests as is the clash of arms in Europe.

BERMANS SO FAR UNABLE TO AVENGE DEFEAT BY BRITISH

London, April 12—"It is a significant fact that although a month thas passed since the action of Neuve Chapelle, the enemy has made no attempt to retaliate in any quarter but has remained inactive while we have established ourselves securely on the ground won," is a declaration made by the "eye-witness" attached to British army headquarters on the continent in a communication dated April 9.

"Looking back, over the past four months, it is instructive to note the gradual weakening of the German resistance on our front. Formerly any offensive action on our part was met with an immediate counter stroke. This is the first occasion on which the enemy has made no reply at all. This does not mean, of course, that their resist-

made no reply at all. This does not mean, of course, that their resistance is collapsing, but the Germans have none the less admitted that with the troops at their disposal at this front they are unable to avenge their defeat.
