Paris, April 13.—Germany has failed to pay to Bulgaria the portion of a loan which she agreed to remit on April 1, according to a Sofia special to the Petit Parisien, which says it is believed Germany distrusts the Bulgarian attitude and suspects she already has decided to join the allies.

PROSPECTS FOR STREAM DRIVING ARE EXCELLENT

John Kilburn Home From Head Waters—Damage by Freshet—Funeral of Mr. Babbitt

Frederton, N. B., April 13.—John Kilburn returned yesterday from the scene of his lumbering operations in Quebec. He says there is heavy ice in the streams and lakes and the outlook for driving appears excellent. Last year driving started on May 7 but it is expected to be earlier this year.

Small shanties owned by the St. John River Log Driving Co. and stored in Nashua were carried away by the ice freshet. Fraser Limited lost 40 pieces of lumber and several rafters were driven ashore and broken up.

The ice jam which had formed above the city broke away at twelve o'clock last night and navigation is now open. The ice was badly honeycombed and did no damage. The river is well filled with broken ice and the water is rising quite rapidly. Reports from up river state that the river is open to Grand Falls.

The funeral of Geo. N. Governor Wood, accompanied by his private secretary, and A. D. C. occupied a prominent place in the procession, and was followed by Premier Clarke and members of the government and legislature.

"There has been a good consumption during the last month with values fully maintained and light stocks remain on hand. The freight question continues to present difficulties and restrict the import. Pitch pine has gone into the market more freely. Hewn timber is in demand and prices are improving. Lumber is wanted especially in the lower qualities. U. S. A. hardwoods—Values are firm and the import much curtailed, largely owing to the difficulty in obtaining space. Spruce deals are steady with an upward tendency. Chartering has been almost confined to smaller tonnage and a large fleet has been secured, which has somewhat eased the difficulties owing to the absence of steamers. Freight keep high and are likely to go higher. Haddock is in more demand.

Order Issued to Italian Army Officers is War-Like

Rome, April 13.—An order is printed in the military journal directing all army officers to dull the metal on their uniforms and the scabbards of their swords. This is a measure which usually is adopted at the end of a war.

Rome, April 13.—A long audience granted by King Victor Emmanuel to Foreign Minister Sonnino yesterday followed by a session of the council of ministers, the first since March 23, resulted in the circulation of many wild rumors regarding a decision as to Italy's attitude concerning the war. A semi-official statement, however, denies that any such action had been taken.

Looks More Like It. London, April 13.—The Daily Mail's Milan correspondent telegraphs: "I learn that provisions already has been against Italy's participation in the war, on his arrival in Turin met some intimate friends with the remark: 'War is inevitable.'"

Today the Corriere Della Sera publishes articles stating that the hour of Italy's supreme decision approaches, but that there is no alternative to war. It seems that provision already has been made for lodging the general staff in a certain town at the commencement of war.

DO NOT RELISH TRENCH WARFARE

Big Earth Quakes Prevent Cavalry Fighting

THE ENEMY'S HORSEMEN

Not so Good as Infantry or Artillery is the View of the British Mounted Troops

British Headquarters in France, via London, March 17.—No question regarding the future is answered with so much hesitation as that concerning the work of the cavalry. The drawing of a great trench is a vital thing in war because when only one man from a section can be left to look after the horses they cannot be adequately groomed or cared for while the weather is in progress being reduced by the wrong sort of work the horses are getting out of condition.

The British cavalry here the brunt of some of the most exciting fighting in Flanders, and every man of every man made use of, wastefully or otherwise, and splendidly as they acquitted themselves. Indeed, just because they did so splendidly, the work told upon their physical efficiency, which they have only recently been able to recover.

Before very long, however, there again will be a fine cavalry force at the disposal of the British command. It is concerned in the use to which it may be put. Called upon to undertake the most exacting work from the very moment it detached at the front, and at a season when it was some way from having arrived at its hardest condition, it responded to every test with which it could have been invested.

View on German Cavalry. Very noticeable in that connection, too, is the different regard which the various arms extend to their opponents. The German tanks are the object of the most intense interest, and the superior on which every onlooker has commented, says very little about it. Instead, he is particularly interested in the foot's cunning and marksmanship. The infantryman also is not in the least inclined to undervalue his opponent's pluck, persistency and adroit devices.

"He is so good a soldier one might easily get to like him if he wasn't such a villain," said one field officer regretfully.

But the cavalryman's attitude is different altogether. Though all his fighting in the saddle and out of it, has been done with the odds and often with unreasonable odds against him, he has been entirely unimpressed with the enemy's ability. From scores of cavalry officers not a single favorable opinion could be gleaned of the German horseman, as a man or as a soldier. In those early days when the German millions were sweeping Belgium empty of opposition, it would be supposed that an outlook might have been found for an outlet that cavalry had in them, but the evidence seems conclusive that it never was safe to expect German cavalry to stand under the odds were at least three to one in their favor, and even at that they were invariably beaten.

They appeared to have no confidence in themselves, in their horses, in their arms or in their leaders. At anything like even numbers they never waited to dispute a point if they could avoid it by withdrawing.

"With a squadron and a half we went to a farm and the German cavalry came out, but they did not wait for us to take us on," and from every side came confirmation of this curious disinclination to assume the particular offensive which was about all one did expect from the German cavalry. Horsemen, one doubt led them to back them against regular blue-clad them to be horse masters one knew buckets of any ship in the fleet.

THE QUICKSTEP SOLD. Well Known Fishing Schooner Goes to Newfoundland.

Digby, N. S., April 13.—D. Spagnola & Co. has sold for the ship, a well known fishing schooner, the Quikstep, to W. Bennett of Port of Basque, N.B. Captain Bennett is here and his crew is expected to arrive tomorrow or Thursday. The vessel will sail for her new home port on Thursday.

The Quikstep was home in the United States, and, although sailing out of Digby for many years remained under the American flag, landing her cargo in the United States until after she was admitted free of duty, when she was placed under the British flag. She has recently been commanded by Captain Arthur Longmire, one of Digby's most successful fishing skippers, and during the last year has landed a lot of fish both at Yarmouth and Digby.

GERMAN RESERVES CALLED TO OVERTAKE HUNGARIANS. Civil War Threatened Behind Armes. Now Facing Russians May Force Von Hindenburg to Readjust Whole Plan of Campaign.

Petrograd, April 13.—Already there are remarkable signs that the more serious situation in the east is beginning to threaten reverse.

Should the Hungarian crisis burst into a civil war behind the armies now facing the Russians, it is certain Von Hindenburg will immediately abandon his lines facing Warsaw, with their main German army into western Poland, sending Mackensen's forces south again to try to get below the Russian position in Hungary. The Germans in the north have only one officer for about 400 men.

FACTORY CHIMNEY SMOKE. The board of trade is investigating methods adopted in other cities to cope with the smoke nuisance, as result of complaints that have been made to them by local people.

The manufacturers of the city are for the most part quite as much interested in the suppression of smoke in their chimneys as are the people who are complaining. One manufacturer said that it was difficult to get an effective stoker. He had been pursuing enquiries for some time without satisfactory result. With proper firing, he remarked much smoke might be avoided, but unfortunately careful firemen were not always available.

A manager of another large city concern said that his company had recently installed a new boiler with chain grate stoker, and at least 60 per cent. of the time there was no smoke. Where a load varies greatly, it is sometimes necessary to force a boiler for a short time in order to get a heavy demand. DO NOT RELISH TRENCH WARFARE

THE ENEMY'S HORSEMEN

Not so Good as Infantry or Artillery is the View of the British Mounted Troops

British Headquarters in France, via London, March 17.—No question regarding the future is answered with so much hesitation as that concerning the work of the cavalry. The drawing of a great trench is a vital thing in war because when only one man from a section can be left to look after the horses they cannot be adequately groomed or cared for while the weather is in progress being reduced by the wrong sort of work the horses are getting out of condition.

The British cavalry here the brunt of some of the most exciting fighting in Flanders, and every man of every man made use of, wastefully or otherwise, and splendidly as they acquitted themselves. Indeed, just because they did so splendidly, the work told upon their physical efficiency, which they have only recently been able to recover.

Before very long, however, there again will be a fine cavalry force at the disposal of the British command. It is concerned in the use to which it may be put. Called upon to undertake the most exacting work from the very moment it detached at the front, and at a season when it was some way from having arrived at its hardest condition, it responded to every test with which it could have been invested.

View on German Cavalry. Very noticeable in that connection, too, is the different regard which the various arms extend to their opponents. The German tanks are the object of the most intense interest, and the superior on which every onlooker has commented, says very little about it. Instead, he is particularly interested in the foot's cunning and marksmanship. The infantryman also is not in the least inclined to undervalue his opponent's pluck, persistency and adroit devices.

"He is so good a soldier one might easily get to like him if he wasn't such a villain," said one field officer regretfully.

But the cavalryman's attitude is different altogether. Though all his fighting in the saddle and out of it, has been done with the odds and often with unreasonable odds against him, he has been entirely unimpressed with the enemy's ability. From scores of cavalry officers not a single favorable opinion could be gleaned of the German horseman, as a man or as a soldier. In those early days when the German millions were sweeping Belgium empty of opposition, it would be supposed that an outlook might have been found for an outlet that cavalry had in them, but the evidence seems conclusive that it never was safe to expect German cavalry to stand under the odds were at least three to one in their favor, and even at that they were invariably beaten.

They appeared to have no confidence in themselves, in their horses, in their arms or in their leaders. At anything like even numbers they never waited to dispute a point if they could avoid it by withdrawing.

RURAL CITIZENSHIP. Studies in Rural citizenship, a pamphlet of eighty-eight pages, is a very significant publication for two reasons:— (1) It is sent out by the Canadian Farmers' Association. The association has come to see that improvement in conditions of agricultural life, as is true of all progress, depends on character and ability of the people. The facts it gives though great are less important than the broad vision it opens up and the thought it challenges. It is decidedly provocative. In two places it says statements are purposely made which the reader may not agree.

The topics for discussion are often exceedingly well chosen. For example, resolved: "A high school education is more to a boy than a half-section of land." "Students of the ministry should take a course in agriculture." "Our social system and the upkeep of public roads should be handed over to private enterprise." "Attendance at political conventions should be made compulsory on a family should have two votes," etc. Another good feature is that references to authorities are given so that any society can easily get valuable works of reference. These studies comprise changed conditions, country life problem with proposed solutions, the home school, church social life, taxation, tariff, public ownership, citizenship, rural national peace—each treated by a specialist and all edited by Rev. J. S. Woodworth. The studies have been authorized by the Canadian Council of Agriculture, and copies can be got from the secretary, R. McKinnis, 406 Chamberlain street, Winnipeg. These studies would be most stimulating for Young People's Societies and all rural leaders should know this little book.

### THE SOLDIERS' BOOTS

Ottawa, April 12.—The bad boots supplied to Canada's soldiers are being whitewashed under government orders. The coat of kalsomine is being made thick and strong in the hope that it may cover up the holes, the splits, the spongy soles, the broken uppers and other frailties, which were sworn to in the evidence of the men who had to wear them.

All day parliament debated the majority and minority reports. It is a straight partisan report, the government industriously applying the whitewash, the opposition as vigorously exposing the ugly actuality. Each of the seven members of the committee spoke. That took all day and night.

Then Premier Borden and General Hughes made the final apology. The latter declared that as a result of the cry of scandal an order from the Russian government for \$3,000,000 worth of boots to be made in Canada had been cancelled.

The majority report was adopted after midnight on a party division and the house adjourned.

### SCHOOL MATTERS



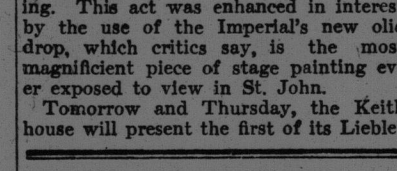

The dispatch gives the prisoners by nationality as follows: French, 3,868 officers and 288,496 men; Russian, 5,140 officers and 504,210 men; Belgian, 647 officers and 29,620 men; British, 520 officers and 39,857 men.

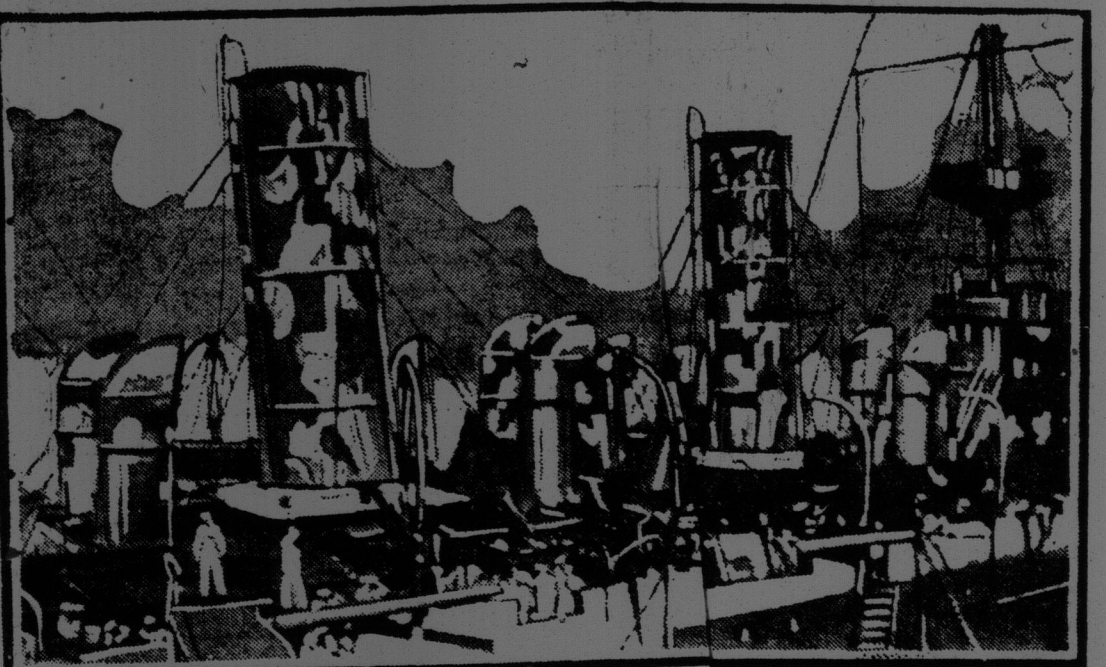

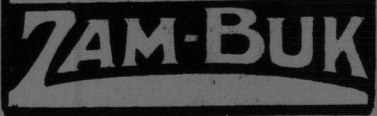

SUBMARINES

Britain's first submarines, dating from 1901, were five of the American type that were named after their inventor, John P. Holland. These had a displacement of only 120 tons, were 68 1/2 feet long, travelled eight knots an hour on the surface, and carried a crew of seven men.

Their sole armament was one torpedo tube, firing an eighteen inch torpedo. A year later Vickers, Sons & Maxims, of Barrow, built the first of the A class of submarines to be followed in intervals by classes B, C, D, and E, each larger and much more efficient than its predecessor.

When war broke out in addition to an extensive fleet of the older vessels, Britain possessed actually about some twenty-five submarines of the most recent design, having a displacement of 800 tons or more, a length of 176 feet, and beam 22 feet 4 inches. Their surface speed exceeds seventeen knots an hour, and they carry a crew of twenty-eight. These boats have four torpedo tubes, discharging 21-inch torpedoes of immensely improved range and power.

**GOLD WATCH FOR COLONEL RAMSEY**

Presentation to Head of Canadian Railway Construction Corps

His friends in St. John, where he has been stationed in command of his unit, the Canadian Railway Construction Corps, will be interested to know that Lieut. Col. C. W. P. Ramsey was tendered a complimentary dinner in Montreal last night. During the evening a gold military wrist watch was presented to him. Colonel Ramsey is expected to return to the city in a few days.

The corps today carried on routine activities in company drill but is planning for more extensive operations so soon as mobilization is nearer to completion. Captain Grant, adjutant with the corps, is in Halifax today.

**HERE IS WAR TAX POINT SETTLED**

Definite Instructions as to Railway and Steamship Tickets

Since the first announcement of war taxes on railway tickets interest has awaited further details in St. John in regard to the suburbanites. Today official word was received, applicable to the L. C. R. Co. P. R. that "a commutation ticket is taxable on the whole amount paid for it at the time of purchase whether it covers ten trips, forty-six trips or fifty-five trips," and the same rule is applied to mileage books. As regards excursion or party tickets they are taxable on the whole amount paid for the movement of the party or gang and not on the separate fare for each individual.

The tax applies to all kinds of tickets for an amount above \$1, so that it would not only include regular passage on trains but traffic on river steamers where the fare is beyond that sum, children's or half tickets, commercial travelers' tickets and all other tickets. Ten cents is the tax on each berth in a sleeping car besides the regular fare and five cents on each seat bought. On a drawing room in a sleeper the tax is thirty cents for three berths or six seats, or twenty-five cents where it contains but five seats.

The tax on a graduating scale on the straight fare, ranging from five cents to \$1.50 in accordance with the amounts ranging from \$1 to \$150 with five cents for every \$5 or fraction thereof additional, in excess of \$150. Purchasers are warned that neglect or refusal to comply with the regulations will cause a penalty not exceeding \$50.

**COMMISSIONER'S SON OFF TO EAST AFRICA**

Harold McLellan, After Trip From South America Enlists in England For Foreign Service

Harold McLellan, son of Commissioner R. H. McLellan, may be, by this time, on his way to East Africa. Mr. McLellan was in South America when war broke out, and left for the old country at his own expense to take a hand.

In a letter received today by the commissioner, his son informs him of his arrival in England. He visited Leeds on the invitation of friends and while there enlisted with a Company, Royal Fusiliers, known as the "Frontier Guardsmen."

The letter, written on March 30, also conveyed the information that the regiment expected to leave during the next week for East Africa.

**CORPORAL WILSON WRITES OF DANGEROUS PATROL WORK**

Thomas L. Wilson of Chesley street, received a letter from his brother Corporal Walter Wilson, who is with the British force in France. He said that he was in the best of health. Shells were constantly bursting all around their quarters. He had been assigned to patrol duty, which meant a constant look-out for spies, snipers and carrier dogs. He narrated one of his night adventures while endeavoring to detect a night signaler and told about being fired upon by the enemy although it was quite impossible to tell from whence the bullets came. He said it was most exciting work although unquestionably dangerous. They were scouting around the greater part of the night and had met with considerable success. No lights, he said, are allowed in any of the soldiers' quarters as they would make an easy mark for the German gunners. He mentioned two other St. John boys who are billeted near his company, Fred Carson and Walter Logan. Both, he said, were in the best of health.

**BOMBARDIER SHEAR HEARD FROM**

Writing under date of March 27, Bombardier F. H. Shear, who is now on the firing line, says:—

"I am in the best of health. We are still giving big and little Willie a few lessons in right and justice, and I don't think they will forget them in a hurry. I am still in the same outfit, No. 3 Section, Divisional Ammunition Column, First Canadian Division, British Expeditionary Force. I hope the boys in St. John are all doing their bit to help the cause of old England. We are not going to come back to St. John without letting the Germans hear from us."

**FROM THE FIRING LINE**

Mrs. Woodford Stephens, of Sackville, received a letter recently from Private Jack Ayer who is fighting in the British lines in France. Private Ayer's letter was written on the 10th of March and was received on March 29th. He is a Point de Bute boy. He says the British are driving the Germans back and taking well established positions. Every day sees new positions established.

"The French people," he says, "have every confidence in the success of the Allies and without hesitancy are putting in their crops almost directly under fire of the Germans."

**TO RESUME WORK**

Sackville Tribune—The Fawcett foundry which has been closed for some months will it is expected, resume operations on Wednesday. The same number of men will receive employment and will be employed for the same hours each day as previous to the closing down.
