REPORT.

To the Officers and Brothers of the G. D. of the S. of T. in C. W .:-

To this end, let a plan be suggested and adopted by a committee appointed for the purpose, of increasing the efficiency and zeal of the living Divisions, and waking the dead. For not only have we a mighty work to do in securing the law of right, but upon this order will rest the onus of enforcing the laws.

I am happy to report a desirable alteration made by the N. D., in the Constitution of Subordinate Divisions, in placing the financial affairs of the Divisions under their own control. It is to be regretted that these changes had not taken place two or three years since; had such been the case, hundreds of Divisions now dead, would be now working nobly for the cause—such was the testimony of many at the N. D., when we were contending for these changes. I would also direct your attention to the addition made to the work of the order at the last Session of the N. D., by the adoption of three degrees; the degrees have been adopted by every G. D., before whom this addition of N. D. has been brought. It would be well for this G. D. to decide now, whether we shall avail ourselves of this additional feature of our Order, and if so, how the degrees are to be conferred—now or at some meeting appointed for that purpose, or at both.

I regret that many of my deputies have not had time to read their commissions; many of them instead of reporting at the close of each quarter, as their commission requires, have not reported at all. The great majority have and satisfactorily

I feel under great personal obligations to him for the gentlemanly, kind, and business manner in which he has performed many duties which I should have done, but of which he was ever willing to relieve me. In conclusion, I believe the Order is stronger than when we last met, and I believe that by increased energy and devotedness to the interests of the cause on the part of the members of this body, the order might be restored to its original strength and power.

REPORT.

OFFICE OF GRAND SCRIBE, KINGSTON, 21ST OCTOBER, 1854.

To the Grand Division of Canada West, Sons of Temperance.

OFFICERS AND REPRESENTATIVES:—Permitted by a kind Providence to assemble again at this our Sixth Annual Session, it devolves upon me to report the transactions of this office for the past term, and the condition of the order under this jurisdiction; and so far as has come to my knowledge no

question of importance has disturbed the harmony of the Subordinate Divisions, many of which show a decided improvement, and an earnest spirit to advance the Temperance Reformation and the principles of our beloved order.

The following statement of the principal transactions of this office since the

Immediately after the May Session the blank forms of Memorials, praying for the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, were printed and forwarded to Subordinate Divisions, with instructions, but owing to the shortness of time, and the formatical weeked their destination previously to the unexpected discount of the province of the shortness of time, only a few Memorials reached their destination previously to the unexpected dissolution of the Parliament: consequently our efforts on that occasion were

The Memorials from the Grand Division were also duly forwarded, and for the reasons previously explained, the Hon. M. Cameron deemed it advisable to defer the presentation of the same until the meeting of the next Parliament.

In accordance with the wishes of the Grand Division, the proceedings of the

last Session were printed in a neat form, and expeditiously; and in addition to the usual distribution of them, one copy was forwarded to each member of the

Legislative Assembly.

Due notice by advertisement was given of the liberal premium offered for Due notice by advertisement was given of the best Essay advocating the passage of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and previous to the 1st day of August, thirty-two MSS Essays were received, some of them from the extreme parts of the Province, and the neighboring State of New York. The adjudicators, after a careful reading and investigation into the merits of the several Essays, decided upon awarding the premium to Mr. William Smith, for the Essay entitled, "Shall we have a Prohibitory Liquor Law." The adjudicators in their report will supply other information of the result of their labors. 15,000 copies of the Prize Essay were ordered to be printed, about 10,000 copies have been ordered by the Subordinate Divisions, and nearly that quantity has been already issued at cost price—3s. 4d. per 100. I would merely remark that the rejected Essays were returned to the authors, with the respectful thanks of this Grand Division accompanying the same.

At the late Session of the National Division, held at St. John, New-Brunswick, some important alterations in the Constitution of the Order were made, and as these radical changes are momentous, I submit the Synopsis received

SYNOPSIS OF THE PRINCIPAL ENACTMENTS

Of the National Division, Sons of Temperance, of N. A., at its Eleventh Annual Session, held in Saint John, New-Brunswick, June, 1854.

ALTERATIONS, &c., IN CONSTITUTIONS.

GRAND DIVISION .- Rule XV. as amended .- "Each Subordinate Division

shall pay not more than twenty cents per quarter for each of its members whose name may appear on the F. S.'s books, &c."

SUBORDINATE DIVISION.—ART. V.—Sec. I.—No person shall be initiated into the Division under sixteen years of age, nor for a less sum than one dollar; provided, that no Youth shall have the right to vote in Division, on any proposition, or hold office, or receive the Degrees until he shall have arrived at the age of eighteen years; and to this end, on the proposal of any Youth under age of eighteen years; and to this end, on the proposal of any Youth under eighteen years of age, the day and year of his birth shall be stated as near as

may be.

Sec. 2.—"No person shall be admitted," &c., &c., provided that persons of old age, or under disability or disease may be admitted, but remain in the position of members not entitled to benefits, the amount of their initiation fees and weekly dues to be regulated by each Division.

Art. IX.—Sec. 1.—After a Division has been instituted three terms, no Brother shall be eligible to the office of W. P. unless he has served two terms in a subordinate office or offices, or as Chaplain.

Article X.—Sec. 1.—It is the duty of every member who has evidence that another has violated Article 2, to prefer the charge and specify the offence to the Division within three weeks after coming into possession of such evidence.

Sec. 2.—The charge for violation of Article II, shall be presented in writing, duly signed, when it shall be referred to a committee of five members, who

signed, when it shall be referred to a committee of five members, who shall as soon as practicable, summon the parties and investigate the matter.

Sec. 3.—The Committee shall organise by appointing a chairman and secretary. The secretary shall make a correct record of the proceedings, with such testimony as may be presented, which record shall be produced to the Division on the call of any member, after the Committee have reported.

Sec. 4.—If the Committee agree that the charge is sustained, they shall report the fact to the Division by resolution, with a second resolution to the effect that the member be reinstated, if they think proper, which report and resolutions shall lie upon the table at least one week, and the offending member shall be notified of the character of the resolutions by the R. S., and requested to be present at the time appointed for considering the same, with a view of giving an opportunity to make a defence.

Sec. 5.—If the Committee agree that the charge is not sustained, they shall

report a resolution to that effect, and if the resolution be adopted, the charge

shall be dismissed.

shall be dismissed.

Sec. 6.—When the Committee report the charge sustained, and a majority of the members present at a regular meeting, ballot in favor thereof, the offending person shall forfeit membership, and the W. P. shall direct the name to be erased from the Constitution. If a majority of the Division vote in opposition to the resolution, all further proceedings shall be stayed, subject to

appeal.

Sec. 7.—If two-thirds of those voting are in favor of reinstating a member who has been found guilty of violating Article 2, such member shall be restored to membership by re-signing the Constitution. The power to reinstate, shall not, however, extend over the term of one month from the time of receipt of notice by the offending member that the charge has been proved. If a member neglect to come forward to sign the Constitution for one month after receiving notice of reinstatement, or if a member is not reinstated, the W. P. shall declare such member expelled.

Sec. 8.—The forfeiture of membership under this Article shall involve the forfeiture of all honors possessed by the member when the name was erased from the Constitution.

Sec. 9.—If a member come forward and acknowledge a violation of Article 2, the Division, after erasure of his name, may at their option reinstate the

member on the same evening, in the manner prescribed in Sec. 7.

Sec. 10.—No member against whom a charge has been preferred under this Article shall be present when any vote is taken in the case, either in Committee or in Division. Females to be admitted to Subordinate Divisions as visitors. For mode, see

The Degrees prepared by the Grand Division of Maryland were agreed to as amended, and adopted.

EXTRACT FROM CONSTITUTION OF DEGREES.

Article I.—Each Grand Division may determine whether it will introduce the Degrees within its jurisdiction; and each Subordinate Division may introduce them or not after its Grand Division has accepted them.

Article II.—A Grand Division introducing the Degrees shall notify the M.
W. Scribe of that fact as soon as practicable, and shall procure of him the De-

gree Books and necessary Cards.

REPORT

Of the Committee of the National Division, S. of T., of North America, on the admission of Females into the Order.

St. John, New Brunswick, June 17, 1854.

The Committee on Constitutions who were especially instructed to report a plan for the admission of Females as visitors, or as full members, and to whom were referred the resolutions of the Grand Divisions of Pennsylvania and Georgia,

would respectfully report a plan, which should for the present satisfy the wishes of the more anxious friends of the proposition, and at the same time can be tried with perfect safety—and if experience shall hereafter dictate a repeal, it can be had without injurious consequences.

The plan proposed is embodied in the following, which we recommend to be adopted.

1. That any Subordinate Division may, by a two-thirds vote, determine to admit Females over Sixteen years of age, as visitors, at such times as may be deemed appropriate, on their being proposed, reported by a Committee, and balloted for under the rule observed for the admission of members; and that a form for their introduction, together with the law on the subject be furnished on Cards by the National Division.

2. That visitors shall not be entitled to vote, or participate in the delibera-

tions of the Order.

3. That any By-Law which shall determine the question, &c., as to the admission of visitors generally, or any one in particular, may for satisfactory reasons be suspended.

4. That the following shall be the Card of Address to accepted visitors:— Having been invited by this Division to visit its Sessions and witness its

Ceremonies, we would respectfully ask your assent to the following Pledge.

Do you, in the presence of these witnesses, solemnly promise that you will not, either by precept or the influence of your example, countenance or approve the use of Spirituous or Malt Liquors, Wine or Cider as beverages, or the manufacture thereof, or the traffic therein; and that you will not in any manner, make known the private affairs of the Order of the Sons of Temperance to any person not a member thereof. If so, answer—I do.

It was deemed essentially necessary that the Subordinate Divisions should be informed immediately of these material alterations, as an earnest desire was expressed for the privileges of admitting Females to the meetings, and also for the reduction of the Initiation Fee and Weekly Dues; with respect to the last mentioned alteration, which appeared to conflict with Article VI of the Constitution of Subordinate Divisions, I deemed it advisable to write to the Most W. Scribe for an explanation, who promptly replied that the "Initiation Fees and Weekly Dues, are now in the hands of the Order."

A circular was forthwith issued to Subordinate Divisions embracing several subjects of importance, and inviting their attention to the increased advantages and privileges granted, together with blank forms of Petition for a Prohibitory Liquor Law. I feel encouraged to believe that the late alterations will prove most salutary to the Divisions in this jurisdiction. Already some Divisions have made large accessions to their numbers, whilst others have been completely re-invigorated. In consideration that the provision for the admission of Females was intended instantly to take effect, cards containing the Rules and Coremon was a mixed and formished to Subardisat Picinia. and Ceremony were printed and furnished to Subordinate Divisions and another edition will be issued in a few days.

It was deemed proper that an immediate effort should be made to procure the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law from the present Parliament. A Petition having been presented by Smithville Division, "praying that two Grand Divisions be established for C. W., instead of one, as at present, on the ground that the remote locations at which many past Sessions of this G. D., and especially the Annual Session have been held, have rendered Representation from a large portion of S. D. impossible, and thus resulting in positive injury to the order.

Your Committe beg to report, that in their opinion, the establishing of two Grand Divisions for C. W. is unadviseable, as involving an amount of expense, and other considerations incompatable with the best interests of the Order, but would recommend that in future, the Annual Sessions be held in places as near to the centre of the Province as practicable, and that the Semi-annual Sessions be held at such places, East and West thereof, as in the opinion of this G. D. from time to time, will most fully meet the wants of the more remote Divisions, and conduce to the interests of the Order.

Your Committee would also report unfavourably of that part of another Petition from Smithville Division, praying for a reduction of the per Capita Rate on each member whose name appears on F. S.'s books, for the support of the G. D., believing that the present amount is as low as the wants of this G. D. will warrant. In reference to that part of same Petition, asking for the adoption of Degrees, your committee would refer the petitioners to the Report of Committee on G. W. P.'s Report.

To the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West in Division assembled.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Report of the G. W. P. most respectfully report as follows:-

CLAUSE 1.—With reference to the enquiry in the G. W. P.'s Report, as to what means can be adopted to resuscitate the lifeless Divisions under the jurisdiction of this Grand Division, your Committee are of opinion this could most effectually be accomplished by employing Lecturers for such purpose, but at the same time, your Committee are of opinion the present state of the funds of

this Grand Division will not warrant any appropriation for the purpose.

CLAUSE 2.—Your Committee participate in the gratification expressed by your G. W. P. that the number of Divisions under your jurisdiction has increased during the past year, and your Committee attribute this cheering fact, and the present prosperous state of the order in Canada, as well as the pleasing prospective prospects of the organization, not to the zeal and energetic action of the Sons, during the past year, (for a criminal apathetic spirit has confessedly been manifested in too many places,) but to the soundness of your principles, and the goodness of your cause.

All thinking men must admit drunkenness to be a dreadful evil, flowing

legitimately from the drinking customs of society; all really good men should

assist in removing the evil.

Your Committee suggest that the consideration of these facts alone, are sufficient to induce the friends of Temperance to buckle on their armor anew; to take the field again in all their pristine strength; and that one grand and irresistable charge should at once be made upon both the Sebastapol and Cronstadt of the rum power of Canada.

Your Committee are of opinion the stronghold of your deadly enemy is the license system, to which your G. W. P. in his report so argumentatively and

eloquently alludes.

And your Committee, with no ordinary feelings of pleasure, congratulate this Grand Division upon the cheering prospect of the speedy demolition of this last stronghold.

Upon going through the list of members of the Legislature from Upper Canada, your Committee conclude 40 are ready to vote for a Prohibitory Law, and we have good grounds for supposing a large majority of the Lower Canadian members are also in favor of the passing of such a law.

It, therefore, becomes a question with this Grand Division in what shape the long sought and ardently wished for law shall pass; whether to take effect

immediately or prospectively.

Your Committee submit that the country is now ready for such a law, in-

deed, expecting it to be passed immediately.

In view of the strong probability of the Legislature passing such a law at its present Session, and the importance of insuring such passage, your Committee submit that this Grand Division, representing as it does almost every locality in Canada West, should memorialize the Legislature upon the subject, and also send one of its members to the seat of Government as a Delegate from this Grand Division, to assist, if necessary, in preventing legislative loop-holes

in the law through which the enemy might escape.

CLAUSE 3.—With regard to the subject of conferring Degrees, your Committee are of opinion this Grand Division should at once avail itself of the provisions of the National Division in this respect; that the P. G. W. P. confer said Degrees upon all such of the Delegates now in attendance as may desire; and that this Grand Division make the necessary provisions for enabling the Subordinate Divisions under its jurisdiction to confer Degrees upon their

members

Your Committee cannot close this report without congratulating this Grand Division upon its intimate connexion with an individual possessing the ability, zeal, and energy of the officer whose report is now under consideration.

And in conclusion, your Committee acknowledge the indebtedness of this Grand Division, and of the order generally, to the protecting care of a kind providence, for blessing their labors with the success which has so far attended them.

All which, however, is respectfully submitted.

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Report of the Grand Scribe, beg leave to report that your Committee are much pleased to find that during the past year, the Subordinate Divisions who are in regular working order, are showing great efficiency, and indicating a spirit of renewed and strengthened

desire to advance the cause of temperance.

Your Committee deeply regret that the Memorials to the Legislature praying for the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, which Memorials were got up at a good deal of trouble by the different Subordinate Divisions, should have to a great extent been rendered almost nugatory from the shortness of the session immediately preceding the dissolution of the Provincial Parliament. And your Committee would strongly recommend that this Division will use all its influence and authority, in not only inducing Subordinate Divisions to exert themselves in one constant effort to effect the enactment of this great boon, (a Prohibitory Liquor Law,) to our country, but that they will in the event of the present Representatives of the people in Parliament refusing to grant our prayers the start of the Subardinate Divisions to set office tally at the real ers, prepare the way for the Subordinate Divisions to act effectually at the polls

at the next general election.

Your Committee highly approve of the plan adopted by the Grand Scribe in furnishing a copy of the printed proceedings of this body to each member of the Legislature; and we would (if consonant with the funds of this Division) recommend that a copy of the proceedings be sent this year to each of the members of the Legislative Assembly.

Your Committee are highly pleased to learn from the Grand Scribe's report that an Essay worthy of our cause has been received, and adopted, and that so

that an Essay worthy of our cause has been received and adopted, and that so many copies have been distributed among the Subordinate Divisions. Your Committee would recommend as general a diffusion of these Essays as possible, so that all men may become acquainted with the object and principles of our

Your Committee are impressed with the idea that many of the alterations in the Constitution will be conducive to the advancement of our noble order, and particularly so with regard to the introduction of females. Your Committee believe that the great object of this Association is to protect the lives

and morals of the people of our country, and to effect this grand object by enhancing the attraction of the social circle, and thereby offering to those fond of society, a more delightful repast at home or in the Division Room, than they could possibly procure with their boon companions in the tavern or saloon. Your Committee would recommend that this Division should endeavour to form our Subordinate Divisions into social circles on a large scale, to teach what each family should be in minature, and to do this, it would be advantageous that the introductions of females should be adopted; and your Committee regret extremely, that the National Division did not allow females to be admitted on perfect equality with Sons; and your Committee feel pleased to find by the report of the Grand Scribe, that the Subordinate Divisions, who have adopted the introduction of females, are not only making large accessions to their numbers, but that several Subordinate Divisions who were in a state of decay, are being resuscitated; and your Committee beg leave to state, that the thanks of this Division should be conveyed to the Honorable W. H. Merritt, for his kind attention in presenting the Memorials forwarded to him by this Division.

Your Committee feel deep regret in finding, by the report of the Grand Scribe, that so many of the Subordinate Divisions have fallen into that apathetic state which indicates a coming dissolution, and hope that the cause attributed by the Grand Scribe, (that is to say,) the brief period between the Installation night of the quarter, and the sitting of this Division, being only 14 days, that many may have been unable to make their returns in time. Your Committee learn with sincere regret, the death of two active and worthy brothers of this Division, and would recommend that a letter of condolence should be sent by this Division to the families of these brothers. That all members of the Order of the full age of twenty-one years who shall be clear of the F. S.'s books, and who shall have been members of the Order in good standing six months, shall be eligible to receive the first degree; and that in six months thereafter they shall be eligible to receive the second degree; and that in six months thereafter they shall be eligible to receive the third degree. Provided, that all present members of the Order of one and a third degree. Provided, that all present members of the Order of one and a third degree good standing shall be entitled to receive all the Degrees at one half years good standing shall be entitled to receive all the Degrees at one to the officers and members of the Division, which application shall be referred to the officers and members of the Degree applied for, for their decision.

Candidates for Degrees shall be balloted for, and admitted or rejected, in the same manner by the officers and members of the Degree applied for, as candidates for initiation into the Order.

Expulsion or suspension shall operate as a forfeiture of their standing in the Degree Division, and members so forfeiting their standing shall be subjected to re-election and re-initiation in the Degrees, the same as required by the constitutes of Subaddinate Divisions.

There shall be charged and paid by the members initiated for each Degree, the following fees, namely—for the several Degrees not less than one shilling and threepence each, but that Subordinate Divisions shall be at liberty to increase the initiation fees, as they please.

That the several Subordinate Divisions shall elect from among their W. P. or That the several Subordinate Divisions shall elect from among their W. P. w. P.'s a Prefect who shall appoint the time and confer the Degrees in order to the institution of the Degree Division.

All of which is respectfully submitted.
