WEST INDIAN TRADE

The presence here of the delegates from the West Indies, who are on their way to Ottawa to attend a trade conference, serves to direct public attention once more to the very great importance of better tariff arrangements and an up-to-date steamship service between the West Indian market and our own.

At the outset it is well to keep in mind that Canada is already a defaulter in this matter, because thus far it has not made good its obligations under the last treaty arrangement, in which this country agreed to establish, by co-operation with the Islands, a faster steamship service and one meeting modern requirements in the matter of cold storage.

If this hopeful project is brought to the right conclusion not only these provinces but Canada generally will have its import and export trade stimulated in a marked degree at no very distant date. It is a time when profitable markets are greatly needed, for a great many years Canadian business men have been urging a more effective cultivation of prospective customers in the Islands, and the country at large has recognized the business wisdom of importing our tropical fruit direct, instead of having it come almost exclusively through American ports.

A PEACE MISSION

The presence of Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor, in the Cape Breton mining area was the subject of considerable discussion in the House of Commons yesterday. Mr. Murdock some time ago was asked by the miners to act as mediator between them and the British Empire Steel Corporation, but the latter would not agree to accept him in that capacity, and he declined on the ground that without the company's acceptance his intervention could not promise good results.

The paragraphs in the British Ambassador's speech which have excited so much comment in the United States, and in which he referred to the possibility of very grave trouble, were as follows: "The United States and the British Empire are to-day each other's best customers, though the United States has the advantage in the visible trade balance. How is the balance paid for? Before the war the balance used to be paid for by our 'invisible exports'—interest on capital loaned, freight rates for shipping, and profits made in trade with other countries. But to-day these invisible exports have shrunk, and our foreign markets have shrunk, in some cases almost to nothing. Unless we can shortly restore a firm basis of confidence and credit throughout Europe and a return to the natural flow of trade, unless we can work on the principle of goods across the sea, we are heading for a worse cataclysm than that produced by the actual state of war."

"We intend—we are absolutely determined—to meet our just debts, but there would come a time when, unless the world situation changes for the better—unless we can return to something like pre-war conditions of credit and trade—it would be impossible both to make heavy purchases of raw materials from the United States and to pay the interest on our debt."

If Great Britain should cut down its imports from the United States to the amount of its exports to that country—assuming that this were immediately possible—what would be the result? A panic in the United States probably, says the Philadelphia Record, and certainly a serious depression. Other Democratic newspapers make comment along the same lines, although none of them thinks it likely that the Ambassador intended to foreshadow any British policy to be carried into effect in the near future. Republican newspapers, on the other hand, have remarked upon the tendency on the part of the present British Government to introduce some measure of protection. The New York Sun argues that even if the United States bought nothing still all from Great Britain it would still be possible for that country to buy American goods, because it would be able to sell to other nations and so pay its American creditors. It would be easy to carry that argument to extreme lengths. If the United States were unwilling to purchase any European goods the time would come when it would find no market for its exports on the Continent. Europe can pay its debts only through the sale of its products. It could not find a sufficient market for these products outside of the United States, full payment of its American debts would be impossible. The United States shows no present indication of adopting a more liberal tariff policy, and indeed the prospect is that it will persist in its present one until the falling off in its exports forces it to buy more from its creditors. It must export largely if it is to enjoy a reasonable prosperity in the future; and Europe, similarly, cannot regain a sound footing and hold it unless it can market its surplus wares.

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IS WELL ANSWERED. "Traveling through Africa, a party stopped at a squalid, mud-hatched village near the Sahara Desert. On a few occasions since the war has any speech by a British Ambassador to the United States created so much discussion as that following the recent warning issued by Sir Esme Howard, who touched rather bluntly upon the extent to which British goods are excluded from the American market by a hostile tariff. It is true that he did not refer directly to American tariff policy. He contented himself with directing attention to well-known facts, pointing out that Great Britain would not continue indefinitely to buy a United States unless it can sell here on a greater scale than at present.

A Real Cause For Pride

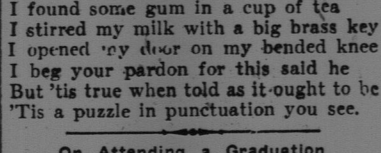

\$6,000,000 ESTATE WILL BE SPLIT UP

Relative of Lord Beresford Had Property in Ireland and New York State.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 15.—An estate exceeding \$6,000,000 is disposed in the way of the late John George Beresford of New Rochelle, a relative of Lord Beresford of London, England, was filed for probate here. The entire estate is inherited by friends and relatives, the major portion going to Mrs. Helen Beresford, the widow. Beresford died in May at Toronto, his large estate on Davenport, Neck, Rochelle, and his will is dated Nov. 18, 1894. The Fifth Avenue Bank of New York is appointed executor.

Richard Beresford of Inistioge, Ireland, a brother, receives \$50,000; Emily Hodson of Kilkenny, Ireland, a sister, \$60,000; Jane Cobbe, a sister, \$30,000, and Charles Cobbe, a nephew, \$20,000.

The decedent's estate includes considerable property in Ireland, and under a previous will he bequeathed portions of it to his brother and sisters in lieu of cash bequests.

FACTS TOLD CANADA

Information on Security Pact is Given Premier, Says Baldwin.

LONDON, June 15.—The governments of the British Dominions have been fully advised of all developments regarding the security pact for Western Europe, Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin told a questioner in the House of Commons today. Asked if the Canadian Premier had not made an announcement regarding the attitude of the Canadian Government toward the proposed pact, Mr. Baldwin answered that he had not seen such an announcement, but he reiterated that Canada had been fully advised of the negotiations. Mr. Baldwin stated to the House of Commons that he was not sure whether endorsement by the British dominions would be required to make the pact effective. 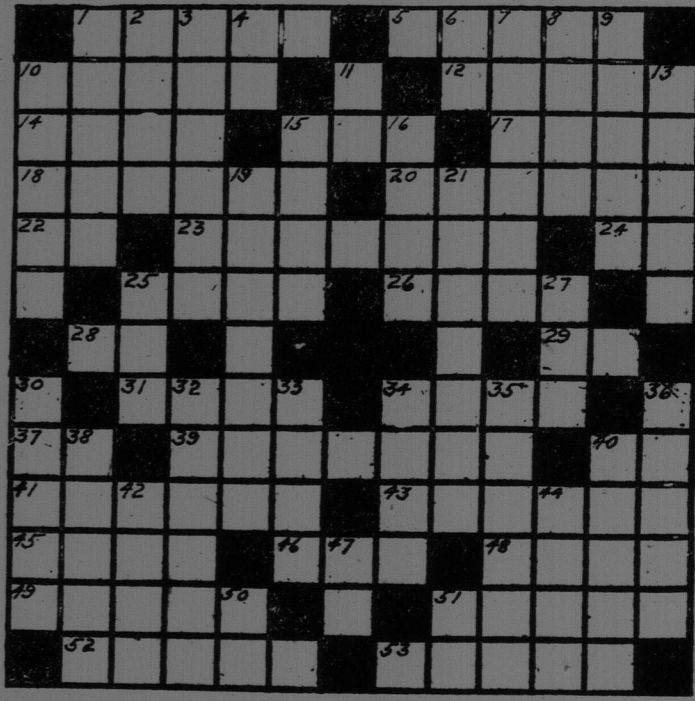

BISHOP VISITING SEVERAL CHURCHES

Will Attend Moncton Meeting—Next Sunday to be in Saint John.

His Lordship Bishop Richardson will attend a meeting of the directors of the Maritime Home for Women to be held today in Moncton. It will be the first meeting of the board at which he has been present, and his attendance has been specially asked by the committee.

Bishop Richardson was in the city yesterday for the confirmation service held last night at the Church of the Good Shepherd, in Fairville, and Saint John was one stopping place in an extended itinerary. On Sunday he had been in Kingston parish, of which Rev. R. E. J. Britton is rector. In the morning the Bishop officiated at a confirmation service in Trinity church at Kingston, the oldest original church building in New Brunswick. Kingston church was erected in 1786. Bishop Richardson also dedicated a memorial which was unveiled at the morning service in Trinity church, commemorating Rev. H. S. Vainwright, who was for many years rector of the parish and who died about two years ago.

LONG REACH CHURCH.

In the afternoon His Lordship attended the service at Whitehead church and in the evening held confirmation at St. James' church in Long Reach. In St. James' church there is the only three-decker pulpit known in New Brunswick, and it has been preserved in exact form as it was made. Bishop Richardson said that he had never ventured to climb to the topmost seat and to preach from the third tier that was supposed to be the preaching pulpit. From that high elevation the preacher would have an airplane view of the congregation he fancied.

After attending the meeting of the Board of the Maritime Home for Women this afternoon he will go on to visit the congregations at Hillsboro and Riverview in Albert county on Wednesday, and on Thursday will return to Fredericton.

HERE ON SUNDAY.

He will be back in Saint John on Sunday and will preach in the morning at All Saints church in East Saint John. In the evening he will be the special preacher in the Mission Church of St. John the Baptist, as Sunday will be observed as the festival of the patron saint in the Mission Church. 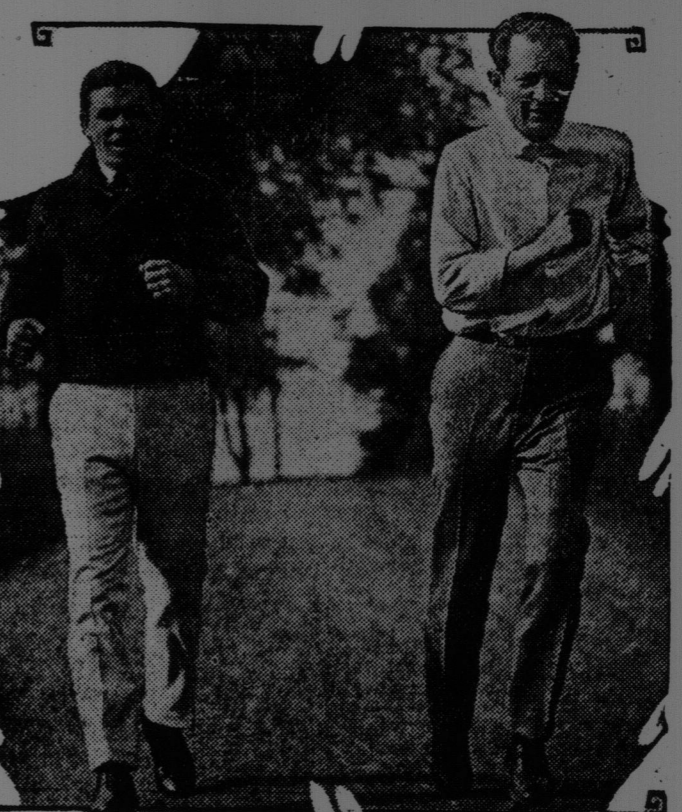
