London, Feb. 15—Revolution has broken out in Indian state Rajputana, says a Reuter's despatch from Allahabad. After agreeing to demands of the people, the Nawab Mohammedan ruler of the district arrested leaders of the movement, whereupon rioting broke out. State troops are actively engaged and people are fleeing toward British territory. The capital of the district is located in the city of Tonk, about fifty miles south of
