The word desert, however, is a mis-nomer, for the Gobi is a carpet of luxu-riant grass and beautiful flowers in the spring and early summer, sand being confined to limited regions and appear-ing only in narrow strips in the good country. The amount of pasturage is illimitable and much beyond the necessi-ties of the widely scattered tribes. In normal times great numbers of animals are exported into Russia and China, and the trade in hides and furs is steadily increasing. The Mongols in exchange increasing. The Mongols in exchange require principally brick-tea, cloth and utensils.

require principally brick-tea, cloth and utensils. Since Rufsia broke down the ruble has disappeared from circulation, and the country is without a currency. Much business is conducted by barter, but the China dollar is beginning to fill up the vacuum left by the ruble. Virtually all of the trade and finance is in the hands of Chinese who are recognizedly the in-tellectual superior, and thus, naturally, objects of suspicion to their simple-minded clients. Two or three foreign firms based at Kalgan have been doing a flourishing business during the last few years, especially since the connection with Russia has weakened. These firms send into the interior kerosene, candles, cig-arettes and a growing variety of manu-factured goods. Their great difficulty is transport, which is slow and expensive. Caravans take a month from Kalgan to Urga, a distance that motor cars have recently covered in two days. There are now two Chinese motor companies carrying

two Chinese motor companies carrying passengers from Kalgan to Urga. These companies make scrap-iron of their cars in astonishingly quick time, but con-tinue to buy more. They get all the passengers they can carry.



So intense is now the feeling which many wise thinkers and observers entertain upon the subject that I should regard a decision of the House of Commons in 'avor of premium bonds as a veritable misfortune. I was myself opposed two years ago to the issue of such bonds, but I had not then before me the ample material which is now in our hands. The consideration of it has greatly strengthened the opinion I then held."






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
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REFUSE CANADIAN MONEY. Port Huron Merchants' Attitude Benefits Sarnia.
