

issued by the Canada Food Board in Collaboration With Experts on the Staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

FERTILIZERS. gardener is fertilizer. The common mistake of the amateur gardener is to place modity. Wherever possible he should procure farm yard manure. This is used at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, with the best results. During a single season professional gardeners apply as much as six inches of it over the entire area of ground under cultivation. From 400 to 600 pounds can be used to advantage on a plot twenty by twenty feet.

Where it is impossible for the amateur gardener to obtain supplies of well-rotted manure he must resort to the commercial fertilizer. In cases where no manure is used the fertilizer should be spread over the surface of the finely prepared seed-bed at the rate of five pounds for a plot ten feet square, just before planting. The surface soil should then be thoroughly raked so as to mix the fertilizer evenly to a depth of two inches. Seed should never be placed in direct contact with fertilizer. Thorough mixing of the fertilizer with the soil is essential to prevent injury to seed or roots.

The more manure that is used the better and the amateur gardener should make use of leaves, street sweepings, sod, kitchen refuse and anything that will rapidly decompose and feed the plants.

### STILL TALK OF O'CONNOR AND HIS RESIGNATION

Ottawa, May 1—When questions were called in the house today, the resignation of W. F. O'Connor was again raised. General Mewburn stated that a letter had been received from the officer commanding the forestry battalion to the effect that conditions among the troops under his command were exceedingly good. The minister said he had sent word to the overseas minister of militia asking for information. With regard to the medical services, General Mewburn stated that he had no information to offer the house. He had asked the overseas minister to furnish him with the facts concerning these services.

Mr. Burnham asked if it was not the policy of the government to consult a constituency before appointments were made, in that constituency. Sir Robert replied that he did not hardly know what was meant by consulting a constituency. The policy of the government was to get the best information available.

Sir Sam Hughes—"Therefore they do not consult the members."

Speaking on the budget, Mr. Cronyn said that, in the main, the measures taken by the minister of finance to finance the war had been correct. Great Britain had been able to pay seventeen per cent. of her war expenditures out of revenue. The payment by Canada of eleven per cent, of this expenditure was an indication that we have been advancing along the right road. France had been unable to pay anything towards the cost of the war out of revenue, and Germany but very little.

Referring to the bond issues, he expressed the opinion that the non-taxable provisions should be withdrawn and also the convertible features of the issues should be dropped. This, he said, had a tendency to increase the burden on the country.

He asked the government to consider the advisability of forming a permanent tariff commission.

A. B. McCoig (Kent) said he would have supported legislation even more drastic to raise funds for the prosecution of the war. He suggested that the tax on food profiteers should be made retroactive for the benefit of widows and orphans. Such an action, he said, would have been more commendable than a tax of five per cent. on tobacco grown in Canada.






