

The loss is estimated at \$125,000.

The fire had its origin in a storage house loaded with many thousand barrels of highly inflammable oils. These exploded with deafening roar and with great rapidity. By the time the firemen responded, the big plant was blazing in twenty places. Five minutes af-

Washington, Aug. 7—The first of the recreational peace treaties embodying incretary Bryan's plans was actually igned today. It was between the United states and Salvador, and soon will be ent to the senate for ratification.
