During a heavy blow in the bay last night the three masted American schooner Manuel R. Cuza, Captain Gayton, foundered at Black Point, about ten miles from this city. The vessel was coal laden and bound from New York to St. John.

The schooner sailed from here about March 6 with a cargo of plank and scantling for Elizabethport, shipped by Alex. Watson. She left New York on April 17, with 425 tons of anthracite coal for the City Fuel Company here. On Sunday night, in a thick fog she got close in on Black Point and was not more than 100 feet from shore when Captain Gayton realized his position.

Anchors were lowered and the bigschooner rode it out in her dangerous position.


