FRICK LEFT ESTATE TOTALLING \$92,953,552

TOTALLING \$92,953,552 New York, March 7—Following the court decision that Henry Clay Frick was a resident of Pittsburg when he died on Dec. 2, 1919, and that only his real estate and personal property in this state are taxable here, an appraisal of the New York estate was filed recently. It shows that while Mr. Frick left a total estate of \$92,953,552, only \$20,932,-905 was taxable in this state. The report shows that the total of legacies was \$56,999,975 and the net es-tate \$82,958,757. The residuary estate is divided into hundreds and the share of the residuary legatees includes Harvard College and Massachusetts In-stitute of Technology with 10 shares each, which is \$2,400,000 for each insti-tution. Of course, taxes will be de-ducted from these amounts.







They have four mills at Juniper in operation now. One of these mills is running day and might, and the second one is to be soon. They load an average of ten cars per day. Just now they are loading forty car loads of lumber for foreign export, by vessel from St. John, N. B. These people have in their employ about five hundred men and seventy double teams The Upham Lumber Company has just completed a new saw mill at Juniper and are getting out about two million feet of logs. 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

IN FLARE OF STAR

Dr. Henry Norris Russell Calls Increased Brightness "Prank of Ill-Behaved Star."

New York, March 8-Observations nade at Harvard and elsewhere recently of the star Beta Ceti, which was reported to have flaged up suddenly to

cently of the star Beta Ceti, which was reported to have flared up suddenly to several times its size, make it seem un-likely that anything very sensational has really happened to that star, Dr. Henry Norris Russell of Princeton said. "There are a number of stars which are known to vary irregularly, and this seems to be one of them," said Profes-sor Russell, who has recently received the Draper Medal and the medal of the British Royal Astronomical Society for his researches. "Betelguese, the giant star that was measured a year or two ago, is some-times twice as bright as at other times. Nothing is known as to the reason for these changes. In the case of Beta Ceti, there is nothing unusual about its spec-trum, nothing that would ordinarily put it in the class of irregular stars. "It is very difficult to determine the amount of increase in brightness in Beta Ceti, because it is a very faint star. The amount of increase has to be esti-mated by the eye and a good deal de-pends on the observer. The changes in a bright star can be much more accu-rately estimated. "The change in Beta Ceti, whether great or moderate, is not necessarily of sudden occurrence. It is apparently much brighter now than it was some years ago, but it is not known that any one has studied it carefully in recent
