



# CAPTURE OF ABDUCTOR REVEALS PLANT MANY TREES TRAGEDY OF BACKWOOD POVERTY Private Companies Will Reforest

RANDOLPH, Vt. May 12--Through-ou. the countryside that stretches away from this little Vermont town, where hills are as barren and woods as lonely as the lives they hem in, Deeka, sharp-nised police dog, has become an over-uight hero.

In her inarticulate way the child already has convicted the drab circumstances into which it was her fate to be cast. With loyalty and affection she was ready to acclaim Woodward as the Lochinvar who came to carry her

It is not unlikely that less romantic visionings roused the man accused of abduction to his daringly futile attempt at flight, though in sullen monosyllables he has sought to picture himself as one who pitied the child's predicament and wanted to help her. Thus it would seem that Deeka, the colice dog, nosed out a queer study in

a pair of fugitives.

For many hours I accompanied members of the posse engaged in the manhunt, getting but a taste of the desolation of the thicket—snareld hills and lation of the thicket—snareld hills and fields, ploughing through roads deep with mud under a steady rain and wading through knee-deep quagmires.



FOR TREATING BURNS IF clothing adheres to a burned surface soften with water before trying to remove it.

Many persons become frightened when their clothing catches fire, and run, fanning the flames.

This is especially true of children. Mothers should teach their children to roll on the floor or the ground when the clothing catches fire.

Also to grab any old cloth, an old quilt, comforter, blanket, robe, or anything of the kind, and wrap themselves in it.

In this way the flames may be expected.

After burned clothing has been removed, wet the injured part with water and apply baking soda.

Lard, oil, tallow, molasses or moist flour will do in an emergency.

Afterward mix soda, glycerin and water to make a thin paste, adding a little carbolic acid.











COURT OF INQUIRY

Dominion Commission Will Consider Testimony Further Before Finding.

Captain Donald A. MacLean, who was in command of the oil tanker Azov, pwned by the Fundy Transport, Ltd., of Saint John, which went ashore off of Saint John, which went ashore off Cape Hogan, N. S., on April 30, durling a fog, testified at the inquiry here yesterday in the Board of Trade rooms that he had been confident of the position of his ship when the accident occurred and had feared no danger until the reakers were seen under the port bow and it was too late to save the yessel.

He insisted several times in his evi-He insisted several times in his evidence that he alone was responsible for the navigation of the vessel at the time, declaring that he had stayed on the bridge from 4 o'clock in the morning of the day the accident occurred until the boat struck about 10.30 in the evening because of the thick weather and the need for care.

MISTAKEN AS TO POSITION. The first intimation that he was

the first intimation that he was closer to shore than he thought came, he said, when the mate, Mr. Poole, who was on the boat deck, shouted to him that he saw ice dead ahead. He immediately ordered the engines full astern in an effort to lessen the shock. was in reality the breakers off the shore but was too late to change his course to avoid striking. He had believed himself about five miles off shore when the shock came, he said. OTHERS TESTIFY.

Captain L. A. Demers, of Ottawa, Dominion wreck commissioner, was chairman of the investigating tribunal which included also Captain A. J. Mulcahy, port warden, and Lloyd's agent here, and Captain Brown. Evidence was given by Captain MacLean, First Officer Poole, Chief Engineer Urder and the wheelman at the time of the wreck, Clark.
