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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Each subscriber of **One Guinea** annually shall be a Member.

IV. Each subscriber of **Ten Guineas** at one time shall be a Member for life.

V. Each subscriber of **Twenty-five Guineas** annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each subscriber of **Fifty Pounds** at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to **Fifty Pounds**, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of **Fifty Pounds**, shall be a Member for life; or, of **One Hundred Pounds**, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XII. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the objects of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

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REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in
1826 and 1827.

- I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.
- II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.
- III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.
- IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of the Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz: to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.

V. A general meeting of the members of this Society will be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers as occasion may require.

The Seventy-first Anniversary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society was held in Park Street Church the 19th January, 1885. The Hon. S. L. SHANNON, President, in the chair.

The Devotional Exercises were conducted by the Rev. Dr. McGregor, after which the President addressed the meeting.

The Secretary read an abstract of the Annual Report, after which addresses were delivered by the Rev. Dr. Hill, Rev. Mr. McMillan, Rev. J. F. Avery, Rev. Mr. Cline, J. Scott Hutton, and others.

The following resolution was adopted :

"That the report read be printed; thanks be tendered to the Ladies' Association and to branches throughout the Province; and that the officers of the past year be re-elected with such alterations as were necessitated by removal or death."

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REPORT.

Rule fifth of the laws and regulations of the Nova Scotia Bible Society reads as follows: "A general meeting of the members of this Society be held every year, before which shall be laid the accounts and proceedings of the previous year." In compliance with this rule the committee have continued to meet in the seventy years which have intervened since the first formation of the Society, with only a few exceptions. Sometimes the meetings have been but indifferently attended, and thereby afforded but poor encouragement to those who undertook the preparation for them, yet, notwithstanding, for the whole period they have only missed a few. The years which have passed by have been a succession of triumphs for the cause of Bible circulation, not only among ourselves as a province, but round the world. We but for a few moments contrast the past of 1813 with the past of 1883 or 1884. It was in the former year that a few devoted men in Halifax combined to circulate and make better known the Word which "maketh wise unto salvation," and the result is to be seen among ourselves and felt to the very uttermost parts of the earth. Reserving in the meantime the notice of our own auxiliary, we shall first hurriedly glance at the operations of the parent society, and as a preliminary

note the two points of *finance* and *circulation*, as taken from an abstract of the report of 1884 :

“It is with humble thankfulness to the Giver of all that they announce to their supporters that the income of the Society's eightieth year has been the largest it has ever received, the TOTAL RECEIPTS having reached the sum of £233,309. 8s. 7d., and having exceeded those of the previous year by £22,708. 15s. 6d. An advance of about £2,000 in Annual Subscriptions, Collections, and Free Contributions is more than counterbalanced by a decrease of about £3,000 in Donations. The substantial increase of income is therefore due to about £9,000 more received from the sale of Scriptures, and about £14,000 more received in Legacies. The last-named source of income is necessarily of such a fluctuating character, that an unusually large sum accruing from it in one year may be followed by unusually small receipts from it soon after. Legacies have yielded £38,181. 10s. 5d., or £16,000 above their average, in the year just closed ; and half the whole sum came to hand in its last three months. Your Committee believe it to be generally the wish of those who leave their money to this Society that it should not be hoarded up, but laid out in meeting any urgent calls for the further spread of God's Holy Word. But, under the unusual circumstances described, your Committee deem it only right, as a precaution against any corresponding fall below the average in Legacies during another year, to hold for a time in reserve a portion of the exceptionally large receipts from that source announced on the present occasion. And they beg their friends in the country not to relax their efforts to maintain and extend the stable income to be relied upon from the Free Contributions of Auxiliary Societies.

“The FREE INCOME of the Society from all sources has been £126,182. 18s. 7d. Adding to this £107,021. 12s. 3d. received from the sale of Scriptures, and £104. 17s. 9d. from the Roxburgh Fund for Indian colportage, the total income of £233,309. 8s. 7d., already mentioned, is obtained, as against the £210,600. 13s. 1d. announced at the last anniversary.

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“Two years ago your Committee stated that they were ready to go forward provided their friends put it in their power, and kept it in their power, to do so without anxiety as to funds. This undertaking has not been forgotten, and as increased means were placed at their disposal, it has been your Committee's anxious prayer that God would guide them to such a wise expansion of their labours as would be commensurate with the enlarged responsibility which He was laying upon them. They trust that it will be satisfactory to their supporters when they say, that, with watchful care to avoid all wasteful outlay, and with due regard to the claims of different fields, they have expended in encouraging the wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures no less than £222,431. 15s. 9d. This EXPENDITURE exceeds that under the General Fund in the previous year by £14,614. 10s. 7d. ; as that again outstripped its predecessor by £17,079. 5s. 10d. While endeavouring thus, in obedience to the leadings of Divine Providence, to act up to their present responsibilities, your Committee must remind the Society at large that the extended operations upon which they have entered in the last two years can only be maintained by an outlay corresponding to that which they have just announced. Details of some extension will be found in many sections of the Report; and reference can be made here only in the briefest manner to a few of the more salient features of the year.

“Meaning by *copies*, not Bibles alone, but any integral part or portion of Holy Writ, the ISSUES from the Bible House in London to meet home and foreign demands have been 1,517,024 copies. Those from depôts abroad have been 1,601,280 copies, making a TOTAL of 3,118,304 copies, or 153,668 more than in the previous year. The issues of the Society for the eighty years since its commencement now reach a total of 100,035,933 copies. Your Committee would have little satisfaction even in these enormous figures, did they not know how much prayer for the Divine Spirit to speak through these Scriptures accompanies their circulation, and had they not daily proof that according to His promise God's Word does not return unto Him void.

"The total for the year of above three million copies has only twice been surpassed before, and that was when the Franco-German war, in the one case, and when the Russo-Turkish war and the Paris Exhibition, in the other, caused an exceptionally large distribution. No extraordinary call on anything like the same scale has occurred during the past year. It has been one of quiet but growing work. War gifts have only been required from London for some English soldiers going to Egypt, and from Marseilles, Algiers, and Singapore for some French soldiers going to Tonquin. These have added little to the general circulation of the Scriptures, and the only exceptional items which have appreciably increased it somewhat have been those connected with great public Exhibitions.

"In five of these, last year, the Society took part by providing Scriptures, and bearing some expense for their dissemination by sales and gifts. The great exertions and liberal aid of friends on the spot in Amsterdam, in Zurich, in Nice, and in Calcutta deserve special mention. Nor must the assistance of the Thames Church Mission, in effecting a large but discriminate free distribution at the Fisheries Exhibition in London, be forgotten. At the last-named, permission having been kindly granted for the sale of Scriptures, 11,216 copies were sold from the Society's own stall. Of these, above 3100 were Bibles, and nearly 5,400 were New Testaments. During the present year the Society will similarly take some part at International Exhibitions in Kensington, in the Crystal Palace, and in Turin.

"One prominent feature of the year has been the extensive tours of inspection which have been made by officers of the Society in many of its Foreign Agencies. Visits were paid within the year to almost every country in Europe; and, outside it, to the Caucasus, to Asia Minor, to Syria and Palestine, in Asia; and to Algiers and Morocco in Africa. In the long journeys taken by the two Secretaries in succession, they were privileged to enjoy the pleasant companionship and the invaluable aid of two eminent members of your Committee. F. J. Wood, Esq., LL.D., and J. Bevan Braithwaite, Esq., travelled six and nine thousand miles respectively, placing

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valuable time and experience and knowledge at the service of the Society, free of all cost to it, and entitling themselves to its warmest thanks. By these tours sympathy and encouragement have been given to some of those able and devoted servants of the Society who are so much cut off from the blessing of congenial Christian companionship, and who are as nobly trying to dispel the darkness around them by diffusing the light of the Bible as Wyclif, and Tyndale, and Luther did aforetime. By personal intercourse the tie connecting many a worker abroad with the Committee at home has been strengthened. Their paths have in some ways been smoothed; their burdens have in some degree been shared. They will henceforth feel that difficulties which they refer home will be better understood.

“Moreover, on these journeys some matters of importance for the attainment of the Society’s object have been advanced, or settled; and to some of these your Committee must refer. They announced last year that they felt they would be best discharging their duty in respect of such Protestant lands as Norway and Sweden by urging the Bible Societies of those countries to undertake the whole duty of supplying their own people with the Scriptures. Toward them, therefore, it was said, that, as this object came to be attained, a policy of withdrawal would gradually be pursued. Both the countries named have since been visited from the Bible House; and, in the case of Sweden, your Committee think that the Society will give a beneficial stimulus to the Christian life of its people if it leaves them from the close of the present year to do entirely for themselves what it has been so largely helping them to do since 1809. An intimation of this purposed withdrawal has been circulated in Sweden, and the desirability of forming a fresh Swedish Bible Society, on a basis similar to your own, to take your place in the country, has been urged. The late large-hearted Bishop Grafström gave this plan his approval, and might have been able to carry it out by his own personal influence, had he not been so soon and so suddenly taken away after its proposal. Your Committee still wish to see it accomplished; and in the meantime they have removed your highly esteemed

Agent, the Rev. R. H. Weakley, to a new charge in Syria and Egypt, leaving the temporary conduct of your affairs in Stockholm in the hands of H. Tottie, Esq., and the local Committee. One special circumstance makes the present a favourable opportunity for this withdrawal. The Revised Swedish Version of the New Testament, which has been authorized for general use, is about to be issued, and it is well that its issue should be left from the first entirely in Swedish hands.

“Among other results in the way of progress connected with the visit of the deputation to Russia, it may be mentioned that a son of the Governor of Wasa, in Finland, has been appointed to a sub-agency in Siberia. He has reached Irkutsk, and has obtained the permission of the Governor to open a depôt there.

“Another step has been the issue of an edition of the New Testament in Russ, more portable in size than one, and larger in type than the other, of the two editions which the Society has hitherto circulated in Russia. The new volume will, it is hoped, prove a very serviceable and attractive one to the Russian people to whom it is inscribed. It has been printed for the Society by the Russian Holy Synod, and will be sold below cost-price at sixpence a copy.

“The deputation which visited the Caucasus made a happy arrangement whereby the translation of the Bible into Transcaucasian Turkish, made by the Rev. Abraham Amirchaniantz, of Tiflis, will obtain the benefit of such improvements as the scholarship of the American missionaries labouring in the north of Persia may suggest, upon its revision by them before it is put to press.

“Success also attended the visit which was paid to the Turkish Minister of Public Instruction by the same deputation, accompanied by your Agent in Constantinople. A restriction which had rendered the reprinting of the Osmanli Turkish Bible in Turkey practically impossible was removed, and the work of the sister Bible Society of America was thus relieved of an embarrassment as well as your own. Robert Cust, Esq., a member of your Committee, who never forgets to do all he can to forward the interests of this Society when he travels

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"A third measure due to the tour of Mr. Reed and Mr. Braithwaite arose out of their conference with missionaries in Palestine. To meet some of the special difficulties which beset both Bible work and missions in the villages of that land, arrangements have been made with the Church Missionary Society for employing certain evangelist-colporteurs there upon the same system as has already been found advantageous elsewhere in co-operation with some other Societies. This plan has the cordial support of your Agent, Mr. Weakley, who has himself had large experience of mission work in the East. It is hoped that it will, under the Divine blessing, open a new era of enlarged spiritual blessing in the Holy Land.

"Among the measures of progress more or less due to the visit paid by the Assistant Foreign and Financial Secretary to North Africa may be mentioned the formation of a local committee to assist your Agent in Algiers, and the definite establishment of an Agency in Morocco. Few parts of the world have been left so much outside Christian effort as Morocco. Two preliminary residences, to try what opportunities it afforded for Bible work, have issued in the appointment to this Agency of Mr. William Mackintosh, an experienced missionary to Mohammadans, and well acquainted with Arabic. He is giving special attention to the preparation of a version for the Rifian Arabs, and is assisted in his endeavours to circulate existing translations of the Scriptures by a Syrian colporteur, who was one of the interpreters to the British Generals at Tel-el-Kebir and the surrender of Arabi in Cairo.

"Some other important tours of visitation have been planned, or are in progress. One of these is also in Africa, and is to extend to all parts of its southern extremity. Through the kind concurrence of the Colonial and Continental Church Society and that of the Bishop, it has been undertaken by the Rev. Dr. Hole, Incumbent of Trinity Church, Cape Town, to whose able assistance this Society has often already been put under obligation. He is to be joined and aided at different centres by

leading ministers of the Dutch Reformed Church, and the tour is expected to occupy nine months. By the accompanying presence of the Divine Spirit, much quickening of zeal for the distribution of the Bible, and much friendly co-operation between English and Dutch fellow Christians may be looked for as an immediate outcome of this undertaking.

"In another part of the world a similar effort to give new life to the blessed work of circulating God's Holy Word, and to promote Christian fellowship in this object between brethren of different Churches and nationalities, is in course of arrangement by your Committee in connection with the approaching Jubilee of the Emancipation of the slaves in the West Indies.

"A third measure, with Switzerland for its field of effort, is being planned. It is hoped that, with some assistance, the Bible Societies of that country may be led to take common action for spreading the Holy Scriptures in those cantons in which at present the Bible is little known.

"While dwelling for a moment on matters in which the retrospect of the past glides into anticipations of the future, some reference is due to three approaching commemorations by which it is sought to keep alive a thankful remembrance of what later generations owe, under God, to noble pioneers in Bible translation. England celebrates this year the five hundredth anniversary of the death of Wyclif, who gave her *from the Latin Vulgate* her first translation of the Bible into English.

"And on this seventh day of May is to be unveiled upon the Thames Embankment the statue of the martyred William Tyndale, born four hundred years ago, to whom England owes her 'primary version' of the *New Testament translated from the Greek*, and the forerunner of every printed copy of the Scriptures in the English tongue. Through the kind gifts of friends in its behalf, below Tyndale's figure the name of this Society has found a place as a contributor to the erection of his statue.

"And, once more, on the sixth of June this year, Iceland will keep the three hundredth anniversary of the translating and printing of the Bible in Icelandic, the

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work of Bishop Thorlaksson. To mark the event your Committee have presented twenty memorial Bibles in Icelandic, that one may be preserved in the principal church of each of the deaneries which are under that most cordial friend of this Society, Bishop Pjetursson.

“Reverting from things in progress to things which have been completed during the year, some other marks of growing work in far-off lands must be recorded.

“The promised subdivision of the vast Australian Agency has been carried out by the appointment of the Rev. H. T. Robjohns, B.A., as your Agent for New South Wales and Queensland, and the Rev. E. Wilfred Robinson as your Agent for Western and South Australia and Tasmania. These appointments have, at present, been made for only a limited period, so as to admit of such readjustment as circumstances may require. The Colony of Victoria has appointed a local Agent of its own.

“In promoting the wider circulation of the Bible abroad, it is, as a rule, your Committee itself which has to lead the way in stimulating the action of others. But in one case a zealous friend has been for some years applying to the Committee the welcome incentive of princely donations for colportage in China to promote extended operations in that open field. Another gift of £2,000 was last year placed unsolicited at the Committee's disposal, under the suggestive signature, ‘Man's best gift to Chinamen.’ During the year five more young men have been sent out to China in the capacity of European Head Colporteurs, to travel with, and superintend the work of, native colporteurs. To promote the extension of the Society's Bible work in China, your Committee resolved some time ago to raise the number of its Agents there from one to three, as early as suitable men could be found. The sub-division has been carried out to the extent of appointing the Rev. Evan Bryant to be the Society's Agent for its Bible work in the six northern provinces of China, together with Mongolia, Manchuria, and Corea, as far as practicable. Mr. Bryant was formerly for many years a valued Missionary of the London Missionary Society in China. For the Agency in South China no appointment has yet been made; and that in Japan has lately become vacant.

“At the cost of much personal hardship by the way, two colporteurs from the Caucasus have crossed the Khivan desert, and have practically tested the opportunities for Bible work in the territories of Khiva and Bokhara. They sold 319 copies for about £10. In an encampment of wild Tekké nomads, sixpence could not be raised to purchase a book, and it was in part paid for in eggs. As has so often been the Society's pleasant experience, its colporteurs received the greatest courtesy and assistance from Russian governors and generals. When one of the men was ill of fever in Askhabat, a Russian doctor attended him without charge, wishing, as he said, to befriend a colporteur of the Bible Society. The report of these experienced men is that both in the Khanate of Khiva and in the Amirlik of Bokhara a very large proportion of both sexes and of all ages can read, and that there is nothing to hinder immediate colportage among them but the want of three devoted men to work from Khiva, Tcharjui, and Bokhara as their centres. Your Committee will endeavour, by God's guidance, to obtain such men, and to enter these open doors. From Tashkent Bible work is extending in Russian Turkestan.

“The needs of India have filled an important place in your Committee's measures for extended work. One who has from year to year taken extensive Bible tours for the Society will speak to us to-day fresh from his mission post at Bellary, in South India, and will tell us how things stand. The sum of about £10,000 has been placed at the disposal of the Indian Auxiliaries within the year for the revising and printing of the Scriptures in several tongues, and for colportage. These Auxiliaries have been encouraged by promises of aid to be prepared to offer the Word of God to any increased number of native readers which the spread of primary education may produce among the masses.

“And a fresh step of a most extensive and important kind has been taken by your Committee to extend, under God's blessing, the knowledge and circulation of His Holy Word among the girls and women of the East, and more especially among those who through Hindu caste or Muhammadan custom are rendered inaccessible to any Christian agency except such as can be carried on by

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female workers. After careful consideration of the matter your Committee has decided to adapt to this case, as far as possible, the successful plan upon which they have so long had the satisfaction of aiding the invaluable work done by Bible-women in London through grants to the London Bible and Domestic Female Mission, founded by the late Mrs. Raynard. They have accordingly made to each of the special Societies engaged in zenana work and the evangelization of females in Eastern lands, and to each of the chief European Protestant Missionary Societies which embrace the same department of work, the offer to contribute to them, for an experimental period of two years, the sum of £12 a year for every Bible-woman for whom they might accept the grant, up to the limit of twelve women for each Society. Before the year closed, eight Societies had claimed the full grant of £144 each for twelve Bible-women to labour under their direction. Several others have since preferred similar claims; and this new department of the Society's work bids fair to be both costly and far-reaching. But if, through it, efforts can be multiplied to bring the poor secluded, untaught, women of the East nearer to the light and freedom of the Gospel, your Committee feel that the course they have taken will have the hearty approval and support of all their friends.

"To other points in their foreign work it would be most pleasant to refer, for colportage upon the Continent and in other parts of the world has been as extensive and as interesting as ever. But your Committee must hasten to conclude with a brief mention of matters at home.

"Through its President, the respectful and loyal sympathy of the Society has been conveyed to Her Majesty and H. R. H. the Duchess of Albany in the sad bereavement which has recently befallen the Royal Family.

"Three Vice-Presidents have been removed by death since the last anniversary. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, K.G.; the Right Reverend Dr. Robert Bickersteth, Lord Bishop of Ripon, who often spoke for the Society here and elsewhere with warm-hearted

sympathy and power; and that venerable and beloved patriarch of missionaries, who was present on this occasion a year ago, the Rev. Dr. Robert Moffat.

"It gives the Committee great pleasure to announce the names of eight distinguished men, to whom the Society is in various ways much indebted, who have accepted the post of Vice-President, viz., the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Truro; the Most Rev. the Bishop of Sydney; the Very Rev. the Dean of Canterbury; the Rev. Canon Westcott, D.D.; the Rev. Joshua C. Harrison; the Rev. W. F. Moulton, D.D.; J. Bevan Braithwaite, Esq.; and Henry Robarts, Esq., who has been a member of your Committee without a break for the long period of forty-three years.

"The Committee record with much affectionate regret the death of Dr. Maurice Schulhof, for twenty-three years a member of their body, an Honorary Life Governor of the Society, and one of its most unwearied friends and benefactors.

"Three other Honorary Governors for Life have been removed during the year at advanced ages, each having rendered essential services to the Society. The Rev. Henry Albert Browne, M.A., Rector of Toft Newton, was for thirty-five years one of the ablest of the Society's deputational helpers, and for a time one of its District Secretaries. W. G. Gellibrand, Esq., of Albyns, Romford, for many years assisted the Society's work in Russia, and, after his return to England, rendered valuable service on its Committee as long as health would permit. Mr. William Hitchin was in the Society's service for forty-three years, from 1835 to 1878, and as its Accountant and Assistant Secretary was widely known and much esteemed. The Very Rev. John Mee, M.A., who was formerly a Secretary of the Society, and retained a warm interest in its welfare, has also died.

"But in place of friends removed, others are raised up, and the office of Honorary Governor for Life has been conferred upon nine of those who have in various ways done the Society essential service, viz., the Rev. Charles Hebert, D.D., of Silloth; the Rev. Dr. Johnston, of Belfast; W. Goodday, Esq., of Colchester; Harry Coghill, Esq., of Newcastle-under-Lyme; R. Inns, Esq.,

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J.P., of Barnsley; T. White, Esq., of Bromsgrove; Major Westphal, of Berlin, through whom some hundreds of thousands of copies of Scripture have been supplied to the Prussian Army; and two active valued members of the Committee, R. N. Cust, Esq., and Dr. F. J. Wood.

“Grants of Scriptures, free, or below cost price, have, as usual, been made in aid of many varied forms of Christian work in this country. And in their care for distant fields your Committee have not been unmindful of special measures for enlarging the benevolent and missionary services which this Society already renders so extensively at home. They have added the Gospel of St. Matthew to their list of Scriptures in raised type for the Welsh Blind, and they have taken in hand another Gospel for the same sufferers by the loss of sight. They have revised the whole list of prices of their Scriptures, both in English and in Welsh, and have made considerable reductions in very many of them. They granted £10 worth of large print Scriptures to each of the six Halls recently opened by the London Congregational Union in the poorer districts of the Metropolis.

“And they have decided upon one step which will, they trust, so commend itself to their friends throughout the country, that contributions will flow in to meet the heavy charitable outlay which its success will unavoidably involve. Your Committee have often been anxious to issue a New Testament which could be sold at one penny per copy. They have hesitated to do so hitherto, because the loss would be considerable, and they were already providing an attractive Testament in good type, and selling it, below cost price, for the small sum of two pence. Your Committee would have little satisfaction in issuing a book too small in type to be of service to the poor, and too frail in its materials and construction to stand some wear and tear. Without much legibility, and without any durability, a Testament, however cheap, would be but a poor thing after all as a means for promoting those high aims which your Committee wish ever to keep most in view. The unfounded and cruel charge is still sometimes brought against them, that, to reduce their prices to the lowest point, those by whose toil the work is done are underpaid, and driven to starve or

worse. The Committee have carefully investigated these charges and know that they are not true. They are now preparing to issue a New Testament in good type and form to be sold for a penny, but no portion of the loss involved will be met by under-payment on their part to those who make the book. The more widely this book finds favour, and is put into circulation, the greater the call will be upon the Society's funds. But your Committee believe that they will not ask in vain for sufficient funds to meet this loss, and that their course will have God's blessing and your support. In a word, they feel that there is no nobler, grander enterprise of mission labour and Christian charity, to which they could ask you to devote redoubled zeal, and prayer, and gifts, and toil than that which this Society has now been favoured to conduct for eighty years."

Referring again to the work of your own Auxiliary—it moves in silence, bringing to the country copies of the Scriptures, which are in various ways scattered broadcast through the Provinces by the few depositories still subsisting, but principally brought to the doors of inhabitants, especially in the sparse and thinly settled districts, by the energetic labors of the colporteurs, whose mission so effectually supplies the public, so that the depots in country places are less required. Thus the British-American Book and Tract Society, being in some respects combined with the depository in Halifax, a ready and abundant supply is furnished for such branches as require Scripture on the purchase account. The circulation of scriptures during the year contains nothing new or striking, as the trade and some denominational institutions now import and supply, so much less is required in this department from the Society than in former years.

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In the year now closed we have to regret the removal from our ranks of Mr. William Pryor, one of the Vice-Presidents, and perhaps the oldest member of the board. He departed this life during the past summer. It is not exactly known how long Mr. Pryor was connected with the work of the Auxiliary as subscriber, but in 1841 he was elected Assistant-secretary with the late J. W. Nutting, and subsequently as Secretary till 1855, from which period till the time of his death he held the office of Vice-president. From 1841 to 1855 he filled the office of Secretary, and must have contributed a large amount of diligent labor to the office. The late John C. Haliburton was also a long and regular contributor to the funds of the Auxiliary, and was at one time elected a member of the committee, but declined to serve. Mr. Haliburton's name appears among the contributions of 1865, which contribution he continued till the time of his death. Both men served their God in their day and generation; they lived lives of usefulness, and were above the average of mankind, permitted to see the works of benevolence in which they engaged prosper, and left this world in a better condition than they found it. Such is the case all over the Province. The men who, in the vigor of their youth and strength of their manhood, took hold of, and held on to this movement, are now fast being removed, and we are sometimes inclined to suppose that there is not that hearty response to the calls made to the men of the present day to come forward and fill their places. The Com-

There is a decrease in the amounts received as legacies, which was always an uncertain and a variable item, and hence the general result is much smaller than in the previous year or than in years when large sums swelled the receipts from that source. Last year the Halifax Ladies' Association headed the list of contributions with the largest amount of subscriptions collected. This institution has other openings for its resources—in the employment of a Bible woman, who visits the homes of the poor and opens to them the teachings of God's Word in times when the Bible promises are among the only few comforts that remain.

Your Committee have much pleasure in repeating what they have on several former occasions reported, their pleasure in certifying to the diligent and persevering labors of your agent, Mr. Toland, who still employs half his time in Nova Scotia and the other in New Brunswick, and his reports for the Nova Scotia section, which are always interesting, are herewith submitted, and to all and singular the Ladies' Associations, the Branch Societies and their office-bearers, and the several collectors and all who in any way assisted any of them.

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The Committee present their thanks for the trouble undertaken in prosecuting this great enterprise, and we would call for a more advanced effort for the hastening forward of the glorious consummation yet to dawn upon this world of ours, when from the rising to the setting of the sun, incense and a pure offering shall ascend, and there shall be nothing to hurt or destroy in all the holy mountain of our God.



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AGENT'S REPORT.

*To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia
Auxiliary Bible Society.*

GENTLEMEN,—

I began the labours of the year 1884 in Hants County. My first visit was to Nine Mile River, a part of Rev. J. Layton's charge. The day was unfavourable and the roads bad, which considerably affected the collection.

At Elmsdale the meeting was not large, and the congregation has been building a new church,—the whole amount received from Mr. Layton's congregation was \$12.70.

At Milford, a part of Rev. A. B. Dickie's congregation, I addressed a small gathering, and got a collection of \$5.20. This congregation make a special collection on Thanksgiving Day, and half of it is devoted to the Bible Society.

The Truro Branch re-elected the old officers at the meeting held in Y. M. C. A. Hall on Monday evening, 14th April. Collectors were appointed to go round immediately after the meeting.

The evening proved very stormy at Shubenacadie. Only a very few could attend. Rev. M. Henry handed me \$14.00 previously collected, and I would hope that something more will be realized before the end of the year.

The Treasurer of Middle Musquodoboit Branch handed me \$20.25. The meeting in the Hall was not

large but very interesting. Wm. Sedgwick, Esq., was elected President, in the room of his father, whose age and infirmities prevent him from attending meetings at night.

Though the night was very wet, and roads almost impassible, the turnout at Upper Musquodoboit was very good. Rev. J. A. Cairns, President of the Branch, conducted the meeting, and the Treasurer, Mr. Reynolds, handed me \$15.55.

The meeting was small at Springside. The pastor, Rev. S. C. Gunn, was elected President, and the Treasurer was ready, as usual, to hand over his contribution, amounting, this time, to \$18.02.

Three large meetings were held in Rev. E. Grant's congregation. The Treasurer had remitted to Halifax before my arrival. This Branch always does well.

At Middle Stewiacke the meeting was very small. The night was dark and wet. The few friends who could get out collected and handed to me \$10.30.

The next meeting was held at Acadia Mines. It was but poorly attended, and the collection was very small, amounting only to \$2.13.

In consequence of the great freshet and the carrying away of part of the Spring Hill and Parrsboro' Railway, I was unable to meet my appointments at Parrsboro' and Five Islands.

The weather was again very unfavourable for meeting in Economy. The few who were able to attend heard, with evident interest, the brief account of the Society's work which I was enabled to lay before them.

Held an interesting meeting at Bass River, and although the roads were very bad, and the night dark,

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we had a good turnout. A few of the subscribers were absent, but those present handed to me \$16.55. A collector will call upon the friends who were absent.

At Port au Pique, Great Village, and Folly Village the meetings were all large. At Folly the collection, \$10.21, was much smaller than usual, but it will be, I hope, supplemented by a remittance before the end of the year.

Although the meeting at Oxford was unusually small, there will be no difficulty, as the Secretary said, in collecting Twenty dollars, at least. Business here was very brisk, and the prospects for the future very encouraging.

Rev. Mr. Cassidy rendered good service at the Oxford meeting. He felt ashamed that the attendance was so *slim*, and spoke of it as an evidence of the want of spiritual vitality in the community.

At Antigonish the friends manifested their usual interest in the Society's work. John McMillan, Esq., the President, occupied the chair at the very interesting meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. This Branch gave us nearly \$50.00 last year.

The friends at Hawkesbury gave your agent, as heretofore, a cordial reception. The meeting was held in the very commodious new Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Foshay, Baptist minister, conducted devotional exercises. The meeting was a great success.

At Sydney, South, the friends met in Falmouth Street Church, Rev. J. Murray's. It was by far the largest meeting I have seen in Sydney. The financial results were also in advance of last year. The kindness of D. McLennan, Esq., and family merit special mention.

Went to Glace Bay, and, after walking three miles through mud in a heavy rain storm, was doomed to disappointment. By some unaccountable blunder the meeting had been appointed a week before the time that I had arranged to be there.

At North Sydney the meeting was unusually small, not from any lack of interest, but the nature of the engagements of the friends there, prevented them from attending on a weekday evening. The contribution, however, was equal to that of last year.

Held two large meetings at Sydney Mines. The collections amounted to \$20.00, although, with a few exceptions, the meetings consisted of poor miners, working, as one of them told me, only about two-thirds of full time, and then very often for less than a dollar a day;—he said that many of them had not \$200.00 a year to support large families.

By far the largest and most spirited meeting I have ever seen in Baddeck assembled in Greenwood Church. Subscription lists were circulated in the meeting, and \$15.40 realized. It would have been much more, but for the fact that the county court was then in session, and many of the friends could not be seen.

I would here gratefully mention the kindness of Captain Burchell of the Steamer "Marion," who gave me a free passage from Canso to Sydney and return, thus saving the Society the sum of \$6.00.

Captain McKenzie, of the Steamer "Lady of the Lake," also passed me free.

I must also mention the exceptional kindness of Captain McKay, of North Sydney, who did everything in his power to make my visit a success, besides giving me \$5.00 himself.

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At Melvern Square my reception was, as usual, very cordial. The collection at meeting was \$10.12, which was afterwards increased to \$13.12.

The meeting in the Methodist Church at Middleton was large, and the attention good throughout. The financial results were not encouraging, only \$3.04.

The friends at Somerset were kind, as usual. Silas Bishop, Esq., met me again at the Railway Station, and shewed me every possible attention. The collection at meeting amounted to \$21.65.

In the Baptist Church, Kentville, had a very select audience. The Treasurer had his contribution ready amounting to \$27.42, which was handed to me. Enjoyed the kind hospitality of Judge Blanchard's beautiful residence, as heretofore. It is a little heaven upon earth.

The great rain of August 13th was very unfavourable to our meeting in Wolfville. However, those that managed to get to the Methodist Church expressed themselves delighted with the Bible Society's work, and gave me a pressing invitation to return again.

Windsor Branch was fairly represented in the Presbyterian Church. A select choir gave great interest to the meeting. The collection was \$4.60.

At Avondale and Brooklyn the meetings were well attended. Both these Branches render liberal and steady aid to the parent Society's work. I was glad to see a large number of the young at both meetings.

There was a great falling off in the contribution from Canning, for which many reasons were assigned. There is not, however, any lack of interest. Farmers have had very poor returns for produce, and money is very scarce. I got only \$4.60.

The gatherings at Lawrencetown and Bridgetown were both small. It was the busy season, and farmers were working in the hay field until it was dark. Two collectors at Bridgetown had obtained \$13.96, which the Treasurer handed to me.

Two ladies had tried to collect at Bear River. Their success was not very great, though I believe they did all they could. I received \$6.00.

The meeting in Yarmouth was very far in advance of any I have ever held there. All evangelical denominations were (I was told) well represented. I collected next day \$64.32, which the President, Joseph Burrill, Esq., told me he must make up to \$100.00.

In the Lutheran Church, Bridgewater, there was an interesting meeting. Rev. Mr. Yount presided. Excellent addresses were given by Rev. J. Cameron and Judge DesBrisay. I collected \$43.70, a slight advance on last year. J. L. Oxner, Esq., rendered material aid. The death of A. Gow, Esq., who was killed by falling from his wagon, was generally deplored. I greatly missed his efficient help in collecting.

Visited LaHave, Lunenburg, Liverpool and Milton. Was disappointed in not getting to Liverpool in time for meeting. Had arranged to come by steamer from Lunenburg, but she did not arrive from Halifax that day.

The good friends at Milton, Queens Co., gave your Agent, as usual, a cordial reception. I believe the only subscribers to the Bible Society are in the Congregational Church. Two Baptist Churches both held their prayer meetings the same evening, and there are no Methodists here. Miss J. Tupper went round the members of the Congregational Church and

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gathered up \$10.82. I was greatly refreshed by this meeting.

Had appointed a meeting for Caledonia, but the Stage was two hours late getting in, and had to leave next morning at 4 o'clock.

In the Methodist Church, Amherst, there was one of the most interesting meetings of the season. Rev. Mr. McGregor was elected President. The collection \$4.54 was handed to me.

I have once more to acknowledge with deep thankfulness the kindness of many friends throughout the Province, and would also gratefully record the many tokens of growing interest in the Bible Society's work which I have been permitted to witness during another year. One gentleman said, "The Bible Society is the noblest institution in existence, and I would support it before all the missionary societies in the world." Another remarked, "I always feel ashamed, after hearing the agent, that we, who are so highly favoured, are doing so little to further the work of this God-honouring Society."
