THE WORK OF PARLIAMENT

There was quite a debate last evening in Parliament on the proposal of Mr. Platt, that all grains and seeds which do not open in Canada, but which are now largely imported and sold for the purpose of feeding stock, should be placed on the free list.

The seed grain that it is most desired to have admitted free of duty is corn for feed. This is now largely fed out to cattle in winter in the form of meal. Mr. Bowen seemed to be of the opinion that it would be impracticable to carry out Mr. Platt's idea, because corn for seed could not well be distinguished from corn for other purposes.

Mr. Bowen, in a later part of the debate, expressed the opinion that the Government would take the proposal into consideration. It is not at all improbable that the Government may take some important changes in the tariff. The proposal to admit seed corn free was supported by General Laurier and one or two other Conservative members.

The duty on corn and corn meal has always been viewed with disfavor in the Maritime Provinces, because it appeared like a tax on food, Canada not being a corn growing country. Last year we imported from the United States, 2,311,757 bushels of corn, and 1,537,575 barrels of corn meal, the value of the corn being \$2,272,215. Nearly all the corn meal was imported from the Maritime Provinces, and the share of the duty paid by these provinces on corn and corn meal amounted to \$80,000. This is a large sum, and it is not probable that the Government will be well pleased to have the duties on corn and corn meal removed, and if such a change could not be made, to have the corn duty abolished so that corn could be imported and ground here for local use. Corn can be produced so cheaply in the Western States that we can never hope to grow corn in competition with them, but with cheaper corn and corn meal we might do much more in the fattening of cattle and hogs than is now possible.

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CAPITAL NOTES

The Work of our Queen Legislature Yesterday.

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THE COLONIES AND THE EMPIRE

The increasing disposition of the colonies to take an active part in imperial affairs is one of the signs of the times, which cannot be ignored.

Yesterday, our despatches told something of the comments of the New Zealand and New South Wales papers, on the relations of Great Britain with Germany in Samoa.

The Auckland Herald recently states that England has been harshly treated in Samoa, and other Pacific islands for the favor of Prince Bismarck. This statement may not be true; probably it is not, but it none the less shows the temper of the Australian people, and is quite in line with similar comments that have been made in regard to previous German operations in New Guinea and French encroachments in the Pacific. We are not quite so democratic in Canada, nor do we undertake to give sailing directions to the mother country, but that is simply because we have not been made to feel that any of our interests are being sacrificed by Great Britain. Whatever has been done against our interests by the home government has passed into ancient history, and cannot be charged against any British statesman now in public life. But the tendency of the colonies to influence imperial affairs, although latent in Canada, is none the less strong here than in Australia. Its existence and increase is probably being recognized by such statesmen as Lord Rosebery, who has been telling the British audience lately, that hereafter they must expect the foreign policy of the Empire to be largely controlled by the wishes of the people of the great
