PUNCH'S NEW COVER. Britain's Comic Magazine Change Its 70-Year-Old Design. Figure it out for An item of considerably more than usual literary interest is the announcement that for the first time for nearly seventy years, there is a change in the well-known cover design of Punch. Few now living recollect Punch in any other cover than his familiar garb. He has, however, as a matter of fact, had a number of coats, not less than seven, to be precise. For the first three years of his existence it was the custom to change the cover design of the weekly issue with each half-yearly volume. The first number of Punch was issued on the 17th of July, 1841, in a cover design by A. S. Heaning. The founders of the paper were greatly elated when the whole edition of 5,000 copies was sold out on publication, and their satisfaction was increased when a reprint order for an additional 5,000 was sold out on the following day. A sale of 10,000 copies of the first number of a threepenny humorous periodical was no mean achievement in those days. The second cover was a graceful design containing many figures of Hablot Knight Browne ("Phiz"), a contributor to Punch for a long number of years. A third design was a delightfully pretty one by william Harvey, the Shakespearean illustrator. Mr. M. H. Spielmann, in his interesting "History of Punch" tells of the consternation in the office when a charge of £12 12s. was sent in with the design—"nearly half the total capital with which the engraver Landells a year before had begun the concern." Sir John Gilbert was commissioned to draw the next cover; a fine design which was subsequently used a great number of years as a wrapper for the Punch Monthly Parts. Six months later Kenny Meadows produced the fifth cover, which was followed by a first design by Richard Doyle, a drawing in essential respects the forerunner of the now familiar design, which latter was produced by him for the beginning of the next volume, and was used for the first time in January, 1849. The addition of the second color now proposed is said to greatly enhance Doyle's design, making the delightful figures stand out with greater clearness and vividness.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The return of the Registrar-General for Ireland shows a decrease in the population between 1900 and 1910 of 83,090, or at the rate of 1.86 per cent. The total number of marriages during the decade was 227,211, as against 221,608 during the previous decade, representing an increase of 2.5 per cent in a decreasing population.

The total registered births during the last ten years numbered 1,023,352, as compared with 1,055,020 in the previous period, being a decrease of 31,608, or 3.1 per cent. The births exceeded the deaths by 251,006, but during the decade 346,024, or 7.8 per thousand, emigrated, the number of emigrants exceeding the excess of births over deaths by 89,928.

Representatives of foreign countries are still here, and it is not anticipated that any of them will leave their posts even in case of intervention as the diplomats consider it part of their duty to continue to safeguard the interests of their respective countries. In this connection Admiral Von Hintze, the German minister, is optimistic, and says he believes there is no reason for anxiety, and that a plan is being considered by which armed intervention will most surely be avoided. He said: "There comes off radium a gas called the emauaoff radium a gas called the emauation, which has exactly the properties of pure radium, and we have proved now—the discovery was made some months ago, but nothing was said about it—that for curative purposes the emanation of radium is as efficient as radium itself. Radium gives off these emanations constantly, the amount depending upon the quantity of radium that is used. The emanation never weakens the e emanation never weakens the

radio-activity of the piece of radium from which it exudes.

Mr. A. E. Hayward Pinch, medi-cal superintendent of the Radium Institute, stated that according to the most reliable authorities, an atom of radium would only shed one-half of its radio-activity has something between 2,000 and 2,500 years so that it would be a good something between 2,000 and 2,500 years, so that it would be a good many generations ahead before there need be any worry about the degeneracy of the radium actually possessed by the institute. But more marvelous than the discovery that radium emits gases of equal cutative power to the substance itself without destroying its own efficiency are out destroying its own efficiency are the remarkable inventions made by the institute staff to capture and the institute staff to capture and confine the emanations in tubes, plates and bottles. Sir Frederick Treves showed the company some flat plates, about as large as two postage stamps, into which 50 to 80 milligrammes had been scaled. These can be sent out to country doctors who want to treat patients. The emanation loses its radio activity emanation loses its radio activity very rapidly, declining to one-half of its original strength in three and a half days. Still, the doctor in Edinburgh who wants to apply the equivalent of 50 milligrammes of radium to a patient can have a tube sent to him overnight which will represent that strength on arrival to represent that strength on arrival to him the next morning. Fifty millines of pure radium would cos grammes of pure radium wound cost £1,000; 50 milligrammes of radium emanation, of equal curative powers to radium itself, would cost him six guineas for 24 hours' use. This is bringing radium treatment, where there is no radium, within the reach of the mest modest purse. "During f the most modest purse. he last 10 days," remarked Sir Frederick Treves, "the institute has Frederick Treves, "the institute has sent out 13 pieces of apparatus, representing 860 milligrammes, in the form of radium emanation, which, if the actual substance were used, would represent £17,200 worth of radium." One of the four grammes of radium possessed by the institute (the total value of the four in £50,000), was recently set said. institute (the total value of the four is £80,000) was recently set aside exclusively for the production of radium emanations. From this 160 milligrammes of emanation are secured in plates and tubes every day. Anticipating the calls for radium emanation that the announcement of this discovery will lead to, the executive committee have now decided to devote another ½-gramme of their precious substance exclusively to this work. But Britain's supremacy in wireless is assured by what is known to her wireless experts as the "rejector," the properties of which as the name would suggest, are to reject all messages, or etherwaves, which are not meant for the British fleet.

By this simple contrivance the once-pessible trick of breaking up our fleet's messages is obviated, while, on the other hand, an English operator, having once "tuned" his instrument to the current of an opposing vessel, is able to play havoc with all its communications, and indeed, in most cased (would be able to render a fleet's wireless perfectly useless.

An interesting illustration of the "bluff" it is possible to make use of by the possession of this little invention can be found in the fact that at the recent Irish Sea manoeuvres an up-to-date torpedo-boat destroyer, lying off the northeast coast of Ireland, weshable to completely break up the messages of two battleships which

washable to completely break up the messages of two battleships which washe not using the "rejector," and to render their wireless quite useless, while they were totally incapable of marking any effect upon the little trait's signalling apparatus with its valuable attachment.

It is needless to remark that the "rejector," which is encased in a very insignificant box in our battleships' wireless houses, is an invention which constitutes one of the most zealously-guarded secrets of the British Sea Lords.
