Lobster packing had been carried on for a number of years in Portland, Maine, and in Nova Scotia before it was taken up in Prince Edward Island. The first factory in the province was started about the year 1860 at Egmont Bay, by Mr. Brown, a tinsmith, who was generally called Tinker Brown. He met with a fair measure of success. Lobsters were abundant but he did not thoroughly understand how to preserve them properly, and many fish as a consequence were spoiled in the cans. The next factory was started at Malpeque by the late Harry McNatt, who conducted the business on a small scale, but who seemed to have understood the preserving process beta small scale, but who seemed to have understood the preserving process better than Mr. Brown. The first factory of any pretensions in the province was started at Murray Harbor about forty years ago by Hon. Daniel Davies, uncle of Sir Louis Davies, now Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada. Mr. Davies who is at present residing in Chariottetown says, that when he started the business he received more fish than he could handle. They were first taken with gaffs, and as many as ten thousand a day were captured from under the rocks and under the seawead. So plentiful were they he says, that when a person went in to bathe there was always danger of getting his feet nipa person went in to bathe there was always danger of getting his feet nipped by the claws of the lobster. Mr. Davies had associated with him as manager and partner the late John Cairns. The latter had been formerly packing salmon in Merigomish, when Mr. Davies pointed out the success of the lobster industry in Nova Scotia and induced him to open up at Beach Foint, Murray Harbor. Mr. Davies sold out to Mr. Cairns, but subsequently acquired control of the business again, and carried it on up to within four years ago, when advancing age compelled him to retire from active work. He is now in his eighty-fourth year and is the oldest packer

fourth year and is the oldest packer in the province. He carried on the business on a larger scale shipping of-ten from three to four thousand cases The first factory in Queens county was started in Canoe Cove by the late. William Harris, father of Robert Harris, R.C.A. He ran the business for ris, R.C.A. He ran the business for two years and sold out to John Hughes, of Charlottetown. The industry thus had its birth in Prince county, but it quickly spread to the other counties until there are now fifty-two factories in Queens, fifty-two in Kings and lighty four in Prince


