While Fleet Engages Czar's Warships in Gulf AID DISABLED SOLDIERS of Riga Germans Continue to Make Advances by Land - Fortress of Novo Georgievsk Succumbs With Loss of Many Guns and Much War Material.

Petrograd, Aug. 20, via London, Aug. 21.-A German fleet has penetrated the Gulf of Riga and is engaged with Russian warships, defending the coast, according to an official statement issued tonight at the Russian War Office. The communication follows:

'Strong forces of the German fleet have penetrated the Gulf of Riga, and fighting with our ships continues.

"On land, on the whole front, from the west of Riga to the Lower Biliya, there has been no essential change. After the occupation of the Kovno fortifications by the Germans the remainder of the garrison rejoined our forces, occupying positions west of the railway from Janow to Kochedary, south of Kovno. Our troops still are on the left bank of the Niemen.

"From Ossowetz southward, and still further along the whole front of the Upper Narew and the Bug, in the course of the 18th and 19th, the Germans made strong attacks. On the right bank of the Marcy, in the region of Strenkova and Gours, in the Strabila-Breisk, sector and near Lipnitzs, thirteen miles northwest of Brest-Litovek in the sectors attacked, our troops continue to withstand the enemy. Our cavalry assisted in repulsing a German offensive near Lipatiza, attacking the German Infantry in strong forces.

"On the Bug, the enemy, having occupied the right bank of the river since the morning of the 19th, directed his ulterior efforts along the road leading to Pushoka.

"Near Novo Georgievsk, after occupying the left bank of the Wkra the Germans concentrated all their efforts northwest of the Wkra, as far as the Vistula. By an incessant bombardment with a hurricane of projectiles they almost completely destroyed our fortifications. In this section on the evening of the 18th the Germans surrounded one fort in the region of Wymslow and afterwards, despite enormous losses, directed their columns on the rear of the Zakroczyln sector. This compelled our troops on the night of the 19th to retire on the line of the former forts forming the central defense. In the course of the following day, having destroyed by their fire two of these forts, the Germans, by a series of sanguinary assaults occupied their ruins, from which they directed their fire against the central defenses. We blew up the bridge over the Narew, and the forts we abandoned in the northern

The Russian official statement indicates that they have accomplished their purpose, probably penetrating through the Dirben Chan nel, which is the only practicable way for large ships to enter the guif.

The Russians asserted that their warships and seaplanes were successful on the 8th in repulsing nine German battleships and twelve cruisers, with a large number of torpedo boat destroyers. The Germans asserted this attack merely was a reconnaisance to determine the posi-

A German admiralty statement issued August 11, said that German ruisers drove off Russian torpedo boats which appeared near the entrance of the gulf the preceding day, in spite of repeated attacks by Rus-

Russian warships, protecting the entrance to the gulf had drawn in closer owing to the great superiority of the enemy's fleet.

London, Aug. 20.—The garrison of the fortress of Novo Georgievsk, which was left behind by Grand Duke Nicholas when he commenced the evacuation of Poland, to delay the advance of the German invaders, after accomplishing its task for just a fortnight, has succumbed to the heavy siege artillery of the Germans, which throughout the war has made every fort attacked by it untenable.

Berlin was able today to announce the capture of the fortress, with its seven hundred guns and a large quantity of war material. The spoils have not yet been estimated, but they probably are large, as it had been hoped by the Russians that the earthworks around the fortifled camp would enable it to hold out much longer than it has done, it is now expected by the military observers that the other Russian foruch as Brest-Litovsk, Grodno and Ossowetz, either will be captured or given up.



SWEDEN'S PREPARATIONS FOR ENTERING THE WAR

Emperor William was quick to take Emperor winam was quick to take advantage of the opportunity thus of-fered. On the outbreak of hostilities he invited Sven Hedin to become his guest at his headquarters, over-willing him with courtesies and attentions and arranged that he should be accorded the most extravagant and exceptional favors by all the commanding Generals, with the object as he declared, that Sven Hedin might furnish to his countrymen and to the world at large, with all the authority of his name and fame, "an entirely impartial account" of what he had seen and of German military opera-

The result has been that Sven Hedin's pen has been that Sven Hedin's pen has been entirely at the service of Germany since last Sep-tember. Moreover, all the time that he could spare from the German front has been devoted to delivering fiery speeches throughout the length and breadth of Sweden-where he is and breath of Sween—where he is regarded as a national hero—against Russia, against England and France, and in favor of Germany.

Another thing which has contrib uted very powerfully to embitter the Swedes against Great Britain and her Swedes against Great Britain and her allies has been the attempts made during the last few months by Eng land to restrict Sweden's contrabance trade with Germany. The average and sunt of American produce and wares imported into Sweden in times of peace has been about \$14,000,000 During the last twelve months, the figure has risen to considerably over \$100,000,000, the surplus above the previous average having been reexported to Germany. The ports of Sweden and there are scores of them, have been overcrawded throughout the past year with huge ships bring-ing their commodities from all parts of the world. So great was the traf-fic that it was no exceptional sight to see whole fleets of large steamers waiting in the roadsteads to enter ha

bor, as there was not an inch of quay space available for them. Perhaps the climax was reached in January of the present year, when on a certain day thirteen immease cargo steamers arrived from the United States at Gothenberg, laden to the extreme limit with American cotton —cotton which is so indispensable to modern explosives that without it Ger-many would long ago have been commany would long ago have been com-pelled to sue for peace. Mountains of foodstuffs, tens of thousands of horses, horseshoes by the million and food of every kind have been exported by Sweden to Germany, which has out bid all other buyers in Sweden by 25 per cent. In fact Germany has been drawing all her supplies from sweden, especially since Italy joined the Triple Entente and the Swedes have been reaping fortunes.

It was at length brought home t Great Britain that as long as this condition of affairs continued it was foolish to dream of reducing Germany to submission by means of a blockade of her ports. Accordingly a commis-sion was despatched by the British Government to Stockholm to concer-means for the prevention of contraband reaching Germany from the out-side world by way of Sweden. It was fatuously expected in England that the Swedes would be satisfied to adopt port trade in such a way as to



OVERLAND FACTORY

Additions more than equaling the size of the average American automo-bile plant are being started at the Overland factory in Toledo. The addi-tions to the factory alone will be equiv alent to almost twenty-three acres of floor space. In addition to the fac-tory extensions there wil be a new office building, 63x373 feet. One of the new factory structures will contain twenty acres of floor

will contain twenty acres of floor space and will be nearly three times the size of the original Pope plant, when taken over by John N. Willys, president of the Willys-Overland Company. This building will be five stories high, 400 feet wide, and 400 feet deep. It will be used for final testing, body assembling and finishing and will contain 800,000 square feet of floor space.

This building will contain even more floor space than the one recently completed for the Overland, which was 1,000 feet long, 200 feet wide and three stories high, and said to be the largest single factory building in the world. The new assembling and finishing building will, upon its completion, give the Toledo plant the distinction of having two of the largest sing.

tion of having two of the largest sin gle factory buildings ever constructed

Many of the horse-drawn fire engines have been converted into motor driven have been converted into motor driven engines by equipping them with trac-tor eagines. In December, 1914, there were 1167 fire horses. The previous year there were 1341 horses. The de-partment is now getting rid of them at the rate of 200 a month. If the necessary funds are provided the com-pletion of motorization will be accom-plished by the end of 1917. Last year the city appropriated \$380,000 for moor fire apparatus.

in the way of motorization. Stalls
have been removed from many firehouses, gasoline storage tanks have
been installed, and floors strengthendefinition in the description of the department is being equipped with the department is being equipped with the department is being equipped

with three classes of motor apparatus. These are: Tractor engines, high pressure automobile hose wagons, each of which will save the department \$280

sure automobile hose wagons, each of which will save the department \$280 a year, and gasoline motor-driven engines with a pumping equipment. The automobile training school which the department has established in its repair shops at Fifty-sixth street and Twelifth avenue, is a busy place. Young firemen with a mechanical bent are sent to the school, where they receive a six weeks' course of instruction in the working parts of motors. The school is in charge of Battlion Chief James Henry. Chief Henry takes his charges out daily in a motor truck, and gives them practical in struction in auto-driving. In this way the department is training and developing chauffeurs.

Fire officials assert that the superiority of the motor apparatus to the horse has been clearly proven. The motors have been found to be much faster than the horses. Then it has been estimated that the motorization of the department will save the city thousands of sollars.
