

## U. S. FACES A GRAVE CRISIS; HOLD-UP OF THE SAILORS A CAUSE OF INDIGNATION

### WINNING TICKET IN SAINT JOHN CITY

Major Tilley, Philip Grannan, F. L. Potts and J. Roy Campbell Choice of Enthusiastic Convention.

Magnificent Gathering of Electors Hear Strong Addresses from the Candidates and Hon. J. B. M. Baxter—Attorney-General Tells of Opposition Dictator's Actions—A House to House Canvass to Get Opposition Ticket in this City.

St. John supporters of Good Government at a grand convention in the Bani-Ready building last evening selected Major L. P. D. Tilley, Philip Grannan, F. L. Potts and J. Roy Campbell as their standard-bearers in the approaching provincial elections.

Baldwin, if ever, in the history of political meetings in the city, has there been a more largely attended and enthusiastic gathering than last evening's nominating convention. Men who have fought the party's battles in the past mingled together with new workers and gave a demonstration of their unswerving loyalty to the Murray Government.

Strong addresses were made by the candidates and by Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Attorney-General of New Brunswick.

Seven names were before the convention, but Commissioner Wigmore, who had been nominated, in the course of a neat speech asked that his name be not considered. The Commissioner pointed out that his duties at City Hall made it necessary that he forego the acceptance of the provincial nomination, although he assured the gathering that the nominees of the party would have his whole-hearted support. In deference to the Commissioner's wishes his name was not considered. The other men who were placed in nomination, Dr. Manning and John Thornton, polled a creditable vote, and though not successful in securing the nomination, they are nevertheless enthusiastically in support of the government ticket.

Dr. Thomas Walker took the chair and called the meeting to order.

The following resolution was moved by H. R. Emerson and seconded by W. A. Ewing:

"Resolved, That this convention unqualifiedly approve of the government of the Hon. J. A. Murray and pledge their support to him."—Unanimously carried.

Miles E. Agar presented the report of the nominating committee as follows: That Messrs. L. P. D. Tilley, Philip Grannan, F. L. Potts, J. Roy Campbell, James Manning and John Thornton had consented to allow their names to be brought before the convention.

R. W. Wigmore thanked the convention for the honor done him in asking him to place his name in nomination but asked that it be withdrawn as he felt that he could not in justice to his duties at City Hall accept. He was willing to do everything in his power for the nominees of the convention and at some future date might feel asking for their support as a candidate.

C. M. Lingley moved, seconded by J. J. Wood, that the candidates be asked to pledge themselves in the event of their election and the government being returned to power not to accept any federal or provincial position of emolument without the permission of the executive of the party.

The motion was lost.

H. B. McLellan moved that those nominated pledge themselves to abide by the vote of the convention and work for the successful nominees.

Carried.

It was moved by J. Roy Campbell that the two members of the last house, Messrs. Tilley and Grannan, be selected by acclamation and the motion was carried unanimously. The following were nominated for the other two places on the ticket: J. Roy Campbell, F. L. Potts, James Manning and John Thornton.

### HUNG SUBMARINES SINK BIG WHITE STAR LINER

Steamer Afric, of Oceanic Steamship Co., Torpedoed. — Steamer Saxonian Sunk Without Warning. — Canopic Safe. — Kelvindale Probably Struck Mine. — Steamer Foreland Sunk.

Period of Grace for Neutral Ships Announced by Germany Entering the Prohibited Zone Has Now Expired, According to Berlin Official Statement as Announced by Berlin via Amsterdam.

London, Feb. 13.—Lloyd's shipping agency this afternoon announced that the White Star liner Afric, of 11,000 tons gross, has been sunk. Part of the crew of the liner was landed.

The Afric belonged to the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, a subsidiary of the White Star Line. Steamers of this line were familiar with the vessel said she had accommodations for about 500 passengers, second-class only. She was engaged in the Liverpool, Capetown and Australian service. At the office of the White Star Line here it was said the ship had been engaged in admiralty service, but whether so engaged when sunk they did not know.

The Exchange Telegraph Company says the Afric was sunk by a submarine, and that seventeen of her crew are missing.

The Saxonian.

Queenstown, Feb. 13.—Edward Moore, of St. Louis, American from the steamer Saxonian, sunk by a U-boat, said the submarine which sank the vessel gave no warning, but immediately began to shell the ship on sighting her. While getting into one of the boats a man was wounded by the splinter of a shell. Thomas Williams, boatswain, was injured badly and afterwards died. The attack was made at a point fully 250 miles from shore. One boat, containing twenty-three men, was adrift 68 hours before the occupants were picked up. The captain was taken prisoner on the submarine.

Canopic Safe.

Boston, Feb. 13.—The White Star liner Canopic, from Mediterranean ports with passengers, arrived at Quarantine today.

The American steamer Alaskan, which left Boston January 23, arrived at La Pallice, France, Feb. 10, according to cable advice received today.

Germany's Announcement.

Amsterdam, Feb. 13.—All periods of grace for neutral ships entering the zone announced as prohibited by Germany have now expired, according to a Berlin official statement received here. The statement says that immunity ceased in respect to the Atlantic and English channel zones on the night of February 12, for the North Sea zone on February 6, and for the Mediterranean zone on February 10. It continued:

"From now on, therefore, in all prohibited zones the warning which has been issued is in full force and shipping can no longer expect individual warning which has been issued in full force and shipping can no longer expect individual warning. ### U. S. MAKES STRONG DEMAND ON GERMANY

Detention of Seventy-Two American Seamen Creates Another Serious International Situation --- Unless Sailors Are Released, Washington Says, More Vigorous Action Will Be Taken.

### W. A. EWING HEAD OF N. B. BARRISTERS

Annual Meeting of New Brunswick Society Held at Fredericton.

Fredericton, Feb. 13.—The annual meeting of the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick was held this evening in the Supreme Court chambers. In the absence of Mr. A. R. Slipp, K. C., the retiring president of the society, Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., was called to the chair. The report of the secretary-treasurer, Dr. T. C. Allen, K. C., showed that after a generous outlay in replenishing the law library there is a good financial showing on the official audit, a balance of \$1,076, against which there are outstanding liabilities not yet accrued of some three hundred dollars. The treasurer also reported an over-subscription for the oil painting recently procured of Chief Justice McLeod, the cost of same being \$500.

Delegates Elected.

Attention was called to communications that had been received from the Canadian Bar Association requiring the election of two members by the bar of each province as members of the council of that body in addition to those appointed by the Dominion Bar itself. On motion Dr. T. C. Allen and Mr. Allison Connell were chosen provincial members to represent the Bar of New Brunswick at the next meeting of the Canadian Bar which will take place at Winnipeg in August next.

On a ballot being taken for the election of officers Mr. J. J. F. Winslow and Mr. J. T. Sharkey were named as scrutineers and the following were chosen officers for the ensuing year: Mr. W. A. Ewing, K. C., president; Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., vice-president; Dr. T. C. Allen, K. C., secretary-treasurer; Dr. R. B. Wallace, K. C., Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., W. P. Jones, K. C., Mr. Peter Hughes, Mr. F. R. Taylor, Dr. Powell, K. C., L. J. Tweedie, K. C., members of the council.

### Cabinet Discusses All Phases of Break with Germany—Outbreak in Cuba Cause of Worry—Probably German Influence Back of Revolution—Outlook in U. S. is that War Will Be Declared Shortly.

Washington, Feb. 13.—An inquiry concerning the re-detention by Germany of the 72 American seamen brought in by the prize steamer Yarrowdale was despatched to Berlin today by the United States, preliminary to more vigorous action if the men are not promptly released.

The plight of these sailors occupied much time at today's cabinet meeting, given over to the crisis growing out of Germany's submarine warfare. It was agreed that their liberty again should be demanded in most emphatic fashion. Pending complete reports as to the treatment of German crews on war-bound ships in the Philippines, Hawaii and elsewhere, however, the government will content itself with the inquiry as to why the Americans are held, and under what conditions.

As To Naval Guns.

The cabinet discussed every phase of the international situation. The question of providing navy guns for American ship owners desiring to arm their vessels for defence was considered, but it was stated officially afterward that no decision was reached. It is understood that there was a division of opinion, both on the ground that permitting American ships to remain idle in port suggests acquiescence to Germany's course and because the congestion of ocean-bound freight in the country's ports is assuming serious proportions. Two or three members are said to have contended that the policy would be unwise. The president will decide the question. News that an official statement had been issued at Berlin announcing that yesterday was the last "day of grace" allowed neutral shipping before unrestricted submarine warfare went into full effect did not appreciably increase tension here. There has been full realization ever since the sinking of the Anchor Line California that the German campaign is being carried on in defiance of the United States, and that Providence only is to be thanked that the overt act against American life that will precipitate war has not been committed.

There were strong indications during the day that severance of relations with Germany would be extended to the other Central Powers. Austria's adherence to Germany's position is regarded as practically certain to force a break with that country. The ambassador at Constantinople was instructed today to ascertain whether submarines operating under the Turkish flag were under the same instructions as those of Germany and Austria.

It developed that no message has been received at the state department since the break with Germany from either Ambassador Eikins, in Constantinople, or from Consul-General Murphy, in Sofia, who cared for American interests throughout Bulgaria. All cables to and from both points must go through Vienna, but officials have no indication as to whether they are held up there or by the local Bulgarian and Turkish authorities.

Meanwhile the naval collier Caesar, loaded with food and clothing contributed by Americans for the sufferers in Syria, and the cruiser Des Moines, loaded with medical supplies, are lying in Alexandria harbor, unable to continue their voyages to Beirut because of the uncertainty as to what greeting they would meet. They are long overdue at Beirut, where they were not only to unload their supplies for the destitute Syrians, but also to take on board the detained Americans.

Yarrowdale Prisoners.

Germany's re-detention of the Yarrowdale prisoners, who had been ordered released upon the demand of the United States just before the break in relations, has aroused keen indignation, the incident almost overshadowing, temporarily, other issues of the grave situation.

# HOW THE CENTRAL RAILWAY WAS MANAGED OR MISMANAGED BY MR. PUGSLEY THE MASTER MIND OF THE OLD GANG OF POLITICAL TRICKSTERS

Nearly a Million Dollars of the People's Money Tossed About Without Any Special Guardianship and Almost \$135,000 of that Amount Misappropriated — The Report of the Royal Commission Explains Why Several of the Opposition Candidates Had Voted Down a Resolution for Investigation—Opposition Candidates Concurred in Copp's Astonishing Statement "I Do Not Think it is the Duty of Supporters of the Government to go Deeply Into These Things."

Why did Ex-Surveyor General Sweeney, now heading the opposition ticket in Westmorland county, ex-Solicitor General Jones, leading the opposition forces in Carleton County, and Mr. Ryan, the opposition candidate in Albert County, vote against Mr. Hazen's motion for a Royal Commission to investigate the affairs of the Central Railway? And why did Messrs. Tweeddale and Burgess, the opposition candidates in Victoria county, shirk the vote on that occasion? And why did Mr. Copp also vote against an investigation into the affairs of the Central Railway, after having made the remarkable statement that "I do not think it the duty of supporters of the Government to go deeply into these things?"

### Findings of Commission

The findings of the Royal Commission appointed by the Hazen Government immediately after their coming into power in 1909, will supply a pretty good answer to these questions. That commission was composed of the late Sir P. A. Landry and Messrs. F. McDougall and A. L. Toed. Here are some of their findings:

"It is true," says the Commission, "a company was organized, with one object in view, which existed in name only, whose shareholders never attempted to influence its policy. Having everything to gain and nothing to lose, they left the control to the ex-official directors, Messrs. Tweeddale and Burgess, as the government was putting up all the money. The company never performed the functions usually exercised by an incorporated company. It was in fact nothing but a disorganized department of the government of this province, whatever may be claimed for it in theory. The policy of granting government assistance to any company whose shareholders have not on their own account a dollar at stake is unsound, if not vicious."

"On the face of it the motive of the promoters, as stated, was to develop the coal areas of Queen's County. Responsible and respectable men from various parts of the province were obtained to lend their names as directors, and from the fact that \$430,000 of the total \$500,000 authorized capital was to be distributed as founders' shares, we conclude that the interested parties, had visions of ultimate profits, with absolute certainty of no personal loss."

"As shown in the earlier stages of this report, the coal mines failed to materialize. It was found inexpedient to even attempt to develop the mines in a large way. Thus at an early stage original visions of profit had faded and must have departed on a declivity called for as to the abandonment of the expenditure of \$250,000 intended for the coal development. However, it would seem that the prospect of spending large sums of money under cover of the company was too alluring to be resisted. Accordingly a name was adopted, and the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company's existence was continued."

### No Books of Account

"It is also clear to your Commissioners that it was never the intention of those controlling the company to keep books of accounts for public information. \* \* \* The misuse made of the money, the fact that the accounts far overran, particularly in the early stages, legitimate expenses, made it imperative that to conceal the truth no uniform system of bookkeeping be adopted. It is claimed that the Barnes Construction Company kept books, which could not be produced; but we are by no means satisfied that they were not destroyed or that they were not intentionally concealed. From the evidence before us, and from a careful study of the bank accounts and other matters by which we could trace the disbursement of moneys, we have no hesitation in saying that especial

ly during 1902 the moneys used up and liabilities incurred far outstripped any legitimate expenditure that was being made. The difference we believe to have been misappropriated. Otherwise sufficient money would have been on hand to have paid current bills, leaving the government in this respect a clean sheet on taking over the road in 1905."

### Govt. Members Should Have Kept

"An ordinary course of business the company's interests and those of the province, from whom it received all its resources, would have been in a business sense antagonistic. Therefore we believe good business demanded that the Provincial Secretary (Tweeddale) and the Attorney General (Pugsley) remain outside the company. Then as members of the government they would have seen to it that stipulations safeguarding the provincial treasury were lived up to; as it worked out, by their position in the company as members of the government their influence was paramount, representing, as they did, all the capital invested. By their presence in the House of Assembly, on the other hand, they were able, from their knowledge and control of the company's affairs, to present such statements as were necessary to allay the suspicions of the legislature and conceal from the country the true state of affairs."

### Want An Account

"We believe the directors of the company, and especially the ex-officio members, Messrs. Pugsley and Tweeddale, are responsible to the province for an accounting. They should be called upon to submit an account showing the expenditure of \$958,799.75, or at least that portion of it supplied by the province."

"We find, putting the most charitable construction on the entire transaction, that \$134,035.25, stated in our recapitulation following statement 'C,' given as unaccounted for, was misappropriated and diverted from its proper and legitimate channels. 'Considering that the doors were never locked—that nearly one million dollars were tossed about without any special guardianship or any reasonable prospect of anyone being called upon to account, that temptation in its most seductive form was continually in the path of the politicians interested, it is not very difficult to understand how an amount even larger than \$134,035.25 might well have been switched from its legitimate course."

"It is clear that Mr. Sharp found a balance to the credit of the New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company in the Bank of New Brunswick, June 30th, 1904, of \$52,250, and the cash book he made up starts with the same amount on that very day. The first entry is: '1904, June 30th: Government advanced \$52,250.' This total is carried forward and directly underwritten and not entered as a debt, as all other expenditures are, is found in lead pencil: 'Less W. P. \$5,000,' and that \$5,000 is deducted from the total, leaving a balance of \$47,250. Nowhere else in the book is this item of \$5,000 mentioned."

### That "W. P. \$5,000 Item"

Mr. Pugsley has never been able to give any satisfactory explanation with regard to this mysterious "W. P. \$5,000 item."

"Payment to A. B. Copp, \$1425." Of this amount Mr. Copp was paid \$1,050, July 7th to October 20th, 1905. On March 26th, 1906, he was paid the balance, \$375. No voucher or accounts were filed giving the items making up the above amounts. Mr. Copp stated in evidence that he had visited Ottawa once pressing for a settlement of the extra subsidy on the 15th mile section, and once in interviewing Mr. Emmerson in reference to the purchase from the I. C. R. of some old steel bridges; that he had

also settled some outstanding accounts, among others that of Rhodes, Curry & Co. and James Barnes. "Perhaps the services of a lawyer might fairly be employed in the first named Ottawa visit, re double subsidy, but we think the fee was excessive. So far as the other services of Mr. Copp were concerned, it is not clear to us why a paid officer of the company should not have effected these settlements as effectively and more cheaply than a lawyer could have done. As a matter of fact Mr. McAvity stated in his evidence that Auditor Sharp had adjusted the Barnes' claim. Mr. Copp's evidence shows clearly that he had not prepared himself to do work of any value, and we believe his achievements were according to his preparation."

### Reckless Extravagance.

The report of the Royal Commission is largely made up in exposing scores of cases of reckless extravagance and glaring dishonesty in connection with the expenditures on the Central Railway. It may be necessary to refer to many of these a little further on. In the meantime, however, some idea will be given of the many thousands of dollars that it cost the province to exchange Hon. A. S. White in the provincial government for the master mind of the old gang, the Hon. William Pugsley, and it will be shown conclusively that he is the chief director in the present attempt to restore the old gang to power.

### 236th Kilties' Campaign.

This will be occupied by the recruiting officer for the Kilties. On account of the central location it is thought that many men will be reached who before have evaded the recruiting offices on Prince William street. The 115th band will arrive in the city shortly to carry on the work of recruiting by giving musical concerts. Colonel Guthrie left last night for Fredericton.

## HON. RALPH SMITH, FRIEND OF LABOR, IS DEAD

**Born in England, Came to Canada as a Poor Boy, Tilled in Coal Mines of B. C., Took up Ministry and Highly Honored in Affairs of State—Was Presented to King George.**

Victoria, B. C., Feb. 13.—Hon. Ralph Smith, Minister of Finance in the British Columbia government and one of the best known champions of the labor cause in Canada, died suddenly early today. While member for Nanaimo in the House of Commons he became widely known throughout the Dominion as an advocate of the rights of the coal miners of British Columbia, Nova Scotia and elsewhere and as an upholder of union men in general. Although nominally a Liberal in politics he was independent and frequently voted against his own party, especially on labor measures. He occupied a position in the house similar to that of the English Laborites at Westminster.

Born in England.

Ralph Smith was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne Aug. 8, 1858, the son of Robert and Margaret S. Smith. He was educated in the schools of his native city, and at an early age as a poor boy, came to Canada. In 1882 he married Miss Ellen Spear, founder of the Laurier Liberal Ladies' League. Miss Smith was presented with a gold brooch by members of the organization in appreciation of her work as a laborer.

Mr. Smith went to British Columbia in 1889 and notwithstanding his education he became a miner near Nanaimo. All the while he studied at first with the idea of taking up the ministry. In fact he did become a minister for a time in preparation, according to the rules of the Methodist church. He decided, however, to abandon his ministerial labors. Next he became general secretary of the miners' union at Nanaimo.

Mr. Smith was immensely popular with the miners and in fact was the personal friend with whomsoever he came in contact. In 1898 he was elected to the high office of president of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress.

## THE OPPOSITION LEADER MAKES ANOTHER BAD BREAK

**Mr. Walter E. Foster Shows as Little Knowledge Regarding Legislation as He Does in Respect to the Finances of the Province.**

The Telegraph reports Mr. Foster as saying at the St. Martin's meeting the other night:

"I notice Hon. Mr. Baxter says he had engineers survey the Crown Lands; but they are leased for twenty years. It is too late to do the surveying now. No business man would sell a stock of goods and value it afterwards. We won't control them for twenty years."

Mr. Foster had made that statement some weeks before when he attempted to deal with the financial statement of the Government. In his interview exposing Mr. Foster's criticism at the time Hon. Mr. Baxter said:

"He seems to think the Government has lost control of the Crown Lands of the province. That shows that he is as innocent of the legislation promoted by this Government and passed by the Legislative Assembly as he is of knowledge respecting the finances of the province."

So that Mr. Foster may not continue to make himself ridiculous respecting this matter, his attention is directed to an Act respecting the Crown Timber Lands of the province, passed at the legislative session of 1913. If he will look at sections 4 and 7 of that Act he will see that

# POLICEMEN TO WEAR GREY UNIFORMS

## Council Votes Year's Salary to Widow of John A. McAndrew—Winchester Charges to be Investigated.

The proposed investigation into the charges against Street Superintendent Winchester were again before the council yesterday and after some discussion recommendation of the committee of the whole that the council investigate the matter was passed. Commissioner Fisher could not see any necessity for any investigation but the other commissioners felt certain reflections had been cast on both Mr. Winchester and themselves and the whole matter should be cleared up. It was decided to pay J. W. Stout of Fairville the sum of \$233, excess rent paid on the understanding that certain improvements should be made in the store occupied by him. The sum of \$250 will be paid to the family of the late John A. McAndrew as a token of appreciation of his services to the city.

Commissioner McLellan submitted samples of grey cloth for police uniforms and was given authority to purchase 230 yards from Manchester Robertson and Allison at \$3.50 per yard. The mayor called the council to order at 3 o'clock and all the commissioners were present, together with the common clerk.

The committee of the whole recommended that the mayor with Aldermen Wigmore, Russell, Fisher and McLellan, members of the common council be a committee to hold an investigation under the provisions of section 3 of the Act of Assembly 58 Vic Cap. 48 into the following charges made by Alderman Fisher, commissioner of public works, on the 23rd day of January last, in moving for the dismissal of Albert Winchester, superintendent of streets, namely: "Because of certifying to several cases of sidewalk restoration by property owners when the repairs had not been made, thus enabling the parties to obtain their guarantee deposits without performing their obligations to the city"; that from now until the 1st of May next, the committee meetings on Mondays and Thursdays in each week be held at 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon instead of at 11:30 a. m., as at present; that from the 1st day of March next the number of watchmen employed on the city's wharves and sheds be reduced to thirty, to be distributed as the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands may think advisable; that the sum of \$2,200 be appropriated from general revenue for the maintenance during 1907 of the incinerator at east end of Broad street and two dumping places for ashes located in the eastern and northern portions of the city, and that in case the general revenue receipts during 1917 should be insufficient to meet the expenditures then the above sum of \$2,200 be placed in the estimates for the 1918 assessment.

They reported that tenders were opened on the 7th day of February in regard to a horizontal steam engine for the public works department and referred to the commissioner of public works with the mayor with power to act, who accepted the tender of the Canadian Fairbanks Morse Co. Limited for a 10 x 12 Bertrand horizontal slide valve engine for the sum of \$57,50, and recommended that their action be confirmed.

The report was taken up section by section and the first section in regard to proposed investigation caused considerable discussion.

Commissioner Fisher questioned the need of any investigation and asked why the council was asking for one. Commissioner McLellan said that owing to certain articles which had appeared in the press a great many citizens were under the impression that Mr. Winchester had been guilty of dishonesty and the commissioners who voted for the motion expressing their disapproval of his dismissal were considering a crime and he asked Commissioner Fisher whether he had asked Mr. Winchester whether the charges contained in the report in regard to signing certificates of repairs to sidewalks was true or false. Commissioner Fisher did not answer the question.

Commissioner Wigmore was in favor of the investigation in order that Mr. Winchester might have an opportunity of clearing himself of the charge of dishonesty for a great many people had the impression that a wrong had been committed.

Commissioner Russell said that he had met with citizens who were under the impression that Mr. Winchester had actually taken this money and he felt that the investigation was necessary to clear up these misunderstandings. The remaining sections were passed without discussion and the report adopted as a whole. The commissioner of public works reported that an application had been received from Mr. Wm. O'Keefe for permission to erect an electric sign over the entrance of his restaurant, No. 229 Union street, and recommended that the permission asked for be granted subject to the usual conditions and agreement being executed by Mr. O'Keefe; that a claim against the city for damages caused by the overflow on Mill street on Feb. 9th had been made by Dr. D. J. Mullin; that the city solicitor had advised that the city was not liable for damages of this kind, and he recommended that Dr.

The men will parade from the exhibition building, in which they are quartered, through the principal streets of the city. The battalion have with them the regimental color which was presented to the battalion by A. J. Young, of North Bay, Ontario. His son, Lieut. Russell Young, is attached to the 228th Battalion.
