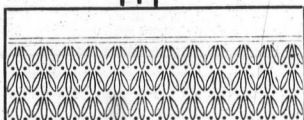

Stated Meetings of Managers are held in their room on the second Tuesday of every month, at 8 p. m., and a committee meets in the church on the same evening at 7.30, for the purpose of allocating pews.

A Joint Meeting of the Session and Managers is held at the first regular meeting after each Communion.

Auxiliary to the Women's Foreign Missionary Society meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 8 p. m.

Young Ladies' Mission Band meets on the first and third Thursday of every month, at 8 o'clock p. m.

Weekly Prayer Meeting every Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock.

The Regular Business Meetings of the Sabbath School Association are held on the last Thursday of every month.

The Ordinance of Baptism is dispensed on, the last Sabbath of every month, at the commencement of the morning service, and on the first Wednesday of every month, at the commencement of the Prayer Meeting.

The Ordinance of the Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbath of March, June, September and December.

A Preparatory Service on the Friday immediately preceding each of the said Sabbaths at 8 p. m.

The Annual Meeting of the congregation is held on the third Wednesday in January.

When members change their residence, they should give notice either to the Pastor or the Elder of the district, otherwise they cannot reasonably expect to be visited or have their communion cards delivered.

REVENUE.



The whole revenue of this congregation is derived from weekly contributions by envelope and the plate collections.

All subscribers by envelope are supplied with envelopes on the first Sunday in each quarter.

Members and adherents who are not subscribers may be supplied with envelopes on application to any of the managers.

All subscribers are expected to contribute a fixed sum weekly, and if, from any cause, they are unable to do so, they shall be expected to make up all deficiencies at their earliest convenience.

Subscribers wishing to increase or decrease their contributions are requested to notify the managers, so that a corresponding alteration may be made in the books.

Subscribers are particularly requested to see that their envelopes are properly sealed and their names and pew number on the outside before they are handed in.

MISSIONARY COLLECTIONS.

Collections for the Mission Schemes of the Church are received by envelope on the last Sunday of each month, and are placed in the boxes which will be found on entering the church, just inside the doors.

If not convenient to give on the last of the month, any other time will do.

Envelopes will be found by any who wish them, in the small boxes at the church doors.

It is expected that, as far as possible, subscribers will give a definite sum every month, and if subscribers fall in arrears they will be notified of the same as often as the committee think it best.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting

Of the Congregation,

Held on Wednesday Evening, January 19th, 1898.

The meeting was opened by a short devotional service, conducted by Dr. Fraser, after which A. McPherson was appointed chairman and J. A. Cox secretary.

It was moved by John Wright, seconded by W. J. McFadden, that the minutes of last annual meeting be taken as read and adopted.—Carried.

The minutes of a special congregational meeting held on Wednesday, Feb. 24th, 1897, and two adjourned meetings held on March 10th, 1897, and on March 24th, 1897, were read, and on motion of John Wright seconded by W. J. McFadden, adopted.

The Managers' report was presented by John Wright, Chairman of the Board, who moved its adoption, seconded by W. J. McFadden. A short discussion arose, and the Chairman decided to consider the report clause by clause. The report was finally adopted with the exception of the clause re the publishing in the year book of the individual givings for all purposes of each contributor, which on motion of John W. Ogilvie, seconded by J. M. Gow, was ordered to be struck out.

The Treasurer's statement was presented by James Dixon, upon whose motion, seconded by John Wright, it was adopted.

The following gentlemen were nominated for the office of Manager for the term of three years, viz: Messrs, John Wright, W. J. McFadden, T. J. Stewart, Alexander Smith, Thomas Glass and D. N. Campbell.

The chairman appointed Messrs. J. M. Gow, D. A. Rowland and D. J. N. McLeod as scrutineers of the ballot.

It was moved by John Wright, seconded by W. J. McFadden, that Messrs. Robert Irwin and Herbert Givin be re-elected auditors.—Carried.

It was moved by John Wright, seconded by John Gillespie, that Messrs. D. A. MacNabb, Samuel Malcolmson and David Brown be re-elected Trustees.—Carried.

On motion of W. J. McFadden, seconded by John Wright, the following were elected ushers for the year, viz.: Messrs. G. S. McConnell, William Mitchell, James Pecover, D. R. MacPherson, Hugh Hawthorn, Chas. Whitmore, Thos. W. Wright, Thomas Muir, J. W. Stevenson, D. J. N. McLeod, Thos. M. Williamson, and William Robertson.

The sixty-first annual report and Treasurer's statement of the Sunday School were presented by the Secretary, D. J. N. McLeod, who moved their adoption, which was seconded by Dr. Fraser and carried.

The report of the Session was read by A. McPherson, Session Clerk, when it was moved by Andrew Leitch, seconded by Robert Booth, that the report be printed in the Year Book.—Carried.

The scrutineers here reported that Messrs. John Wright, W. J. McFadden and Alexander Smith had received the largest number of votes, whereupon the Chairman declared them elected for three years.

The tenth annual report of the Mission Sunday School was read by J. W. Stevenson. Upon motion of Mr. Stevenson seconded by Dr. Fraser, the report was adopted and ordered to be printed in the Year Book. The Treasurer's statement was also read by J. W. Stevenson. On motion of Mr. Stevenson, seconded by Mr. Johnson, it was adopted and ordered to be printed in the Year Book.

The twenty-ninth annual report of Knox Church Missionary Association was read by Miss Helen F. Fraser, which on motion of Miss Helen F. Fraser, seconded by William Givin, was adopted and ordered to be printed in the Year Book. The Treasurer's statement was read by Miss R. A.

The annual report and Treasurer's statement of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor were read by D. J. N. McLeod, which on motion of Mr. McLeod, seconded by Andrew Leitch, were adopted and ordered to be printed in the Year Book.

It was moved by W. J. McFadden, seconded by John Wright, that the reports of the Junior Christian Endeavor Society and the Mission Junior Christian Endeavor Society be taken as read and adopted.—Carried.

It was moved by Andrew Leitch, seconded by John Wright, that the sympathy of the congregation be extended to Dr. Fraser and family in their recent sad bereavement.—Carried.

There being no further business the meeting was closed by Dr. Fraser pronouncing the benediction.

FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF

THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF KNOX CHURCH

For the Year Ending 31st December, 1897.

In presenting this our fifty-fourth annual report we do so with feelings of regret in not being able to present as favorable a report as our last one. The year just closed has not been a successful one financially, and in consequence of this your Board regretfully announce a considerable deficit, but through God's kindness and blessing we humbly pray that this New Year may bring to Knox Church a new era of success and prosperity.

The envelope and loose collections both fall considerably short of last year, the envelope by \$314.90 and the loose collections \$114.53, or a total shortage on regular Sunday collections of \$429.43.

The following are the complete figures as taken from the Treasurer's statement:

Envelope.....	\$4,704.69	\$5,019.59
Loose.....	547.49	662.02

The number of subscribers by envelope for 1897 was 453, against 522 for 1896, and the average giving per Sunday for 1897 was \$90.47 while that of 1896 was \$96.60. The average loose collections for 1897 per Sunday was \$10.53, while that of 1896 was \$12.73. Compared with the collections in 1890—envelopes \$5592.54, loose \$1049.44; total \$6641.98, or a falling off of \$1389.80. The present arrears on the books considered good amount to \$180.00.

Your Board decided to have the windows and outside woodwork painted and it has materially improved the outside appearance of the church.

Your Board were also compelled to have one of the furnaces repaired, and it required to be almost thoroughly renewed. All of this your Board trust will meet with the approval of the congregation.

Your Board would now draw the attention of the congregation to the resolution passed at a previous meeting as follows: "That the Pew Committee be empowered to re-allocate all pews for which holders are three months in arrears," and hereby give notice that in future this will be carried out.

Your Board would further recommend that a canvas of the congregation be made to find out how each family is disposed to contribute towards paying the debt of the Sunday School.

Your Board would again remind the congregation that all votes for the expenditure of money must be by ballot.

The Managers who retire by rotation are Messrs. John Wright, W. J. McFadden and James Merriman.

In conclusion your Board ask the blessing of our Heavenly Father on the whole congregation, that we may work more harmoniously in the future for the advancement of His kingdom on earth.

On turning to the next page we find the names of those who have been diligently feeding on one of the most nourishing ingredients of Presbyterianism—the Shorter Catechism, and who have on examination been able to answer from

memory all the 107 questions. Their names are Lizzie Dyer, Laura Carrol, Ella Philip and Florence McClure.

We next view the fourth, perhaps the brightest page of all, and here we find the actual results of our work as a Sunday School. Our one aim is to bring our scholars to the knowledge of Christ as their Saviour; and while all the means we use must and do pass away, yet the results last throughout all eternity. None can tell all the good that has been done, but God does even in this life permit us to see fruit for our labors, and through the influence of the Holy Spirit our labors have not been in vain during the past year, for from our school there have joined the church thirteen of our scholars. "Let us praise God from whom all blessings flow."

Our financial statement is referred to on the next page, which is interesting to us because it shows that our school has not overlooked one of the important teachings of our Lord: "That it is more blessed to give than to receive." Our actual collections have been: For the General Fund, \$221.86; for Building Fund, \$110.51, and Missions, \$240.11. A total of \$572.48; an average collection of \$11.01 per Sunday.

Still another page and we find the report of a well patronized library of over 1,200 books, both useful and edifying. Over \$80 was expended for new books last year. We have about thirty-five good books slightly used which have been read and reread by our scholars that we intend donating to our Mission Sunday School.

The next page we can almost imagine draped in black, as it speaks of two scholars, one teacher, and one of our officers, who have been called from our midst by death. Their names are Mary Boyes, Sadie Hall, Miss May Fraser, and Mr. John McKenna. Yet, why should we not call this a bright page, when we know that all four knew Christ as their Saviour, and when we know that, if it is our loss, it is their great gain. Let us not forget the message left for our school by one of the departed scholars: "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth."

Now we have reached the last page of our report—one that speaks of a new but very important feature of our work, that of a teachers' meeting to study the lesson together. During the year we have started such a meeting on Wednesday evening, before the prayer-meeting; the plan works well, and we hope better as we advance. A number of the teachers of both our Sunday Schools, who are engaged up-town, go directly from their employment to the church, where a committee (appointed monthly) prepare a repast of bread and butter, with tea or coffee. A collection of five cents each is taken to defray the expense of this tea. It is served from 6.30 until 6.45, then all adjourn to the parlor for one hour to study the lesson, which is always led by one of our own teachers. The average attendance has been about twenty at the tea and thirty-five at the lesson. Let us hope and pray that this meeting will bind us as teachers and officers more closely together for this very important work.

KNOX CHURCH MISSION SABBATH SCHOOL.

Another year of work in the Master's vineyard has come and gone, and we are reminded, as we enter upon another year's labor, that the same Almighty hand that led us during the past, will continue to guide and bless us in the future. Surely we can say that our God has been kind to us in the year that has just closed. We would therefore unfeignedly express our gratitude to Him for His goodness and mercy manifested to us as individuals and as a school.

Perhaps never in the history of our school did we start with a darker outlook than last year, but we are pleased to say that by God's blessing the clouds which we so much dreaded were big with mercy and have fallen with blessings on our head.

From a spiritual standpoint the past year has been by far the most successful of all—four of our members having professed their faith in Christ and joined the church. Truly we have reason for thankfulness when we see these grand results, and we are encouraged to go forward sowing the good seed by all waters, trusting to God to give the harvest.

The attendance for the past year has been very good, considering the closing of the mission on Sunday evenings, thus, to a certain extent, withdrawing the interest of the parents in the school. We have on our roll: Teachers and officers, 27; scholars, 175, with an average attendance of 142.

Our infant class continues to grow in numbers, and we are in need of a larger room for this class, as they are too small to be brought into the regular classes for some time yet.

At the beginning of last year we decided to give a prize to every scholar who attended Sunday school every Sunday during the year, and we are pleased to say that twenty-two prizes are to be given. Some of our scholars have a record of every Sunday for five years.

We are called upon from time to time to give up some of our workers, but we are always blessed in having others to step in and take their places. Our losses this past year have been unusually great. Miss Laird, whom we looked upon as being the backbone of the Mission, was called to leave us and enter into a greater work, and to share and enhance the joys of one who did a good work in the mission. Mr. Chas Truscott, our valued secretary, had to leave us on account of business promotion, and some others who were with us for shorter periods have left. But still we go on feeling that the harvest truly is great and the labors few.

Our picnic at Sulphur Springs in July was very successful.

Mr. McRae gave an exhibition of limelight views in the Mission during the winter which was much enjoyed.

We have been able during the year to make a number of very necessary repairs to our Mission. The walls were wainscoted all around, a new library was built, and a number of minor improvements effected.

We spent \$25 in getting new books, and now we have a first-class library which is well patronized.

We have been able to hand over \$50 to the Managers of our church, and besides our school has given \$30 to Missions.

48 The year of 1897 has gone forever, and the time has come to present another Annual Report of the work done for Missions. Our report in some respects, we are sorry to say, is not encouraging, the main one being that we had twenty-seven fewer subscribers in 1897 than in 1896. In 1896 we had fewer than in 1895, so instead of progressing, we seem to be going backward.

48 A number of private subscribers, according to agreement, for the past five years have been paying annually \$250 for the support of a missionary in the North-West. The agreement ends with this year, so unless we make up \$250 in some other way, next year our funds, already too low, will show a considerable decrease. The young ladies of the Mission Band were asked to canvass the congregation to see if they could increase for the coming year the number of subscribers to the "Presbyterian Record," an admirable little paper for missionary news. We are pleased to state that the number has been more than doubled, and we take this opportunity of thanking the young ladies for their cheerful assistance.

er. We wish specially to draw attention to the fact that we had this last year one very young subscriber to our missionary funds, a little boy about seven years old, who gave fifty-five cents. Surely many of our older members will feel that they have been surpassed in earnestness by this little boy.

rs. During the year your Committee arranged to hold missionary prayer meetings the second Wednesday of every month; these we hope have been helpful and enjoyable.

The committee in Toronto, knowing our membership, sent us an estimate of what we should give for missionary purposes. According to the funds we have received from all sources—Church, Sunday School, Endeavor Societies (three),

Mission Band, and W. F. M. S.—we were able to pay nearly all they asked for.

Almost at the end of the year the circle of our Missionary Committee was broken, one of our members, Mr. John McKenna, being taken from us. He will be missed in many more places than our Missionary Association. He worked so quietly and so faithfully. May we all strive to follow his example in both particulars.

In closing, surely many of our members in regard to missionary work are not practising the Golden Rule. Just imagine if you had been born in China, India, or Africa, what you would like people in Canada to do for you; then do the same for those who *have* been born there.

We sincerely thank our Heavenly Father for the faithful workers and helpers that we have in our missionary work, and we hope that in the coming year, through the influence of His Holy Spirit, many more may be brought to see their duty and privilege in regard to this branch of His work.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

It is with feelings of gratitude to God, in presenting this the ninth annual report of our Society, that we are able to say, He has led us through the whole year, sometimes through sunshine and sometimes through shadow, which at times seemed very dark. We feel that we are being moulded and fitted better for the service that is before us, and hope in the year upon which we have already entered, we may all be able to do a grander work for our Lord and Master.

The work of our Society has been done as usual by our seven committees, namely: Look-out—whose duty it is to bring new members into the Society, to introduce them to the work and to the other members, and to affectionately look after and reclaim any that seem indifferent to their duties. The Prayer Meeting—who have in charge the prayer meetings, see that the topic is assigned, appropriate hymns selected, a leader appointed for every meeting, and does what it can to secure faithfulness to the prayer meeting pledge. The Social—who endeavor to promote the social interests of the Society by welcoming strangers to the meeting, and by providing for the mutual acquaintance of the members occasional sociables, or any other entertainment of which the Church approves. The Missionary—who provide for missionary meetings, keep charge of our missionary library, and aid in any manner the cause of missions. The Visiting—who call on any strangers in connection with the congregation and endeavor to make them feel at home in the church, also to aid the Flower Committee in making sick visits. The Flower—who provide flowers for the pulpit and distribute them to the sick at the close of the Sunday services. The Relief—who hold cottage prayer meetings at the houses of the sick after each Sunday evening service, also relieve as far as possible cases of distress, and always to act in a Christian spirit towards those in want or sickness.

We have a very earnest staff of young people on each of these committees, but there is always room for many more, and to secure these letters were sent to the young people who are members of our church but are not engaged in any active church work, pointing out the need of their assistance and inviting them to unite with us to assist in one of the many kinds of work our Society provides. We have already been favored with good results from those letters, and hope to see better in the ensuing year.

CONSTITUTION

OF

KNOX CHURCH, HAMILTON.

1st.—The Church, Manse, Burying Ground, and any other houses or real estate now belonging to or which may hereafter become the property of the congregation, shall be held in trust by three members of the said congregation, in full communion, in accordance with a Deed of Trust—bearing date the sixth day of September, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

2nd.—The members in full communion with the congregation shall have the sole power of choosing a Minister or Pastor and Elders of said congregation.

3rd.—The election of a Minister or Pastor shall take place at a meeting of the members of the congregation, which shall have been called from the pulpit of the Church by the officiating minister on each of the two Sabbaths preceding such meeting. The majority of members present shall determine the election.

4th.—The method of the election of Elders shall be determined from time to time by the Session, as occasion may require, but the election shall be by the members of the congregation, and notice of meeting for such election shall be given as provided in clause third.

5th.—The constitutional duty of the Session to superintend the spiritual affairs and watch over all the interests of the congregation is recognized and reserved to them.

6th.—Nine Managers shall be elected to take charge of the secular affairs of the congregation, three of whom shall retire annually in rotation, but shall be eligible for re-election. In case of a vacancy occurring by a resignation or otherwise, the Managers themselves shall fill the vacancy at their earliest convenience; and a Manager absenting himself from three successive regular meetings, without leave shall cease to be a Manager.

7th.—The Managers shall select their own Chairman, Treasurer, and Secretary, hold regular meetings as often as their business may require, and may give notice of their meetings either from the pulpit on Sabbaths or by the Secretary to each Manager, when demanded by any three of them. Three Managers shall constitute a quorum. When the Managers shall themselves deem it necessary, or when requested to do so by seven or more members of the congregation in full standing, they shall with concurrence of the Session call a special meeting of the congregation, stating the object in the notice thereof; and no business shall be entertained at any special meeting excepting what is mentioned in the notice thereof. Should any Manager cease to be a member of the congregation he shall cease to be a Manager. The Treasurer shall open an account with some regular chartered bank in the city, and deposit in his own name, as Treasurer of the Managing Committee, moneys from time to time as may be convenient.

8th.—The use of the Church property for public and general purposes not connected with the congregation shall be under the control of the Managers with the concurrence of the minister.

9th.—The whole revenues of the congregation from all sources shall be received and disbursed by the Managers in payment of stipend, salaries, and other expenses, including such as may be required for preserving the property and providing for the dispensation of Divine ordinances; but no repairs, improvements or alterations exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars shall be gone into without the consent of the congregation. The "Poor Fund," however, shall be distributed by the session, and contributions for missionary and benevolent purposes shall be distributed by the Association appointed for these special purposes.

10th.—The members of the congregation shall choose their Organist and Precentor, and fix their salaries, and in the discharge of their duties they shall be under the control of the Session.

11th.—The Managers shall have power to engage or dismiss and regulate salary of any one who may act as Church Officer or Door Keeper; and appoint or pay such person or persons as may be required to keep the Church clean and comfortable.

12th.—The Managers shall be accountable to the congregation for their acts, and shall, at each annual meeting in January, submit a full printed, audited, articulate statement of the income and expenditure of the preceding year—copies of which shall be distributed in the pews on the Sabbath before the annual meeting; and said Managers shall be regulated as to the proportion of revenue to be applied to any particular purpose by the instructions they may receive from the congregation at any special or annual meeting.

13th.—A committee, consisting of the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer of the Managing Committee, two members of the Session, the Secretary of the Sabbath School, and Secretaries of all the organizations in connection with the congregation, shall annually arrange for the printing—in pamphlet form—of the reports of all the different organizations in connection with the congregation, together with the list of office-bearers, members and adherents, with their residences; said pamphlet to be distributed to the congregation as early as possible after the annual business meeting, and not later than March 1st. The Chairman of the Managers shall be chairman of the said committee.

14th.—The Managers or Trustees shall have no power to contract debt on property without the consent of the congregation.

15th.—At each annual meeting the congregation shall elect three Trustees and two Auditors to serve for one year.

16th.—The foregoing Rules shall be in force until altered or amended, and no motion to alter or amend said Rules shall be put unless due notice of such motion has been given at the annual meeting of the congregation, and when notice of motion shall have been made, a special meeting of the congregation shall be called to consider the same, not sooner than two weeks, nor later than two months after said annual meeting.

17th.—In the foregoing Rules no one shall be held to be a member of the congregation who is not in full communion with the same, and whose name does not appear on the Communion Roll of the said congregation, and no others than members in full communion shall be allowed to vote at any congregational meeting.
