LONDON, Dec. 31.—The fire yesterday origisated in a building occupied by C. D. Davidson & Sons, paper and paper felt manufacturers and paper bag makers at 118.

It was a large structure and was completely gutted, as was also that of Adolphe Frankan & Co., manufacturers of pipes and importers of tobacco, at 121 Queen Victoria street. At 4:30 p.m. four large blocks of buildings were in flames and burning steadily. At 5 p.m. St. Benet's Church again caught fire and was completely destroyed. There was no loss of life and but few accidents among the firemen. The cause of the fire is unknown. The damage is estimated at \$2,000,000. 
