Able Lecture by Dr. Burns, o Hamilton, at the Teachers' Association.

The evening session of the London Teachers' Association held yesterday took the form of a lecture, elequent and instructive, on "Some Thoughts on Our Educational System," by Rev. A. Burns, LL. D., principal of the Ladies' College, Hamilton. Victoria Hall was crowded. On the platform were Dr. Burns, Inspector Carson and Principals McQueen, Stewart, Baker, Kirk and Edwards, and C. A. Barnes, P. S. I., East Lambton. Mr. McQueen presided. The teachers met, he said, every little while to study the methods of teaching the young, who would direct the destinies of our land at some would adopt any one system and listen to no improvements that might be suggested. Dr. Burns said he came to London to alk and suggest. There was not a man living with whom everybody agreed. No-body's labor was more important than the teacher's. The teacher should treat all

teacher's. The teacher should treat all pupils alike and be patient with and kind to them. The greatest blessing a country could have was to have a good corps of teachers. But the lecturer wished to speak particularly of system. Attendance should be compulsory, for every child should be educated. The children of the poor should be furnished them, for this was cheaper than paying for them in a reformatory. Very few boys and girls could hope for half the time in which to receive a liberal eduthe time in which to receive a liberal edu-

the time in which to receive a liberal education. How many business men had had four years' schooling before taking a professional training? In the country there were bad roads, the pupils had to walk a long distance to school, and there were ample opportunities for country boys and girls to absent themselves from school. The kindergarten was the paradise of the little ones. What a blessing to the parents that their children were off their hands and learning something. In the present system there was too much detail in teaching, too much attention was paid to examinations, the pupils were prepared for too many subjects, and there was a tendency to make the subjects too difficult. The examinations, as conducted in Ontario, did more harm than good. What Canada needs as the two chief aids o pure elections and better government is law to provide that one man shall have but one vote, and that he shall poll that vote of necessity, and not as a result of the coaxing of one or other of the political parties, and too often after corrupt inducements have been held out to get him to go to the polls.

The one man one vote principle has been arried cut in Ontario Provincial election for several years. It is a great improveent on the old system, which yet prevails in Dominion elections, where, in every constituency, the "foreign vote," made up of non-residents who have little if any interest in the constituency, is almost invariably the factor that turns an election. The party that goes to the most trouble and expense to hunt it up wins. But why should elections not be decided by residents in a constituency alone have never heard of either a Liberal or a Conservative in this Province who would for one moment think of returning to the old system. That is an evidence of the success of the one man one vote principl when fairly tried. Why should it not take the place of the corruption-breeding, vexatious system under which Dominion






