The disease is maligant, and once the first stage is passed, when proper medicines can be administered, nothing

can save it. In other Ontario cities the legitimate theatres have been able to withstand the disease. They sought the services and aid of the proper physicians, and are still doing business and attracting the best produc-

The funeral of the local theatre will be held as soon as the health authorities have issued the permit. There will be the office boy, the rubber stamp man, and the bootlicker in attendance. The admonition not to send flowers is unnecessary. There is no danger of anyone doing so. The interment will be made in the graveyard of Unadvertised Hopes. No inquest will be held.






