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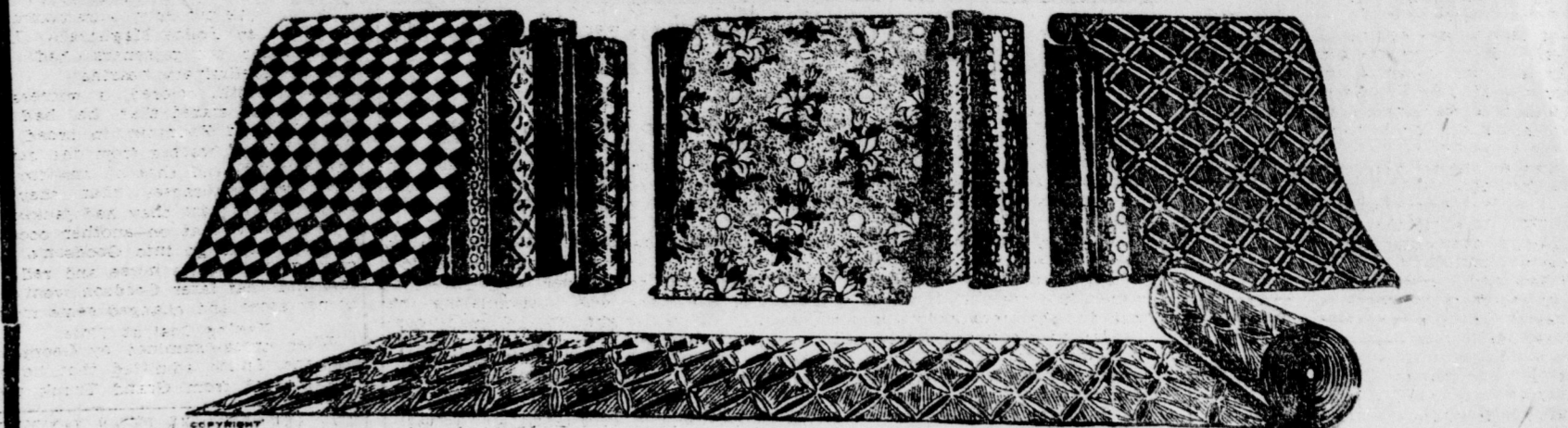

Eminent Set Precedent for Neutral Flag Use

Berlin Cruiser's Escapade at Penang Was Hailed As Very Clever—American Papers Hold Lusitania's Action As Justified—German Decree Is Most Offensive, Says World.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Feb. 8.—Following is the editorial comment of the New York newspapers of this morning on the Lusitania incident and the German war order: "The full text of the German decree regarding the destruction of British commerce is more offensive to neutrals than the synopsis that came before us as well as the German ultimatum. It accuses Great Britain of violating international law. It accuses neutrals of making only a theoretical protest. It finds in the attitude of Great Britain and neutrals sufficient excuse for the adoption by Germany of every method of warfare."

REPORT EXPECTED. [Canadian Press.] Washington, Feb. 8.—A report from Ambassador Page at London on the holding of the American flag on the Lusitania, while crossing the Irish Sea was expected here today, and pending its arrival there was no regulation of the neutral flag. It was stated, however, that while no report had been called for, one would be made as early as possible. The British design of aeroplane, the secretary contended, has been found superior to that used by any other country. The speaker also said that as a result of the excellent sanitary services, cases of enteric fever were rare, and that the prisoners were vaccinated, inoculation ought to be made compulsory.

The letter was sent on a finance committee, at that body had previously been delegated to deal with the question of paying the engineer while at the front.

Two Colored Youths Accused of Stealing \$1,200 Worth of Brasses From G.T.R. 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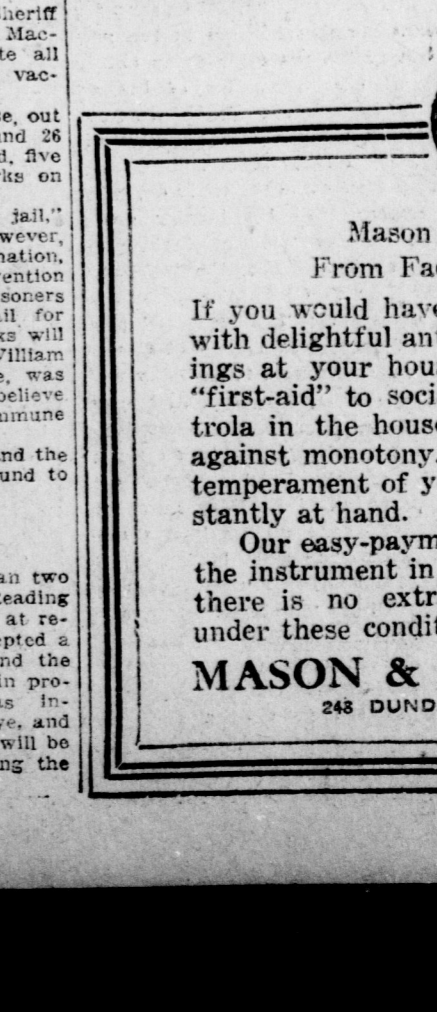

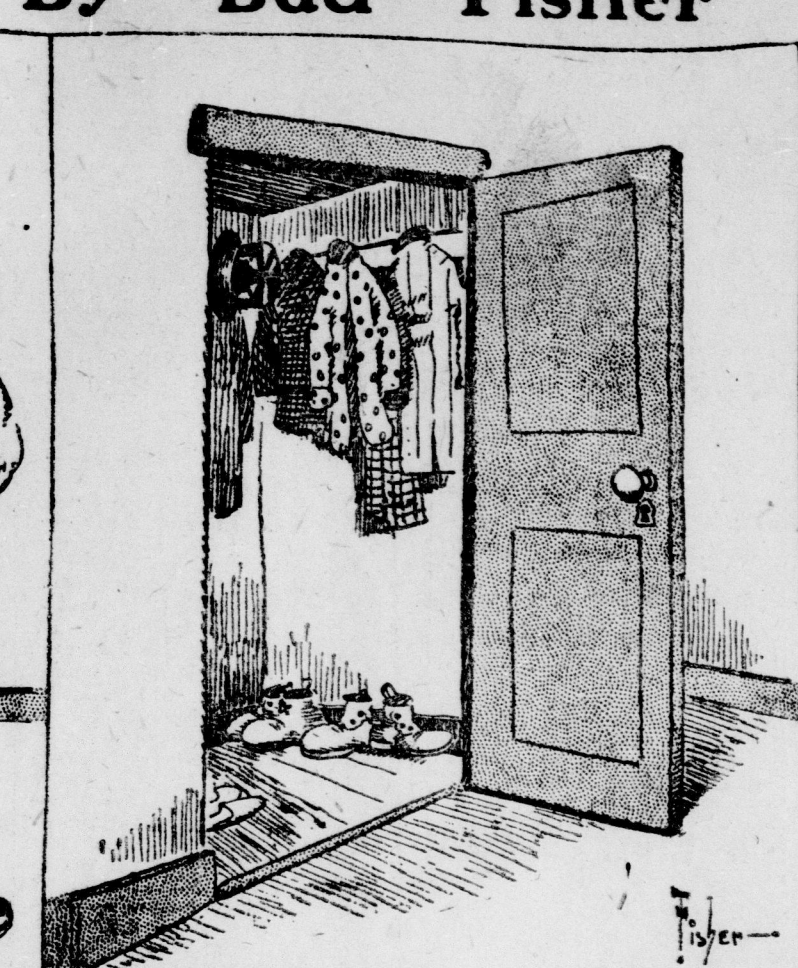
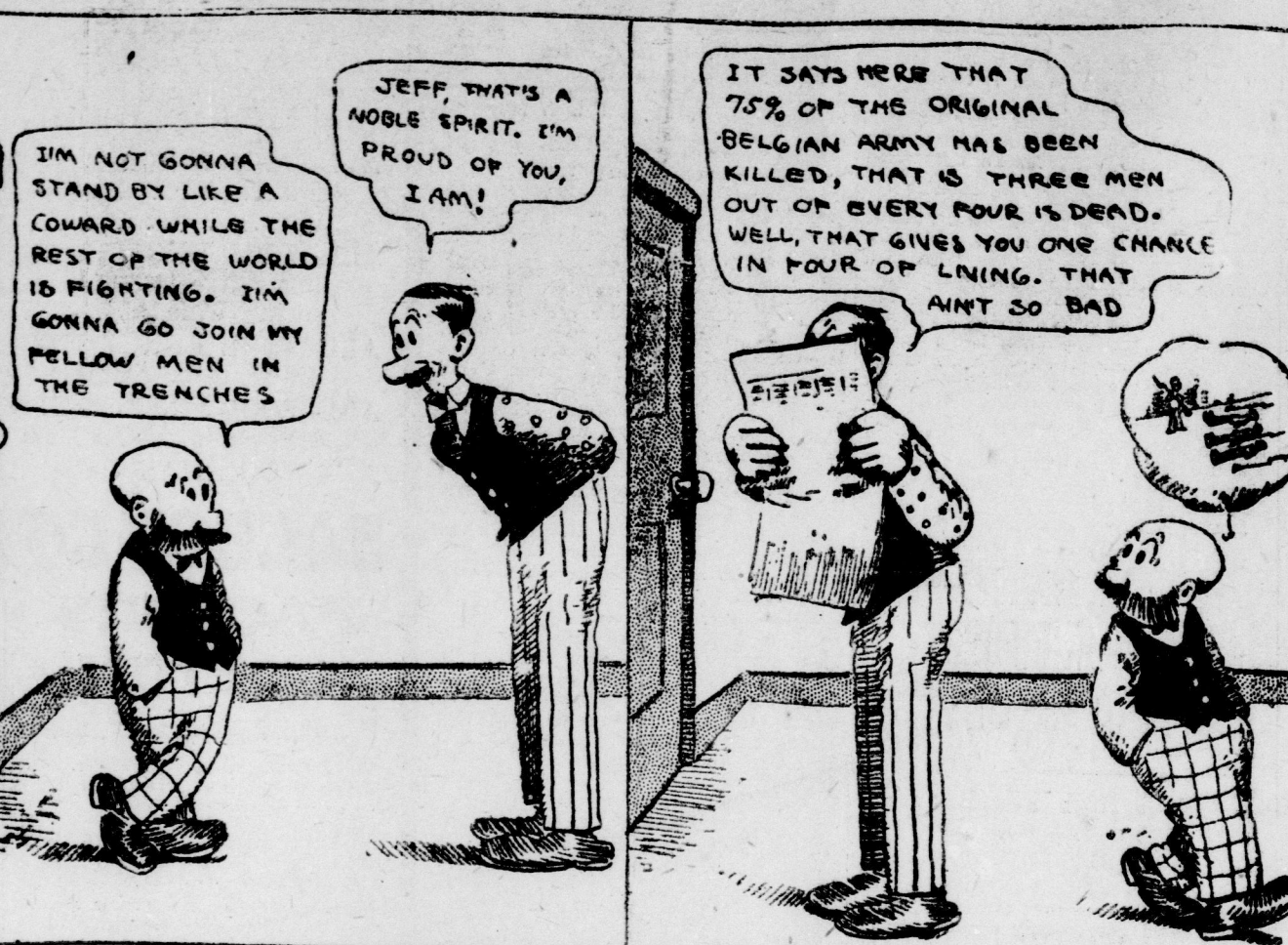

"ARMED PEACE" Londoner Reported Killed In Action

Frank Oram, 40 Euclid avenue, Set Down in Military Records Abroad as Having Been Mortally Wounded, Writes to Wife Here.

ARMED PEACE RUINOUS It Inevitably Drives Towards War, and Is Almost As Costly.

Quebec, Feb. 8.—Interesting remarks on the "unarmed" peace that has marked the last century for the United States and Canada, are the features of a pastoral letter emanating from Cardinal Begin and read yesterday in all the Roman Catholic churches of the archdiocese.

Not Due to Militarism. Recalling the signing of the Ghent treaty, Cardinal Begin remarks that it was not due to militarism that the century of peace, friendliness and prosperity for the two neighboring countries, and still, says he, "this happy situation is not due to militarism. There were no fortresses, not even one single station all along the 2,840 miles of border stretching between the two countries, from the Pacific to the Atlantic.

A Fallacy. "The ancient axiom that if you want peace, you must be prepared for war," continues Cardinal Begin, "is here given a strong and salutary denial, for the peace, the century of which we are about to celebrate, is not what is known as an armed peace, that false peace that is as costly and ruinous as a regular state of war, where as we see today, an armed peace fatally drives us to war."

Where Credit Is Due. Continuing, Cardinal Begin says that the happy hundred years of peace between Great Britain and the United States, is due, first to the God of peace, to the spirit of God's respect that inspires the respect for property, for respect for rights, and also to the broad-mindedness of the two nations, who, without detriment to honor, always preferred conciliation to an armed arbitration.

WANT RECIPROCALITY WITH BRITISH EMPIRE

Manufacturers Ask Government to Give India Special Consideration.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, Feb. 8.—Manufacturers representing Galt, Preston, Hespeler, Waterloo and Berlin met in the city hall here Saturday night and unanimously decided to forward a resolution to the Dominion Government requesting that, in any reciprocal treaty of tariff, special consideration be given to the possibility of establishing reciprocal trade preferences between Canada and New Zealand and all other outlying British dominions.
